main problem is that there are far fewer crochet books than those that champion mitting, and it is even harder to find a crochet book that caters for children. It is imperative a child has a book aimed at their age group as, through teaching many groups of both adults and children how to crochet and knit, I have discovered that the methods needed to both groups are very different.

also not be too simple or babyish. The projects must be interesting enough to hold a child's interest, as their concentration span can be very short, though they can most definitely cope with more challenging patterns. Bearing this in mind, I have aimed to write an interesting, informative, and fun book, with lots of simple yet alluringly colorful patterns, which are both exciting and easy to make. I also wanted the projects to be modern and fresh, to prove that crochet is most definitely not an old-fashioned craft—and have even used the traditional, and often derided, granny square in new and interesting ways.


I believe that anyone can learn to crochet; all it takes is lots of practice and perseverance, which we know not all children want to do. However, the projects in this book are so small, simple, and repetitive that I hope they will want to move onto the next, and will not even realize that they are progressing through the techniques. The toys mainly use similar techniques in a basic body, with non-crocheted embellishment. So that once a child is used to the technique involved, they can choose the shape they like and finish their toy with felt, fabric, beads, and buttons in whichever way they wish to create their own unique creatures and animals, encouraging individuality and creativity.

With the yarn, I have tried to choose compositions that are easy to use and often formulated especially for children, utilizing a mix of natural fibers to ensure they are kind to young, sensitive skin, and manmade fibers to make them durable and easy to wash and care for. However, I have also suggested alternatives so you and your child can play with the book of the projects and use remnants of yarns that are to hand, as many of the patterns use very small amounts of yarn. People mistakenly often think that crochet projects can only use crochet cotton. The trouble with this material is that is can be hard and very fine, which snot conducive to a fun and quick-to-work project, so I have introduced lots of wools and other fibers as well, which should be kind to your child's hands and be easy to hold.


Before you dive into the patterns, please do take the time to read my tips on teaching your child to crochet (see page 8), as I hope my hints and tricks will help make the experience enjoyable and ensure the memory is a warm and happy one for all involved.

Most importantly of all, don't forget to have fun!

While teaching all kinds of craft workshops for children, I have developed a few priceless and failsafe practices, which should ensure that crochet will become a fun hobby for any young child. Even if you do not follow them all rigidly, I recommend you stick at least to the simple tools and materials and have a play with the techniques and tips to find out what your child enjoys crocheting.



THE THE THE

Your first question is probably, what is the best age to begin teaching your child how to crochet? The truth is, there is no perfect age, as it depends on the individual. It is possible to learn the very basics as young as four or five, if your child has highly developed motor skills and is used to doing arts and crafts with you. However, I have found that the best age is seven or eight, as by this time most children are dexterous enough, have good hand-eye coordination, and can concentrate for longer periods of time. They will also be more likely to take all the techniques in and adopt crochet as a hobby and skill that they never forget.

Crochet can be fiddly to learn, due to the need to hold the yarn correctly, so to gauge whether you think your child may be ready to learn, the best thing to do is to teach them to create long lengths of chain. The basic crochet stitches can be quite tricky to master at first and are nearly impossible if you have not first perfected the trick of holding the yarn to create an even gauge. The good news is that once the gauge is mastered, the stitches can be picked up very quickly, as each stitch builds upon the last. So encourage your child to practice getting the perfect gauge by making long lengths of basic chain until you feel that they are ready to move onto the stitches. The chains can easily be made into necklaces or friendship bracelets so that your child doesn't feel as though making them is a fruitless activity.

When choosing tools and materials, there are a few pointers to follow to make them more desirable to young fingers. Metal or metal-tipped hooks are the best kind to use, as the shank is smooth and slippery and the hook is well defined, which means the yarn will slip over the tip more easily and stitches will not snag as much. If you look around, you can find brightly colored hooks, or sparkly ones, which should make them instantly desirable to the young eye. It is also best to work on projects

use medium-thickness hooks, of around US D/3–H/8 (3–5mm), so that children are not working with stitches that are too small and intricate, or with hooks that are too unwieldy.

Traditionally cotton is assumed to be the only fiber for crochet. However, any yarn can be used, so long as it is smooth and not a fancy yarn, such as a bouclé. In fact, for the first project a traditional crochet thread can be a bit thin, hard, and uncomfortable to use, so it is probably best to use a smooth and stretchy, relatively cheap yarn, such as wool or acrylic, as will be easier on the child's hands and the project will "grow" more quickly.

Go slowly with your child at first, they are generally happy just playing with the yarn and admiques—make the learning like a game. Try to vary the activity as you teach, so have purpose makers and sewing needles to hand to embellish the fabric and break up the monotony of the crochet stitches, especially when you notice any concentration lapses.

Don't make them crochet for too long, especially at first. It is a repetitive skill, which can cause unpracticed hands to ache. Short, fun lessons with breaks will stop children feeling they are being forced to crochet and will make them look forward to picking up the cook again. You do not have to practice every day, so long as you crochet regularly. Perhaps you can find time to crochet during a favorite cartoon or before bedtime to unwind. Maybe saturday evenings will be craft time. Any regular quality time with mom, dad, or grandma be eagerly anticipated and if you include all your children in some way, and even their fields, they will want to do it more as it will be something they can share and talk about.

Have patience with your child; it seems patronizing to say so, but sometimes after a long together, a parent can often be less patient with his or her own child, especially if they want the child to share in the love of something dear to them. Even if a terrible mess occurring, try not rip back a child's work too far, which can undermine their confidence in their ability—let them see their progression from wonky fabrics with sloping sides to beautiful, even crochet.

The best tip I can give you is: make it fun! While an adult will happily crochet large projects, children want to see results quickly or they may get bored or lose concentration.

Small projects such as a belt or toy—or those that are made up of motifs such as granny squares—are preferable to the failsafe adult beginner project, the scarf. Crochet should always be relaxing and fun, otherwise what's the point? So ensure you both enjoy the process and do not put too much emphasis on perfectly finished fabrics. Be flexible and encourage your child to use their imagination; projects can evolve as they are made, developing into a final piece dictated by the shape of the fabric. Every child is different and they have a very different view of the world to adults, so let them form fabulous creations from their fabrics, and perhaps in return they can teach you a thing or two about crochet!









Techniques





Tools

You need just two items to start crocheting: a hook and some yarn. However, there are a few other bits and pieces that you'll need to make some of the projects in this book, but none of them are expensive and you'll probably have some of them at home already.








Holding the hook


There are two ways of holding the hook in crochet, and you can choose whichever of these feels most natural for you.







1 Hold the hook in your right hand if you are right-handed, or left if you are left-handed, as you would a knife.



2 Hold the hook in your right hand if you are right-handed, or left if you are left-handed, as you would a pencil.




Holding the yarn


Creating the correct, even gauge is imperative in crochet, otherwise the stitches are nearly impossible to create. This is achieved by how you wrap the yarn around your fingers.



RIGHT-HANDED




1 Wrap the ball end of the yarn around little finger of your left hand, passing it over the other fingers.




2 Hold the hook in your right hand. Hold the work steady (here, the bottom of the slip knot is being held), with the middle finger and thumb of your left hand, then use your left forefinger to create tension by keeping it held above the work.

LEFT-HANDED



1 Wrap the ball end of the yarn around little finger of your right hand, passing it over the other fingers.




2 Hold the hook in your left hand. Hold the work steady (here, the bottom of the slip knot is being held), with the middle finger and thumb of your right hand, then use your right forefinger to create tension by keeping it held above the work.

Slip knot


The first loop on the hook in crochet is created by a slip knot.








1 Make a loop of the yarn around your fingers.



2 Pull a second loop of yarn through the first loop.



3 Pull up the loop, but do not pull the end of yarn through.




4 Slip the hook through the second loop and pull the loop taut around the hook. Do not pull too tightly or the first chain will be hard to make.




Chain

Most crochet projects begin with a length of chain. This is the perfect stitch to practice your gauge on, as it is the simplest thing you can do in crochet.



1 Holding the yarn and hook in the appropriate hands, hold the tail end of the yarn under the slip knot and bring the working yarn over the hook by passing the hook in front of yarn then under it: this is called "yarn over" and will be referred to that way for the rest of these technique instructions.



3 One chain is made.


2 Turn the hook


around toward you to







4 Ensuring the stitches are even—not too loose or tight—repeat Step 2 to make a length of chain.

WORKING INTO A CHAIN

You might need to concentrate a bit more when making stitches into a chain, but once you have done the first row, it's much easier to continue.



1 You need to miss the appropriate number of chain for your particular stitch (see the individual stitch instructions), then insert the hook from front to back into the next chain, under the top loop of the chain.




2 Yarn over and draw a loop through to the front of chain, then complete the stitch. (See pages 18–23 for stitch instructions.)

Single crochet (sc)

This is the next crochet stitch to learn once you have got chain right.








1 Make one chain (see page 17). This is called the "turning chain" and you make one at the start of every row of single crochet.



2 Skipping the chain you have just made, insert the hook from front to back into the next stitch (see page 24). There should be the two strands of the stitch and one loop on the hook.



3 Yarn over hook.



5 Yarn over hook again.



4 Draw the loop through the stitch to the front. There should be two loops on the hook.



6 Draw the loop through both loops on the hook to complete one single crochet. Follow Steps 2–6 to work one single crochet in the same way into every stitch across the row.




Half double crochet (hdc)

This stitch involves a third loop on the hook. You need to work two chain (see page 17) for the turning chain at the start of a row of half double crochet.






1 Yarn over hook before you insert the hook into the next stitch.



2 Insert the hook in the next stitch, from front to back (see page 24). Yarn over hook.




3 Pull the loop through the stitch only. There should be three loops on the hook.



4 Yarn over hook again.



5 Pull the loop through the three loops on the hook to complete one half double crochet. Work one half double crochet in the same way into every stitch across the row.






Double crochet (dc)

This is the last crochet stitch to learn in the series of stitches you need to know for this book.





1 Work three chain (see page 17) for the turning chain at the start of a row of double crochet.



2 Yarn over hook before you insert the hook into the stitch.




3 Insert the hook into the next stitch, from front to back (see page 24). Yarn over hook.




4 Draw the loop just through the stitch. There should be three loops on the hook.



5 Yarn over hook.



6 Pull the loop through two of the loops on the hook. There should be two loops on the hook.



7 Yarn over hook.



8 Pull the loop through the remaining two loops on the hook to complete a double crochet. Follow Steps 2–8 to work one double crochet in the same way into every stitch across the row.




Fasten off


When you have finished crocheting, you need to fasten off the stitches to stop all your work unraveling.



1 Pull up the final loop of the last stitch to make it bigger.



2 Cut the yarn, leaving enough of an end to weave in.



3 Pull the end through the loop.




4 Pull the loop up tightly.

WORKING INTO WHICH LOOP?

All crochet stitches are always worked through both loops of the next stitch (looks like a "V" on top of the stitch), unless the pattern tells you otherwise. Insert the hook under both loops of the next stitch, then complete the stitch.

In this book, you are sometimes asked to work through the back loop only (blo) to create texture. Insert the hook under the back loop only of the next stitch, going through the center of the stitch to the back, then complete the stitch.






Slip stitch


A slip stitch is usually used to join one stitch to another, or to join a stitch to another point. It is most often used in this book when joining a round, as here.








1 Work until you have reached the end of the round.



2 Insert hook into next stitch; here it is the first stitch of the last round.



3 Yarn over hook, as when you make a chain (see page 17).



4 Pull a loop through every loop on hook to finish the slip stitch and close the round.

Increasing

To work an extra stitch, you simply need to work into the same stitch more than once. The method is shown here on single crochet (see page 18).








1 Work one stitch as normal.



2 Insert the hook once again into the stitch you just worked into and work a second stitch.



3 One stitch increased.

Decreasing

To decrease a stitch, you need to work into two stitches without finishing them, then work them together. Here, a single crochet (see page 18) decrease is worked to demonstrate the method.



1 Insert the hook into the next stitch. Yarn over hook.



2 Draw a loop through the stitch, but do not finish the single crochet stitch as usual.



3 Insert the hook into the next stitch. Yarn over hook.



4 Draw the loop through the stitch only, there should be three loops on hook in total. Yarn over hook.




5 Draw the loop through all the loops on the hook, drawing two stitches together. One stitch decreased.




Working in the round

There are a few ways to work in the round, and here we show you the two ways used in this book. Method 1 creates a hole in the middle of the work, which can be part of a decorative design. Method 2 creates a center with a smaller hole, perfect for toys.


METHOD 1




1 Work chain (see page 17) to the length given in the pattern. Insert the hook through the first chain made to create a horseshoe shape.




2 Work a slip stitch (see page 25) to join the horseshoe into a ring.



4 Pull a loop through the center of the ring to the front. Two loops are on the hook. Yarn over hook and pull the loop through the two loops on the hook to complete a single crochet. Work the desired number of stitches into the ring in the same way.




3 You can now continue working into this ring as you wish. Here, a series of single crochet stitches (see page 18) are worked around the ring. Insert the hook into the center of the ring. Yarn over hook.




5 Join the round with a slip stitch to the first single crochet made (see page 25). First round is complete.


METHOD 2




1 Work two chain stitches (see page 17).



2 Insert the hook into the first chain made.



3 Work a single crochet into this chain, then work as many single crochets as needed into the same chain.



4 Join the round with a slip stitch to the first single crochet made (see page 25). First round is complete.





Joining in a new color

Sometimes you will need to change yarn color, but it's very easy to do.



1 Fasten off the old color (see page 24). Make a slip knot with the new color (see page 16).




2 Insert the hook into the stitch at the beginning of the next row, then insert the hook through the slip knot.



3 Pull the loop of the slip knot through to the front of the fabric.



4 Yarn round hook.



5 Work one chain (see page 17) to hold in the new color, then complete the first stitch as normal.

Sewing up

Sewing up crochet fabric can be done in many ways, but using a whip stitch is the easiest. However, you can see it quite easily so you can make a feature of it by using a different color yarn to the one used in the project.



Lay the two pieces to be joined next to each other with right sides upward. Secure the yarn to one piece. Insert the needle into the front of one piece of fabric, then up from the back of the adjoining fabric. Repeat along the seam.

Sewing crochet to fabric

There are a few projects in this book where you need to sew some crochet to a piece of fabric. As with sewing up two crochet pieces, you use whip stitch.




Use a sewing needle and thread. Wrong sides facing, lay the two pieces to be joined on top of each other. Insert the needle from the back and bring it through to the front. Repeat along the seam.




Pompoms

Pompoms are so simple to make. You can make them from rings of cardboard, but buying a plastic pompom maker is so much quicker and simpler and you don't have to make a new one each time you want to make pompoms. You can buy them in all shapes and sizes—even heart-shaped! Here is a little tip: try cutting the yarn for tying before you begin so you don't have to put down the pompom maker in the middle of cutting the pompom.







1 Wind yarn around each half of the pompom maker.




2 Put two the halves together to make a circle. Carefully, making sure you don't lose any ends, cut around the outside of the circle.




3 Tie a loose end of yarn tightly around the middle of the pompom. Try to wrap around another time and tie a knot again to ensure the compom is tied securely.



4 Pull the pompom maker apart to create the pompom.



5 Trim any straggly ends of yarn to make a neat ball.








Fingerless Gloves

You may think gloves are hard to crochet, but these are simply two rectangles sewn along one side, with a gap left for the thumb!



MEASUREMENTS

Short gloves approx 4½in (11.5cm) long.
Long gloves approx 6in (15cm) long.
Both lengths to fit S(L) approx 6¼(7)in [16(18)cm] around hand.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 120yds (112m)—of Artesano Soft Merino Superwash DK, 100% merino superwash, in each of:

Short gloves

Yarn A: shade 6315, lime green
Yarn B: shade 1291, sea blue
Long gloves
Yarn A: shade SFN10, cream

Yarn B: shade 8413, baby peach

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do; try plain colors or different width stripes to play with the pattern.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 16 sts and 13 rows to 4in (10cm) in hdc using size 7 (4.5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

*Size 7 (4.5mm) crochet hook *Darning needle *Three buttons (for long gloves)

*Sewing needle and thread

SHORT GLOVES

(make 2)

Using size 7 (4.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 28(32).

Row 1: Work 1hdc into 2nd ch from hook, work 1hdc into each ch to end. 26(30)sts

*Fasten off yarn A.

In yarn B, work even in hdc for 3 rows.

Fasten off yarn B.

Work 1 row even in hdc in yarn A; rep from * until glove measures 4½in (11.5cm) long, ending with 1 row of yarn A.

FINISHING

Sew up side seam to 1½in (3cm) from top of glove and 1in (2.5cm) from bottom of glove, leaving a gap of 1½in (4cm) for thumb.

LONG GLOVES

(make 2)

Using size 7 (4.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 28(32).

Row 1: Work 1hdc into 2nd ch from hook, work 1hdc into each ch to end. 26(30)sts

*Fasten off yarn A.

In yarn B, work even in hdc for 1 row.

Fasten off yarn B.

Work 1 row even in hdc in yarn A; rep from * until glove measures 6in (15cm) long, ending with 1 row of yarn A.



EARS

(make 2)

Using size 7 (4.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Row 1: Work 4sc into first ch, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, work 2sc into each st across row, turn. 8sc

Row 3: Ch 1, (1sc, work 2sc into next st) across row, turn. 12sc

Row 4: Ch 1, (2sc, work 2sc into next st) across row, turn. 16sc

Row 5: Ch 1, (3sc, work 2sc into next st) across row, turn. 20sc

Row 6: Ch 1, (4sc, work 2sc into next st) across row. 24sc

Fasten off yarn.

Using size 7 (4.5mm) hook and yarn B, ch 2.

Row 1: Work 4sc into first ch, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, work 2sc into each st across row, turn. 8sc

Row 3: Ch 1, (1sc, work 2sc into next st) across row, turn. 12sc

Row 4: Ch 1, (2sc, work 2sc into next st) across row, turn. 16sc

Row 5: Ch 1, (3sc, work 2sc into next st) across row. 20sc

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew smaller ear piece onto larger ear piece.

Fold ear along straight seam, sew up and sew to side of hat.

Cut eyes from felt and sew them to the front of the hat. Sew buttons onto the felt to finish the eyes.
Using a scrap of yarn, embroider a triangular nose.





Advanced

Mittens

Warm and snug mittens made using a yarn that changes color throughout, so you don't even need to crochet stripes!

MEASUREMENTS

S(M:L), approx 5½(6½:7¼)in [14(16.5:18.5)cm] long. 5½(8½:8½)in [14(21.5:21.5)cm] around hand.

YARN

1(2:2) x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 190yds (174m)—Crystal Palace Yarns, Mochi Plus, 80% merino wool, 20% nylon, in shade 551, intense rainbow

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any Aran or worsted weight yarn will do, and you can stripe up different shades if you cannot find a variegated yarn that stripes itself. Wool or a wool-mix yarn is great for warmth.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 17 sts and 20 rows to 4in (10cm) over sc using size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) and size 7 (4.5mm) crochet hooks
- *Darning needle

PATTERN NOTES

Mittens are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.



MITTENS

(make 2)

Using size H/8 (5mm) hook, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

M and L sizes only:

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

L size only:

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

All sizes:

Work even in sc until mittens measure 31/2(4:41/4)in (9[10:11]cm) from tip.

THUMB OPENING

Next rnd: Ch 4(5:5), skip next 4(5:5) sc, sc to end of rnd.

Next rnd: Sc into each of next 4(5:5)ch, sc to end of rnd.

Work even on these sts for 5(6:7) further rnds, change to size 7 (4.5mm) hook and work 3(4:5) further rnds.

Fasten off yarn.

Rejoin yarn to any point around thumb opening and work 10(12:12)sc around edge then work even in sc on these sts until thumb measures approx 2in (5cm), or desired length of thumb.

Next rnd: Sc2tog around.

Fasten off yarn and draw in any hole at end of thumb.






Intermediate

Cowl

A very quick project, worked in the round, so no sewing up! Try using lots of different scraps of yarn for a rainbow-colored neck warmer.



One size, approx 4in (10cm) wide and 47in (120cm) around.

YARN

1 x 3½oz (100g) ball—approx 144yds (132m)—Artesano Aran, 50% superfine alpaca, 50% Peruvian highland wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 2184, meadle Yarn B: shade 5083, lomond

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Use any Aran or worsted weight yarn to achieve the same-sized cowl, or try different yarns—the resulting cowl will just come out smaller or larger.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 3 grouped double crochets and 7 rows to 4in (10cm) using size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

*Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook

*Darning needle

PATTERN NOTES

Cowl is worked in the round, do not turn throughout.



COWL

Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 120, join to first ch with a ss, trying not to twist chain.

Rnd 1: Ch 3, 2dc into bottom of same ch, ch 1, skip 2ch, *3dc into next ch, ch 1, skip 2ch; rep from * to end of rnd, join to top of t-ch with a ss.

Rnd 2: Ss to next 1-ch sp, ch 3, 2dc into 1-ch sp, ch 1, *3dc into next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * to end of rnd, join to top of t-ch with a ss.

Fasten off yarn A.

Rnd 3: Join yarn B to any 1-ch sp with a ss, ch 3, 2dc into 1-ch sp, ch 1, *3dc into next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * to end of rnd, join to top of t-ch with a ss.

Fasten off yarn B.

Rnd 4: Join yarn A to any 1-ch sp with a ss, ch 3, 2dc into 1-ch sp, ch 1, *3dc into next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * to end of rnd, join to top of t-ch with a ss.

Fasten off yarn A.

Rnd 5: Rep rnd 3.

Fasten off yarn B.

Rnd 6: Join yarn A to any 1-ch sp with a ss, ch 3, 2dc into 1-ch sp, ch 1, *3dc into next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * to end of rnd, join to top of t-ch with a ss.

Rnd 7: Ss to next 1-ch sp, ch 3, 2dc into 1-ch sp, ch 1, *3dc into next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * to end of rnd, join to top of t-ch with a ss.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Weave in ends.

Carefully press the cowl into shape on a soft surface. This is known as blocking.





Intermediate

Flower Earmuffs

If you don't like hats, but can't stand having cold ears, earmuffs are for you—and they are also great for when your friends just talk too loudly!

MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 11½in (29cm) from center of one earmuff, across strap, to center of other earmuff.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 131yds (120m)—Rico Essentials Merino DK, 100% merino in each of:

Yarn A: shade 19, mulberry

Yarn B: shade 01, rose Yarn C: shade 04, acacia

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do to achieve the same size earmuffs; choose something very warm, soft, and cozy!

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 22 sts and 20 rows to 4in (10cm) in sc using size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing

PATTERN NOTES

Earpieces are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.

Flowers are worked in the round, joining

each round with a ss.

Strap is worked straight, turn at end of each row.



STRAP

Using size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 13.

Row 1: Work 1sc into 2nd ch from hook, work 1sc into each ch to end of row, turn. 12sc

Row 2: Ch 1, sc into each st across row, turn.

Rep last row until strap is approx 11in (28cm) long.

Fasten off yarn.

EARPIECES

(make 4)

Using size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 42sc

Rnd 8: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around. 48sc

Rnd 9: (Work 2sc into next st, 7sc) around. 54sc

Rnd 10: (Work 2sc into next st, 8sc) around. 60sc

Fasten off yarn.

FLOWERS

Using size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 6 and join into a ring with a ss into first ch.

Rnd 1: Ch 1, work 12sc into ring, join rnd with a ss.

Fasten off yarn A and join in yarn B to any sc.

Rnd 2: 1sc in same st as join (ch 5, skip 1sc, sc into next st) six times, finishing last rep with a ss into next st. 6 petals

Rnd 3: (Work 9sc into next ch sp, ss into sc) around.

Fasten off yarn B and join yarn A to any sc, work 1 rnd in sc all around petal edges.

Fasten off yarn.

TIES

Using size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook and yarns B and C held together, crochet two lengths of chain, each approx in 20in (50cm) long.

FINISHING


Weave in all ends.

Sew two circles together around edge, leaving a hole to stuff. Fill ear piece with toy stuffing to desired fullness and then sew up rem hole. Rep with rem two circles.

Sew a flower to each earpiece.

Sew an earmuff to either end of the strap, with flowers facing out.

Attach a chain to bottom of each earmuff to tie.








Hat With Earflaps

Keep warm and cozy in this snuggly hat. I've decorated the earflaps with pompoms on strings, but you could leave them plain if you prefer.



MEASUREMENTS

Finished hat approx 221/2in (57cm) unstretched.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 81yds (75m)—Sirdar Click Chunky with wool, 70% acrylic, 30% wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 165, blue Yarn B: shade 142, lamb

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any chunky yarn will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 12 sts and 9 rows to 4in (10cm) over hdc using size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Pompom maker

PATTERN NOTES

Hat is worked in the round, do not turn throughout.

Earflaps are worked straight.

Yarn is not fastened off after each color change, and you do not need to join yarn to each new row once it has been joined in. Simply carry the yarn at the back of the work, and pick up and work the new yarn in the next stitch when instructed. Do not pull the yarn too tight when changing color as this will affect the stretch of the hat.

HAT

Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6hdc into first ch made, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2hdc into each st around, join rnd with a ss. 12hdc

Rnd 3: Work 2hdc into each st around, join rnd with a ss. 24hdc

Rnd 4: (Work 2hdc into next st, 1hdc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36hdc

Rnd 5: (Work 2hdc into next st, 2hdc) around, join rnd with a ss. 48hdc

Change to yarn B and work 1 rnd even in sc.

Change back to yarn A.

Rnd 7: (Work 2hdc into next st, 6hdc) around, join rnd with a ss. 54hdc

Change to yarn B and work 1 rnd even in sc.

Change back to yarn A.

Work 2 rnds even in hdc.

Change to yarn B.

Work 4 rnds even in hdc.

Change to yarn A and work 3 rows even in hdc.

EARFLAP

Work even for earflap as folls:

Row 1: Work 12hdc, turn leaving rem sts unworked.

Row 2: Hdc2tog, hdc to last 2 sts, hdc2tog, turn. 10hdc

Rep last row until 4 sts rem.

Fasten off yarn.

Rejoin yarn A to 17th st along from last earflap and work as for first earfla







Accessories





Headband

A basic strip of crochet can be easily turned into a headband, with a cute bow to hide the seam and add extra prettiness.

MEASUREMENTS

Headband is approx 21/4 in (5.5cm) wide and to fit head approx 171/4(19:201/2)in [44(48:52)cm] around, although it is easy to adapt to fit your own head.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 191yds (175m)—Sirdar Snuggly Kisses DK, 55% nylon, 45% acrylic, in shade 0754, pink

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 21 sts and 14 rows to 4in (10cm) over hdc using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle





HEADBAND

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook, ch 14.

Row 1: Work 1hdc into 2nd ch from hook, then 1hdc into each ch to end of row. 12hdc

Row 2: Ch 2, work 1hdc into each st to end of row.

Rep last row until headband is approx 17¼(19:20½)in [44(48:52)cm] long, or desired head circumference, allowing for stretch.

Fasten off yarn.

BOW

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook, ch 16.

Row 1: Work 1hdc into 2nd ch from hook, then 1hdc into each ch to end of row. *14hdc*

Row 2: Ch 2, work 1hdc into each st to end of row.

Rep last row until strip is approx 4in (10cm) long.

Fasten off yarn.

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook, ch 8.

Row 1: Work 1hdc into 2nd ch from hook, then 1hdc into each ch to end of row. 6hdc

Row 2: Ch 2, work 1hdc into each st to end of row.

Rep last row until strip is approx 4½ in (11cm) long.


Fasten off yarn.





Strand of Beads

Make your strand of beads as long or short as you wish, and with as many differently sized and colored beads threaded on as your heart desires!



MEASUREMENTS

Small beads approx 3/4in (2cm) in diameter.

Medium beads approx 1in (2.5cm) in diameter.

Large beads approx 1½in (4cm) in diameter.

YARN

1 x 3½oz (100g) ball—approx 437yds (400m)—DMC Petra no 5, 100% long staple cotton, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 5415, silver

Yarn B: shade 5800, blue

Yarn C: shade 5745, yellow

Yarn D: shade 5149, pink

Yarn E: shade L3821, gold metallic

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any fine crochet thread will do for beads of this dimension, although you can use any weight of yarn and scraps from other projects and the beads will just come out different sizes.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size B/1 (2.25mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing

PATTERN NOTES

Beads are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals, do not join into rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round. Begin stuffing ball from last even round to ensure an evenly filled ball.

SMALL BEAD

Using size B/1 (2.25mm) crochet hook and any color, work 2 ch.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join round.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Work three rnds even in sc without increasing, then begin to stuff bead.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 6: (Sc2tog) around until you can decrease no more.

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

MEDIUM BEAD

Using size B/1 (2.25mm) crochet hook and any color, work 2 ch.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join round.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: Work (1sc, 2sc into next st) around. 18sc

Work five rnds even in sc without increasing, then begin to stuff bead.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 9: (1sc, sc2tog) around. 12sc

Rnd 10: (Sc2tog) around until you can decrease no more.

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

LARGE BEAD

Using size B/1 (2.25mm) crochet hook and any color, work 2 ch.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join round.

Rnds 2-3: Work 2sc into each sc around. 24sc





Belt

An extremely simple belt, which can easily be made longer or shorter or wider as you wish.

MEASUREMENTS

One size, 1in (2.5cm) wide and 36in (92cm) long.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 137yds (125m)—of Debbie Bliss Ecobaby, 100% Organic Cotton, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 04, aqua Yarn B: shade 14, lemon Yarn C: shade 23, peach Yarn D: shade 24, salmon

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any 4ply to sportweight yarn will do here, but very small amounts of yarn are used so scraps left over from other projects are perfect. You could also use other weights of yarn and the belt will simply come out longer or shorter.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 20 sts and 13.5 rows to 4in (10cm) in hdc using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Two very small buttons to fit through holes of stitches to fasten belt—approx ½in (1cm) diameter
- *Sewing needle and thread



BELT

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 172.

Row 1: Work 1hdc into 2nd ch from hook, work 1 hdc into each ch to end of row, turn. 170sts

Change to yarn B, fasten off yarn A, and work 1 row even in hdc, turn.

Change to yarn C, fasten off yarn B, and work 1 row even in hdc, turn.

Change to yarn D, fasten off yarn C, and work 1 row even in hdc.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Weave in ends.

Sew two buttons to one end of belt. To fasten around waist, insert buttons through holes between stitches at desired length.







Flowers

It's so easy to work in the round and create fast and simply stunning brooches or hair clips. Adorn these little lovelies with buttons or beads for added sparkle.

MEASUREMENTS

One size.

Loopy flower approx 23/4in

(7cm) diameter.

Small daisy approx 21/2in

(6cm) diameter.

Large daisy approx 31/2in

(9cm) diameter.

Small flower approx 11/2in

(4cm) diameter.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 131yds (120m)—Rico Essentials Merino DK,

100% merino in each of:

Yarn A: shade 65, yellow

Yarn B: shade 20, lilac

Yarn C: shade 04, acacia

Yarn D: shade 10, magenta

Yarn E: shade 01, rose

Yarn F: shade 45, mint

Yarn G: shade 19, mulberry

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Use any scraps of yarn in differing weights here—simply change the hook accordingly. The flowers will turn out different sizes, but that will just add to their charm! This project uses very small amounts of yarn, so is perfect for using up leftovers from other projects.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project.

NOTIONS

- *Size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Brooch back, safety pin or hairclip for fastening
- *Buttons/beads for embellishment if desired

PATTERN NOTES

Daisies and small flower worked in the round, do not turn throughout. The loopy flower is worked in rows.

DAISIES

First round same for both daisies:

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 6 and join into ring with a ss.

Rnd 1: Work 20sc into ring, join rnd with a ss.

Fasten off yarn A.

LARGE DAISY

Join yarn B to any sc with a ss.

Rnd 2: Ch 20, (ss into next sc, ch 20) around, join last petal to bottom of first ch with a ss.

Fasten off yarn and weave in ends.

SMALL DAISY

Join yarn B to any sc with a ss.

Rnd 2: Ch 10, (skip 1 sc, ss into next sc, ch 10) around, join last petal to bottom of first ch with a ss.

Fasten off yarn and weave in ends.

LOOPY FLOWER

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn C, ch 5.

Row 1: Work 1 sc into 2nd ch from hook, 1 sc into each ch to end of row, turn. *4sc*

Row 2: Ch 30, sc in sc at base of ch, sc to end of row, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Row 4: Ch 30, sc in sc at base of ch, sc to end of row, turn.

Rep rows 3-4 eight times more.

Change to yarn D.

Next row: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Next row: Ch 25, sc in sc at base of ch, sc to end of row, turn.

Next row: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Rep last two rows nine times more.

Change to yarn E.

Next row: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Next row: Ch 20, sc in sc at base of ch, sc to end of row, turn.

Next row: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Rep last two rows nine times more.

Fasten off.

Roll up strip with smaller loops in the middle and secure in place by sewing together through the sc section at the back.

SMALL FLOWER

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn F, ch 3.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each st around, join rnd with a ss. 10sc

Rnd 3: (1sc, 2sc into next st) around, join rnd with a ss. 15sc

Fasten off yarn F.

Join yarn G to any sc with a ss.

Rnd 4: Ch 1, 2dc into each of next 2 sts, (1sc, 2dc into each of next 2 sts) to end of rnd, join rnd with a ss in 1-ch.

5 petals made

Fasten off yarn and weave in ends.

FINISHING

Attach brooch back, safety pin, or hairclip to the back of each flower to secure. Sew buttons and beads to the fronts for embellishment if desired.







Heart and Star Hairclips

Crochet is the perfect way to cover boring hairclips and slides in your favorite color. Add a cute heart or star to really make them shine.

MEASUREMENTS

One size, hearts and stars approx 1in (2.5cm) wide.

YARN

1 x 3½oz (100g) ball—approx 306yds (280m)—DMC Petra no 3, 100% long staple cotton, in each of:

Yarn A: shade, 5321, red Yarn B: shade, 53904, ice blue Yarn C: shade, 53900, green

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any no 3 weight crochet cotton will do here for slides of this dimension, although you can use any weight of yarn and the shapes will be different sizes. These projects only use very small amounts of yarn, so it is a perfect way of using up scraps of yarn left from other projects.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Hairclips



HAIRCLIP

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and any color, join yarn to any point hair clip with a ss.

Work sc evenly all round the clip, through the center hole, to cover. Fasten off yarn.

HEART

Rnd 1: Ch 2, work 9sc into 2nd ch from hook, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc into next st, (1hdc, 5dc, 1hdc) all into next st, ss into next st, (1hdc, 5dc, 1hdc) all into next st, sc to end of end, ss into first ch to join rnd.

Fasten off yarn.

STAR

Rnd 1: Ch 2, work 10sc into 2nd ch from hook, join rnd with a ss. Rnd 2: (Ch 2, 1dc into next st, ch 2, ss into next st) five times.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew heart or star to fat end of clip to hide uncovered portion.





Bracelets

These simple bracelet tubes can be adapted to fit you perfectly. Make lots of them in different colors to go with all your favorite clothes.

MEASUREMENTS

To fit you!

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 104yds (95m) – Sirdar Snuggly Baby Bamboo, 80% bamboo, 20% wool, in each of: Yarn A: shade 162, toy box red Yarn B: shade 160, paint box pink Yarn C: shade 161, baby berries purple Yarn D: shade 159, jack-in-the-box turquoise

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will make the same sized bracelets.

However, you could use long scraps of yarn of any weight to make them, changing your hook size to match, and they will simply come out in different widths.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project.

NOTIONS

- *Size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Darning needle

PATTERN NOTES

Bracelets are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals, do not join into rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.



BRACELET

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and any yarn, ch 8 and join into a ring with a ss into first ch made.

Rnd 1: Ch 1, work 1sc(blo) into each ch around, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 1sc(blo) into each ch around, do not join rnd.

Rep last rnd until bracelet measures approx 7in (18cm), or length to fit your wrist allowing for stretch over hand.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew two open ends together neatly to form a circle.





Legwarmers

Crochet these cozy legwarmers in one shade or in candy stripes. They look great with ballet flats or with ankle boots.

MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 101/4 in (26cm) long and 51/2 in (14cm) wide, but you can make them longer or shorter by working more rounds as desired.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 109yds (100m)—Rico Essentials Soft Merino Aran, 100% merino wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 041, eucalyptus Yarn B: shade 015, fuchsia Yarn C: shade 050, pistachio

ALTERNATIVE YARNS


Any Aran or worsted weight yarn will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 11 sts and 10 rows to 4in (10cm) in pattern using size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size 7 (4.5mm) and size H/8 (5mm) crochet hooks
- *Darning needle





(make 2)

Using size 7 (4.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 34, join into a ring with a ss into first ch.

Rnd 1: Ch 2, skip next ch, (sc into next ch, ch 1, skip next ch) to end, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc into 1-ch sp, (ch 1, sc into 1-ch sp) to end, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 3: Ch 2, (sc into next 1-ch sp, 1 ch) to end, join rnd with a ss.

Change to yarn B and larger hook.

Rnd 4: Ch 3, work 1dc into each sc and 1-ch sp around, join rnd with a ss. 34sts

Change to yarn C and work two rnds even in dc.

**Change to yarn A and work one rnd even in sc.

Change to yarn B and work one rnd even in dc.

Change to yarn C and work two rnds even in dc.**

Rep from ** to ** three times more, or until desired length of legwarmer has been reached.

Change to yarn A and smaller hook.

Next rnd: Ch 2, skip next dc (sc into next dc, ch 1, skip next dc) to end, join rnd with a ss.

Next rnd: Ch 1, sc into 1-ch sp, (ch 1, sc into 1-ch sp) to end, join rnd with a ss.

Next rnd: Ch 2, (sc into next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to end, join rnd with a ss. Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Weave in ends.





Squares Scarf

Granny squares are traditional, fun, and easy to make, and once you start on them, you will easily become hooked! Join lots of squares together to make a lovely, simple scarf.



One size, approx 6 x 44in (15 x 112cm).

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 98yds (90m)—of Patons Fairytale Dreamtime DK, 100% pure wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 4953, pink

Yarn B: shade 4954, lilac

Yarn C: shade 4957, turquoise

Yarn D: shade 4952, lime

Yarn E: shade 4960, yellow

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do to achieve the same size scarf, but you can use any yarn you like, the scarf will simply come out a different size!

GAUGE (TENSION)

Each square measures approx 3¼ x 3¼in (8 x 8cm) using a size 7 (4.5mm) hook.

NOTIONS

- *Size 7 (4.5mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle





SQUARE

(make as many as required, scarf shown has 28)
Using any yarn, and size 7 (4.5mm) hook, ch 4, join to first ch with a ss to form ring.

Rnd 1: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), 2dc in ring, ch 3, (3dc in ring, ch 3) three times, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rnd 2: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same 3-ch sp, ch 1, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in next 3-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * twice more, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rnd 3: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same sp for corner, ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in next 3-ch sp for corner, ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Using darning needle and matching yarns, sew all squares together with whip stitch to make a scarf two squares wide and 14 squares long.





Bird Bag

A sweet and simple book bag, you can easily make yours into any creature that you wish—ours is a robin redbreast. Try stripes for a tiger!



MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 91/2 x 93/4in (24 x 25cm).

YARN

1 x 3½oz (100g) ball—approx 144yds (132m)—Artesano Aran, 50% superfine alpaca, 50% Peruvian highland wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 0042, wester Yarn B: shade c969, ash

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Use any Aran or worsted weight yarn to achieve the same-sized bag, or try different yarns—the resulting bag will just come out smaller or larger.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 14 hdc and 12 rows to 4in (10cm) in hdc using size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Felt and buttons for features
- *Sewing needle and thread

BAG

Using yarn A, ch 72.

Row 1: Work 1 hdc into 3rd ch from hook, 1hdc in each ch to end of row, turn. *70hdc*

Row 2: Ch 2, hdc into each st across row, turn.

Work even in hdc as row 2, until work measures approx 7in (18cm). Change to yarn B and work a further 2½in (6cm) even in hdc. Fasten off yarn.

STRAPS

(make 2)

Using yarn A, ch 8.

Row 1: Work 1 hdc into 3rd ch from hook, 1hdc in each ch to end of row, turn. 6hdc

Row 2: Ch 2, hdc into each st across row, turn.

Work even in hdc as row 2, until work measures approx 20in (50cm). Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Right side facing, fold fabric in half widthways and backstitch open side and bottom seams together. Turn bag right side out.

Using felt and buttons, sew on the required features to the front of the bag: this robin has felt and button eyes and a felt beak.

Sew a strap to the top inner edge of each side of bag, stitching either end 2½in (6cm) in from either side.







Bedroom Essentials





Granny Square Pillow

Once you know how to make granny squares, you can make them as big as you like! Just keep adding rounds as the pattern explains.



MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 20 x 20in (50 x 50cm).

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 98yds (90m)— Debbie Bliss Cashmerino Aran, 55% merino wool, 33% microfiber, 12% cashmere, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 036, purple Yarn B: shade 037, violet Yarn C: shade 42, aubergine Yarn D: shade 43, pink

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any Aran or worsted weight yarn will make the same-sized pillow, but you can use any weight of yarn that you wish, the pillow will simply come out smaller or larger.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project, but approx 3½ groups of 3dc and 8 rows to 4in (10cm) using a size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook
- *Toy stuffing or pillow form measuring 20 x 20in (50 x 50cm)
- *2 x squares of fabric approx 21¼ x 21¼in (53 x 53cm)
- *Sewing needle and thread

PILLOW

Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 4, join to first ch with a ss to form ring.

Rnd 1: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), 2dc in ring, ch 3, (3dc in ring, ch 3) three times, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rnd 2: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same 3-ch sp, ch 1, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in next 3-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * twice more, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rnd 3: Ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same sp for corner, ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in next 3-ch sp for corner, ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Break off yarn A.

Rnd 4: Join yarn B to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) twice, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) twice; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Break off yarn B.

Rnd 5: Join yarn A to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) three times, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) three times; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Break off yarn A.

Rnd 6: Join yarn B to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) four times, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) four times; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rnd 7: Ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rep rnd 7 once more.

Break off yarn B.

Rnd 9: Join yarn C to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Break off yarn C.

Rnd 10: Join yarn B to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Break off yarn B.

Join yarn C to any 3-ch corner sp.

Rnd 11: Ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, c h1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rep rnd 11 twice more, omitting the ss to next 3-ch sp on the last rnd. Break off yarn C.

Rnd 14: Join yarn D to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch. Break off yarn D.

Rnd 15: Join yarn C to any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Break off yarn C.

Join yarn D to any 3-ch corner sp.

Rnd 16: Ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) to next corner sp; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch, ss to next 3-ch sp.

Rep rnd 16 once more.

(If you wish to make your pillow/granny square bigger, repeat the last row, changing color as you wish until the piece is the desired size.)

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Weave in ends. Block lightly to shape. Sew crochet piece to front of a pillow of the right size, or make a pillow from fabric. Right sides facing, pin two 21¼ x 21¼ in (53 x 53cm) squares of fabric together. Taking a 5/8in (1.5cm) seam allowance, sew around all sides, leaving a hole big enough to stuff pillow if using toy stuffing, or leaving one side open if using pillow form. Stuff pillow or insert pillow form and sew up remaining hole neatly. Sew crocheted granny square to front of pillow with small whip stitches of yarn used to crochet final round.





Sausage Dog Draft Excluder

Keep your bedroom cozy on cold winter evenings by placing this dog by your door to stop drafts coming under it, or fill the dog with PVC beanbag granules and use him as a doorstop.

MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 27in (68.5cm) long

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 81yds (75m)—Sirdar Click Chunky with wool, 70% acrylic, 30% wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 148, bud

Yarn B: shade 163, really red

Yarn B: shade 171, blueberry

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any chunky weight yarn will do to achieve the same size dog, although you could use any weight of yarn and the dog will simply come out a different size.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook
- *Toy stuffing
- *Buttons and felt for features
- *Sewing needle and thread
- *Darning needle

DOG

Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 42sc

Rnd 8: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 48sc

Work 4 rows even in sc without increasing.

Change to yarn B and work 2 rows even.

Change to yarn C and work 2 rows even.

Change to yarn A and work 2 rows even.

Cont even on these 48sts until dog is approx 27in (68.5cm) long, striping as established, then if necessary, change back to yarn A.

Stuff body and then begin to decrease as folls:

Rnd 1: (Sc2tog, 6sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 42sc

Rnd 2: (Sc2tog, 5sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc

Rnd 3: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc


Rnd 4: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc

Rnd 6: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 7: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.







Heart Sachets

Lavender-filled sachets are fabulous for keeping drawers sweet-smelling, or you can place them on a radiator to infuse a whole room. These are perfect gifts for moms on Mother's Day or Valentine's Day.



MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 7in (18cm) at widest point and 61/2in (16.5cm) long.

YARN

1 x 13/4oz (50g) ball—approx 120yds (112m)—of Artesano Soft Merino Superwash DK, 100% merino superwash, in shade 2083, fuchsia

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do to achieve the same size heart, although you could use any weight of yarn and the sachet will simply come out a different size.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the lavender does not come out of the heart.

NOTIONS

- *Size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing or pvc beanbag beans infused with lavender oils or lavender pot pourri
- *Two pieces of fabric approx 7 x 7in (18 x18cm)

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces worked in the round, do not turn throughout.

HEART

(make 2)

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook, ch 3.

Rnd 1: 12hdc into first ch made.

Rnd 2: Ch 2 (counts as a hdc), 2hdc, 5dc into next st, (3hdc, 5dc into next st) twice, join rnd with a ss. 25 sts

Rnd 3: Ch 2 (counts as a hdc), (hdc to center dc of 5dc, 5dc into center dc) three times, hdc to end of rnd, join with a ss to top of first ch.

Rep last rnd twice more.

Rnd 6: Ch 1, *sc to one st before next dc, miss next st, 2 dc into each of next 5dc, miss one st, sc into next st; rep from * once more, sc to center dc of next 5dc, 5dc into center dc, sc to end of rnd.

Rnd 7: Ch 1, *sc to one st before next dc, miss next st, (2 dc into next st, 1 dc into next st) to next sc, miss one st, sc into next st; rep from * once more, sc to center dc of next 5dc, 5dc into center dc, sc to end of rnd.

Rnd 8: Ch 1, *sc to one st before next dc, miss next st, (2 dc into next st, 1 dc into each of next two sts) to next sc, miss one st, sc into next st; rep from * once more, sc to center dc of next 5dc, 5dc into center dc, sc to end of rnd.

Rnd 9: Ch 1, sc to one st before next dc, miss next st, (2 dc into next st, 1 dc into each of next three sts) to next sc, miss one st, ss into next st, miss next st, over next dcs work (2 dc into next st, 1 dc into each of next three sts), to next sc miss one st, sc to center dc of next 5dc, 5dc into center dc, sc to end of rnd.

Fasten off.



Advanced

Granny Square Blanket

Granny squares make a stunning and colorful blanket, which is also perfect for using up small scraps of yarn. You can also vary the size to create smaller or larger blankets.



MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 39 x 39in (100 x 100cm).

YARN

5 x 1¾oz (50g)—approx 490yds (450m)—Debbie Bliss Cashmerino Aran, 55% merino wool, 33% microfiber, 12% cashmere:

Yarn A: shade 101, cream

2 x 1¾oz (50g)—approx 196yds (180m)—Debbie Bliss Cashmerino Aran, 55% merino wool, 33% microfiber, 12% cashmere:

Yarn B: shade 502, green Yarn C: shade 033, orange

Yarn D: shade 43, light pink

Yarn E: shade 036, purple Yarn F: shade 205, teal

Yarn G: shade 038, dark pink

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any Aran or worsted weight yarns will make the same sized blanket, but you can use any weight of yarn that you wish. This project is perfect for scraps of leftover yarn, and they needn't even be exactly the same weight—so long as they are not too different in size, you can simply use a hook relevant to the heaviest yarn, and hook away!

GAUGE (TENSION)

Not essential, but each square is approx 4¾ x 4¾in (12 x 12cm) using a size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

*Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook

BASIC SQUARE

(make as many as required, blanket shown has 64)

You can use any color yarn you wish for the first two rounds of each square, but do not use yarn A for the third round.

Using any yarn and size H/8 (5mm) hook, ch 4, join to first ch with a ss to form ring.

Rnd 1: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), 2dc in ring, ch 3, (3dc in ring, ch 3) three times, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Fasten off yarn.

Attach next yarn to any 3-ch corner sp of rnd 1.

Rnd 2: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same 3-ch sp, ch 1, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in next 3-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * twice more, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Fasten off yarn.

Attach next yarn to any 3-ch corner sp of rnd 2.

Rnd 3: Ch 3 (counts as first dc), work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same sp

for corner, ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in next 3-ch sp for corner, ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Fasten off yarn.

Once all central squares have been made, block them all lightly and you can begin to join them with Yarn A.

FIRST SQUARE

Work 4th round complete as folls:

Rnd 4: Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, join yarn in any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) twice, *work (3dc, ch 3, 3dc) in next 3-ch corner sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) twice; rep from * around, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Now you will have one finished square. However, we are not going to finish each square like this, we are going to join the next square along one side to the first square as we go.

SECOND SQUARE

Work along one side of the square as for first square, then attach to first square as folls:

Rnd 4: Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, join yarn in any 3-ch corner sp, ch 3, work (2dc, ch 3, 3dc) all in same sp, ch 1, (3dc in next 1-ch sp, ch 1) twice, ch 1, work 3dc, ch 1 in next 3-ch corner sp, now ss into 2nd ch of any 3-ch corner ch of first square, with RSF, ch 1. Finish off second square corner with final 3dc in 3-ch corner sp of working square.

Now (ss into next 1-ch sp of first square, 3dc in next 1-ch sp of rnd 3 of the second square) twice, ss into next 1-ch sp of first square, 3dc in next 3-ch corner sp of rnd 3 of the second square, ch 1, ss into 2nd ch of next 3-ch of next corner ch of first square, ch 1.

Finish off second square corner with final 3dc in 3-ch corner sp of working square. Now finish off second square edging as a normal granny rnd; (ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp) twice, ch 1, work 3dc, ch 3 and 3dc in next corner sp, (ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp) twice, end ch 1, join rnd with sl st to top of first ch. Fasten off yarn.

Two squares joined.

Join next square to bottom of last square as you joined the first two squares, and continue in the same way until you have a strip of eight squares.

Join first square of next row to right side of top square as previous squares.

Second square of second row, work along one side of the square as usual, then attach to bottom side of first (top) square and right side of square from first row as folls:

Ss into 2nd ch of 3-ch corner ch of bottom right corner of square above, with RSF, ch 1. Finish off working square corner with final 3dc in 3-ch corner sp. Now (ss into next 1-ch sp of first square, 3dc in next 1-ch sp of working square) twice, ss into next 1-ch sp of first square, 3dc in next ch-3 corner sp of working square, ch 1, ss into 2nd ch of next corner ch of first square, ch 1. Finish off working square corner with final 3dc in corner sp.

Now attach working square of first strip by slip stitching into ch sps along joining sides while finishing last rnd of working square as before, then finish final edge, (ch 1, 3dc in next 1-ch sp) twice, end ch 1, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch. Fasten off yarn.

Continue to join squares in this way, along two sides, until eight squares have been joined in one long strip that is two squares wide.

Continue in this way until eight rows of strips eight squares long have been joined together.

FINISHING

Weave in all ends and block lightly to shape.





Zigzag Bolster

A crazily striped bolster for your bed. Have fun mixing and matching all your favorite colors.

MEASUREMENTS

Approx 14in (36cm) wide

YARN

1 x 13/4oz (50g) ball-approx 104yds (95m)-Sirdar Snuggly Baby Bamboo,

80% bamboo, 20% wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 144, tom thumb green

Yarn B: shade 157, yellow submarine

Yarn C: shade 149, scooter blue

Yarn D: shade 159, jack-in-the-box turquoise

Yarn E: shade 161, baby berries purple

Yarn F: shade 160, paint box pink

Yarn G: shade 162, toy box red

Yarn H: shade 126, rocking horse red

Yarn I: shade 134, babe pink

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will make the same-sized pillow. However, you could use long scraps of yarn of any weight, changing hook size to match, and the bolster will simply be different dimensions.

GAUGE (TENSION)

15 sts and 15 rows to 4in (10cm) in zigzag patt using size G/6 (4mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size G/6 (4mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing, or bolster pad measuring

151/2in (39cm) long and 191/2in (49cm) in circumference

*Two circles of fabric approx 6in (15cm) in diameter





Bootie Slippers

Simple slippers—which are easily adaptable for your size of foot—are brilliant for keeping your toes cozy while you watch tv, chat online, or do your homework.



MEASUREMENTS

Adjustable to fit your own foot size.

YARN

1 x 13/40z (50g) ball—approx 109yds (100m)—Rico Essentials Soft Merino Aran, 100% merino wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 020, light gray Yarn B: shade 041, eucalyptus Yarn C: shade 036, royal blue Yarn D: shade 050, pistachio Yarn E: shade 037, navy

ALTERNATIVE YARNS


Any Aran or worsted weight yarn will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

17sc and 16 rows to 4in (10cm) over sc using size H/8 (5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) and size C/2 (2.5mm) crochet hooks
- *Thick wool felt
- *Darning needle



SOLE

Draw around your foot onto a piece of paper to get the basic shape and size of the sole—if one foot is larger than the other, draw around the larger one. Round off the shape so that it flows smoothly, and make it symmetrical so that either slipper fits either foot. Cut two shapes from felt. Punch holes all round the edge of the felt using a sharp needle or the end of your small crochet hook. Space the holes 1/4 in (0.5cm) apart and 1/4in (0.5cm) in from the outside edge.

SLIPPER

Using the size C/2 (2.5mm) hook and yarn A, work 1sc into each of these holes evenly around the edge of the felt.

Join round with a ss to first sc.

Change to size H/8 (5mm) hook.

Work 5 further rounds of sc evenly on these sts in yarn A.

Rnd 7: Work in sc, decreasing 5 sts evenly over toe sts.

Change to yarn B and work one row even in sc without decreasing.

Change to yarn C.

Rnd 9: Work in sc, decreasing 5 sts evenly over toe sts.

Change to yarn D and work one row even in sc without decreasing.

Change to yarn E.

Rnd 11: Work in sc, decreasing 5 sts evenly over toe sts.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING


Sew up seam from toe for 2in (5cm).





Storage Jars

Make these covers for jars, vases, and tins to store pens, pencils, crochet hooks—or fill them with water to display flowers with colorful style.



To fit tubular storage containers of approx 2in, 2¾in, and 3½in (5cm, 7cm, and 9cm) in diameter, and of any height.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 120yds (112m)—of Artesano Soft Merino Superwash DK, 100% merino superwash, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 1291, sea blue Yarn B: shade 5167, teal Yarn C: shade 2083, fuchsia

Yarn D: shade 6315, lime green Yarn E: shade SFN10, cream

Yarn F: shade 7254, sand yellow

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do here, oddments and leftovers from other projects are perfect for the odd stripes.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Approx 18 sts and 26 rows to 4in (10cm) in sc using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook or size required to obtain correct gauge.

NOTIONS

- *Size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Assorted jars and containers

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces are worked in the round, do not turn throughout.



COVER

Begin all jars from rnd 1. For 2in (5cm) jar, work to rnd 5 and then work from the all sizes instruction; for 2¾in (7cm) jar, work to rnd 7 and then work from all sizes instruction; and for 3½in (9 cm) jar, work all rows before completing from all sizes instruction.

Begin with yarn A and then work 1 or 2 row stripes alternately of all colors. Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch, join into round with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each st around join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 3: (1sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (2sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (3sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (4sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (5sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 42sc

Rnd 8: (6sc, work 2sc into next st) around, join rnd with a ss. 48sc

Rnd 8: (7sc, work 2sc into next st) around, join rnd with a ss. 54sc

Rnd 8: (8sc, work 2sc into next st) around, join rnd with a ss. 60sc

ALL SIZES:

Work 1 rnd even in sc(blo), join rnd with a ss.

Continue even in sc on these sts until desired height of jar is reached, striping as you wish.

Fasten off yarn.





Playtime





Cakes

These little cakes look so sweet you'll find it hard to believe you can't eat them.

MEASUREMENTS

Cupcake approx 4in (10cm) diameter.

Donut approx 43/4in (12cm) diameter.

Sponge cake approx 2½in (6cm) diameter and 3½in (9cm) tall.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 137yds (125m)—Millamia Merino, 100% merino, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 160, fawn

Yarn B: shade 122, petal

Yarn C: shade 104, claret

Yarn D: shade 124, snow

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do here but as gauge is not essential, you could try any yarn and the cakes will just come out different sizes. You could also try some metallic yarns for sparkle, or stripe up the colors for different patterns.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Sewing needle and thread
- *Beads and buttons for decoration
- *Toy stuffing

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds unless otherwise stated. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.

CUPCAKE

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch, join into round with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each st around join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 3: (1sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (2sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (3sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (4sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (5sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 42sc

Rnd 8: (6sc, work 2sc into next st) around, join rnd with a ss. 48sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc(blo), join rnd with a ss.

Work even in sc for seven more rnds, in spirals, do not join rnds.

Next rnd: *Ch 3, ss(tfl) of next st; rep from * all round, join rnd with a ss.

Fasten off yarn A.

Join yarn B to the unworked back loop in any st of last sc rnd.

Next row: Work sc(blo) into each unworked back loop of last sc rnd, join rnd with a ss.

Work four rnds even in sc in spirals, do not join rounds.

Next row: (6sc, sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 42sc

Work one rnd even without shaping.

Next row: (5sc, sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc

Work one rnd even without shaping.

Next row: (4sc, sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Work one rnd even without shaping.

Begin to stuff cake to shape, filling until desired fullness.

Next row: (3sc, sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Next row: (2sc, sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc

Next row: (1sc, sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Next row: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Sew round rem hole and pull up to secure.



SPONGE CAKE

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn B, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each st around join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 3: (1sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (2sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (3sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (4sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (5sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 42sc

Rnd 8: (6sc, work 2sc into next st) around. 48sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc(blo).

Work even in sc(blo) for seven more rnds.

Change to yarn D and work even in sc(blo) for two more rnds.

Change to yarn C and work one rnd even in sc.

Change to yarn D and work even in sc(blo) for two more rnds.

Change to yarn B and work even in sc(blo) for five more rnds.

Next rnd: *6sc(blo), sc2tog(blo); rep from * around. 42sc

Begin to stuff cake to desired fullness.

Next rnd: (5sc, sc2tog) around. 36sc

Next rnd: (4sc, sc2tog) around. 30sc

Next rnd: (3sc, sc2tog) around. 24sc

Next rnd: (2sc, sc2tog) around. 18sc

Next rnd: (1sc, sc2tog) around. 12sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog) around. 6sc

Sew round rem hole and pull up to secure.

FINISHING

Sew sprinkles on top of cake with contrast yarn or thread or use bugle beads, if decoration is desired.



DONUT

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 65, join into ring with a ss into first ch, being careful not to twist the chain.

Rnd 1: Ch 1, sc into each ch to end of rnd, join to first ch with a ss.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc(blo) to end of rnd, join to first ch with a ss.

Work last rnd five times more.

Change to yarn C.

Next rnd: Ch 1, sc into each st to end of rnd, join to first ch with a ss.

Work last round nine times more.

Fasten off.

FINISHING

Sew top edge to bottom edge, without twisting, to form donut, leaving a space for stuffing. Stuff donut to desired fullness, then sew up rem seam.

Decorate with colorful bugle beads or sew on contrasting yarn dashes for sprinkles if desired.





Candy

Fun-to-make pieces of candy that use metallic and bright yarns to represent the colorful and shiny wrappers.



One size, each piece of candy is approx 4in (10cm) long.

YARN

Yarn A

1 x 3½oz (100g) ball—approx 306yds (280m)—DMC Petra no 3, 100% long staple cotton, in each of: Shade 5742, yellow Shade 53845, blue Shade 5907, green

Yarn B

Shade 53805, pink

1 x ¾oz (20g) ball—approx 164yds (150m)—DMC Metallic Crochet Thread, 60% viscose, 40% metalized polyester, in each of: Shade L677, gold Shade L796, blue

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any number 5 weight crochet cotton will make candy of this dimension, although you can use any weight of yarn and the candy will just come out different sizes.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing

PATTERN NOTES

Candy is worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.



CANDY

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and any yarn A, ch 20, join into a ring with a ss to first ch.

Rnd 1: Ch 1, sc into each st to end of rnd.

Rnd 2: Sc into each st around.

Rep last row until candy measures approx 3in (8cm) long.

Fasten off yarn.

Join any yarn B to one open edge of candy.

Next rnd: Ch 1, skip 1 sc, 5dc into next st, *skip 1 sc, sc into next st, skip 1 sc, 5dc into next st, rep from * to last st, skip last sc, ss into first ch to join rnd.

Rep last round at opposite end of candy.

FINISHING

Weave in all ends.

Thread a piece of yarn in and out of the stitches all round one end of candy, approx 1in (2.5cm) in from end, pull up thread tightly to draw in end of candy and fasten off securely.

Stuff candy to desired fullness, then sew round opposite end of candy in same way as first end, approx 1in (2.5cm) in from end.





Pirate's Parrot and Eye Patch

A fun dressing-up outfit; attach the parrot to your shoulder and go in search of some gold!

MEASUREMENTS

One size; parrot approx 4¾in (12cm) high.

Eyepatch approx 3in (8cm) at widest point.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g)—136yds (125m)— Anchor Style Creativa Fino, 100% cotton, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 01330, apple green

Yarn B: shade 01320, pink Yarn C: shade 00108, lilac

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any 4ply or sportweight yarn or crochet cotton will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Toy stuffing
- *Two buttons for eyes
- *Fabric to line eye patch
- *Darning needle
- *Sewing needle and thread
- *Large safety pin for pinning parrot to shirt

PATTERN NOTES

Parrot is worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round. Begin from top of head.

Eye patch worked in the round, join rounds with slip stitches.

PARROT HEAD AND BODY

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 42sc

Rnd 8: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around. 48sc

Work 2 rnds even in sc.

Rnd 11: (Work 2sc into next st, 7sc) around. 54sc

Work 4 rnds even in sc.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 16: (Sc2tog, 7sc) around. 48sc

Work 2 rnds even in sc.

Rnd 19: (Sc2tog, 6sc) around. 42sc

Work 3 rnds even in sc.

Rnd 23: (Sc2tog, 5sc) around. 36sc

Work 3 rnds even in sc.

Rnd 27: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around,. 30sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc.

Change to yarn B and work 2 rnds even in sc.

Begin to stuff from now.

Rnd 31: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around. 24sc



Work three rnds even in sc.

Rnd 35: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around. 18sc

Work three rnds even in sc.

Rnd 39: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd

with a ss. 12sc

Add more stuffing as necessary.

Rnd 40: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with

a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn.

HEAD FEATHERS

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 14.

Row 1: Work 1sc into 2nd ch from hook, 1 sc into each ch to end of row.

13sts

Row 2: Ch 1, (skip next st, (3tr, ch 1, 3tr) into next st, skip next st, 1sc into next st) 3 times.

Fasten off yarn.

BEAK

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn C, ch 12 and join into a ring with a ss to first ch.

Row 1: Ch 1, 1sc into each ch around, join round with a ss.

Rep last row 4 more times.

Next rnd: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn leaving long tail.



WING

(make 2)

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn C, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) to last 3 sts, 3dc into next st, 2sc. 25sts

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) to 3dc of previous row, sc into first dc, 3dc into next st, sc into each st to end of row. 32sts

Fasten off yarn.

TAIL FEATHERS

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn C, ch 7.

Row 1: Sc into 2nd ch from hook, sc into each ch to end. 6sc

Row 2: Ch 1, sc into each st to end of row.

Rep last row 4 times more, then increase 1 st at both ends of next 3 rows. 12sc

Next row: Ch 1, *skip next st, 3dc into next st, skip next st, sc into next st; rep from * to end of row.

Next row: Ch 1, 3dc into sc, *dc into center dc of next 3dc, 3dc into sc;

rep from * to end of row.

Next row: Ch 1, dc into center dc of next 3dc, *3dc into sc, dc into center dc of next 3dc; rep from * across row. Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew head feathers to top of parrot's head and tail feathers to tail end of body. Sew a wing to each side of body. Use tail of yarn to sew beak to parrot's face.

EYE PATCH


Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 6 and join into a ring with a ss to first ch.

Rnd 1: Ch 3, (2tr, ch 3) into ring, (3tr, ch 3) into ring twice more, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.


Rnd 2: Ss to next 3-ch sp, (ch 3, 2tr, ch 3, 3tr) all into 3-ch sp, *ch 1, (3tr, ch 1, 3tr) all into next 3-ch sp; rep from * once more, ch 1, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Rnd 3: Ss to next 3-ch sp, (ch 3, 2tr, ch 3, 3tr) all into 3-ch sp, *ch 1, 3tr into next 1-ch sp, ch 1, (3tr, ch 1, 3tr) all into next 3-ch sp; rep from * once more, ch 1, 3tr into next 1-ch sp, ch 1, join rnd with a ss to top of first ch.

Fasten off yarn.







Rag Doll

A basic floppy rag doll that you can adapt and embellish to make your own unique character—make outfits for her, change her hair, or give her a different expression.

MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 12in (30cm) tall.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 142yds (130m)—of Sirdar Simply Recycled DK, 51% recycled cotton, 40% acrylic, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 11, canvas

Yarn B: shade 16, denim wash

Yarn C: shade 13, clay

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will achieve the same size doll, although you could use any weight of yarn and the toy will simply come out a different size.

GAUGE (TENSION)


Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Toy stuffing
- *Two buttons for eyes
- *Fabric for dress
- *Darning needle
- *Sewing needle and thread

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals (apart from legs), do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.



Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 42sc

Rnd 8: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around. 48sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 10: (Work 2sc into next st, 7sc) around. 54sc

Work eight rnds even in sc without increasing.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 19: (Sc2tog, 7sc) around. 48sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 21: (Sc2tog, 6sc) around. 42sc

Rnd 22: (Sc2tog, 5sc) around. 36sc

Rnd 23: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around. 30sc

Stuff head fully.

Work even in sc in spirals on these 30sts until body is approx 3½in (9cm) long.

Stuff body as necessary, ensuring head does not flop.

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around. 24sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around. 18sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around. 12sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog) around. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

ARMS

(make 2)

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 10sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 15sc

Work even in sc in spirals on these 15sts until arm is approx 3in (8cm) long.



Stuff arm to desired fullness.

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around. 10sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog) around. 5sc

Sew up rem hole.

LEGS

(make 2)

Work in rnds, joining each round with a ss.

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn B, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around, join rnd with a ss. 10sc

Rnd 3: Work 2sc into each sc around, join rnd with a ss. 20sc

Work even in sc, joining each round, on these 20sts for a further 6 rnds without increasing.

Change to yarn B and work 3 rnds even.

Change to yarn A and work 3 rnds even.

Cont even on these stitches for a further 4¾in (12cm), in 3-rnd stripes alternately of yarn A and B.

Fasten off yarn.

Stuff legs and sew up tops.

FINISHING

Sew one arm to either side of body, just underneath neck. Sew legs to bottom of body. Embroider face onto doll.

HAIR

Cut 18 lengths of yarn C approximately 20in (50cm) long. Holding lengths together, tie a knot ¾in (2cm) on either side of center of lengths. Plait both ends of yarn beyond knots and secure with small strips of same fabric as dress, tied into a bow. Stitch center of hair to top of head.

DRESS

Cut out two rectangles of fabric approximately 4½in (11cm) long and slightly wider than the body of the doll. Hem bottom and top, then sew one side seam. Wrap dress around doll's body, under arms, and sew up side seam. Sew to body to secure.





Princess Tiara

A simple-to-make tiara fit for any little princess. I've sewn on pearls, but you can use beads or sew-on jewels if you prefer.



MEASUREMENTS

Purchase headband to fit wearer's head; crocheted section is approx ¾in (2cm) high.

YARN

1 x ¾oz (20g) ball—approx 164yds (150m)—DMC Metallic Crochet Thread, 60% viscose, 40% metalized polyester, in shade L168, silver

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any similar weight metallic crochet thread will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project.

NOTIONS

- *Size C/2 (2.75mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Headband
- *Beads for embellishment
- *Beading needle and thread

TIARA

Using size C/2 (2.75mm) hook, attach yarn to headband and work 42sc around the center section of the headband, turn.

Next row: Sc, (ch 5, skip 3sts, sc into next st) five times, ch 6, skip 4sts, sc into next st, ch 7, skip 5sts, sc into next st, ch 6, skip 4sts, sc into next st, (ch 5, skip 3sts, sc into next st) five times, turn.

Next row: (Work 7sc into next 5-ch sp, ss into sc) five times, 9sc into next ch sp, ss into sc, 11sc into next ch sp, ss into sc, 9sc into next ch sp, ss into sc (work 7sc into next 5-ch sp, ss into sc) five times.

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew on beads as desired.



Juggling Balls

Crocheted balls are fabulous for playing games such as Piggy in the Middle or Hacky Sack, and are perfect for learning to juggle. You can stuff these with toy stuffing or for more weight when juggling, fill with beans or PVC beanbag granules.



MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 2½in (6cm) in diameter.

YARN

1 x 3½oz (100g) ball—approx 437yds (400m)—DMC Petra no 5, 100% long staple cotton, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 5742, yellow Yarn B: shade 54230, blue Yarn C: shade 5907, green

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any no 5 weight crochet cotton will do here for balls of this dimension, although you can use any weight of yarn and the balls will just come out different sizes.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project, but ensure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not come through the stitches.

NOTIONS

- *Size B/1 (2.25mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing or PVC beanbag beans

PATTERN NOTES

Balls are worked entirely in the round, do not turn work. Begin stuffing ball from rnd 24 to ensure an evenly filled ball. Work 2 rows of each color alternately, or in any order you desire.

BALL

Using size B/1 (2.25mm) crochet hook and any color, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, ss to join rnd.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, work 2sc into each sc around, ss to join rnd. 12sc

Rnd 3: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around, ss to join rnd. 18sc

Rnd 4: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around, ss to join rnd. 24sc

Rnd 5: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around, ss to join rnd. 30sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 7: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around, ss to join rnd. 36sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 8: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around, ss to join rnd. 42sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 9: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around, ss to join rnd. 48sc

Work nine rnds even in sc without increasing.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 19: Ch 1, (sc2tog, 6sc) around, ss to join rnd. 42sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 21: Ch 1, (sc2tog, 5sc) around, ss to join rnd. 36sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 23: Ch 1, (sc2tog, 4sc) around, ss to join rnd. 30sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing. Begin stuffing ball.

Rnd 25: Ch 1, (sc2tog, 3sc) around, ss to join rnd. 24sc

Rnd 26: Ch 1, (sc2tog, 2sc) around, ss to join rnd. 18sc

Rnd 27: Ch 1, (sc2tog, 1sc) around, ss to join rnd. 12sc

Rnd 28: Decrease (sc2tog) evenly all round. 6sc

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING


Add more stuffing then sew up final hole to secure.

Bear

The embellishment, ears, and face of this adorable bear can all be easily changed to make other very sweet animals.



MEASUREMENTS

One size, approx 93/4in (25cm) tall.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 120yds (112m)—of Artesano Soft Merino Superwash DK, 100% merino superwash in each of:

Yarn A: shade 8413, baby peach Yarn B: shade 7254, sand yellow

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will do here to achieve the same size bear, although you could use any weight of yarn and the toy will simply come out a different size.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing
- *Two buttons for eyes

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds except for body. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, move marker up every round.

HEAD AND BODY

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made. Do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 8: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 42sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 10: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around. 48sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 12: (Work 2sc into next st, 7sc) around. 54sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 14: (Work 2sc into next st, 8sc) around. 60sc

Work eight rnds even in sc without increasing.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 23: (Sc2tog, 8sc) around. 54sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 25: (Sc2tog, 7sc) around. 48sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 27: (Sc2tog, 6sc) around. 42sc



Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 29: (Sc2tog, 5sc) around. 36sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 31: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around. 30sc

Rnd 32: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around. 24sc

Stuff head fully.

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing, join rnd with a ss.

Begin to work in separate rounds, joining at the end of each.

Rnd 34: Ch 1 (work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Change to yarn B.

Rnd 35: Work even in sc without increasing, join rnd with a ss. Change to yarn A.



Rnd 36: Ch 1, (work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing, join rnd with a ss.

Change to yarn B and work 2 rnds even in sc.

Cont even in sc, working 2-row stripes alternately of yarns A and B until body measures approx 21/4 in (5.5cm).

Stuff body, ensuring enough stuffing is inserted to prevent head from drooping.

Begin to decrease, continuing in 2-row stripes alternately of yarns A and B, continuing to stuff body as necessary.

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around. 30sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around. 24sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around. 18sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around. 12sc

Next rnd: (Sc2tog) around. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

LEG

(make two)

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made. Do not join rnd, but work in spirals.

Rnds 2-3: Work 2sc into each sc around. 20sc

Change to yarn B and work even in sc for eight rnds.

Stuff leg.

Next rnd: (Sc2tog) around. 10sc

Work even in sc for two rnds, continuing to stuff leg as necessary.

Decrease around until you cannot decrease any more.

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

ARM

(make two)

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made, do not join rnd, but work in spirals.

Rnds 2-3: Work 2sc into each sc around. 20sc

Change to yarn B and work even in sc for five rnds.

Stuff arm.

Decrease around until you cannot decrease any more.

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

EAR

(make two)

Using size E/4 (3.5mm) hook and yarn B, ch 2.

Row 1: Work 3sc into first ch made, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, work 2sc into each sc around, turn. 6sc

Row 3: Ch 1, (1sc, 2sc into next st) around, turn. 9sc

Row 4: Ch 1, (2sc, 2sc into next st) around, turn. 12sc

Row 4: Ch 1, (3sc, 2sc into next st) around, turn. 15sc

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew arms to sides of body and legs to bottom of body.

Sew ears to sides of head and sew on buttons for eyes and embroider a nose and smile on the face.





Mushroom

A fun mushroom for decoration or to play with. Sewing on a face makes it into a cute creature.



MEASUREMENTS

Approx 4in (10cm) high.

YARN

1 x 1¾oz (50g) ball—approx 81yds (75m)—Sirdar Click Chunky with wool, 70% acrylic, 30% wool, in each of:

Yarn A: shade 142, lamb Yarn B: shade 163, really red

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any chunky yarn will do to achieve the same size mushroom, although you could use any weight of yarn and the toy will simply come out a different size.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size H/8 (5mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing
- *Buttons for decoration
- *Scraps of yarn for embroidery

PATTERN NOTES

Mushroom is worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.

MUSHROOM

Using size H/8 (5mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around, 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc(blo), join rnd with a ss.

Work even in sc for five more rnds, in spirals, do not join rnds.

Next row: (3sc, sc2tog) around. 24sc

Work one row even in sc.

Next row: (2sc, sc2tog) around. 18sc

Fasten off yarn A, join in yarn B.

Stuff base of mushroom before crocheting cap.

Work one row even in sc.

Next row: Work 2sc into each sc around. 36sc

Next row: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 54sc

Work three rows even in sc(blo).

Begin to decrease as folls:

Row 1: (4sc, sc2tog) around. 45sc

Work 1 row even in sc. Begin to stuff cap.

Row 3: (3sc, sc2tog) around. 36sc

Row 4: (2sc, sc2tog) around. 27sc

Row 5: (Sc, sc2tog) around. 18sc

Sc2tog around until hole closed.



Yarn A: shade 141, grass

Yarn B: shade 142, daisy yellow

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any 4ply or sportweight yarn will do to achieve the same size frog, although you could use any weight of yarn and the toy will simply come out a different size.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Toy stuffing
- *Felt for feet
- *Darning needle
- *Sewing needle and thread

PATTERN NOTES

Body and head are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds unless instructed to. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round. Begin from top of head.

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 42sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc.

Rnd 9: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around. 48sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc.

Rnd 11: (Work 2sc into next st, 7sc) around. 54sc

Work 1 rnd even in sc.

Rnd 27: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Work four rnds even. Begin to stuff head from now.

Rnd 32: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 36sc

Rnd 33: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 42sc

Work four rnds even.

Rnd 38: (Sc2tog, 5sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc

Rnd 39: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Stuff body.

Work 1 rnd even in sc, then 1 rnd even in sc(blo).

Rnd 42: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Rnd 43: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc

Rnd 44: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 45: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up any hole left.

EYE

(make two)

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Change to yarn B and work 2 rnds even in sc.

Rnd 6: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Stuff eye.

Rnd 7: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up any hole left.

TUMMY

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn B, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 18sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 30sc

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew eyes to top of head and tummy to body.

Embroider face with yarn B.

Cut out some webbed feet from the felt and sew to bottom of body.

This perky penguin is just calling to have his tummy squished! Why not try making him a scarf to keep him warm at the South Pole?

Yarn A: shade 101, midnight navy Yarn B: shade 142, daisy yellow Yarn C: shade 124, snow white

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any 4ply or sportweight yarn will do here to achieve the same size penguin, although you could use any weight of yarn and the toy will simply come out a different size. The embellishments use very little yarn, so you can use scraps from other projects.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Stitch marker
- *Darning needle
- *Toy stuffing
- *Buttons for eyes

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces are worked flat and the body and beak are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Rounds worked in spirals—do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.

HEAD AND BODY

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 7sc into first ch made, do not join rnd.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around. 14sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around. 21sc

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 28sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 35sc

Work five rnds even in sc without increasing.

Begin to decrease as follows:

Rnd 11: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around. 28sc

Rnd 12: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around. 21sc

Stuff head fully.

Work two rnds even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 15: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around. 28sc

Rnd 16: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around. 35sc

Rnd 17: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around. 42sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 19: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around. 49sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 21: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around. 56sc

Work one rnd even in sc without increasing.

Rnd 22: (Work 2sc into next st, 7sc) around. 63sc

Work three rnds even in sc without increasing.

Begin to decrease, as follows:

Rnd 26: (Sc2tog, 7sc) around. 56sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 28: (Sc2tog, 6sc) around. 49sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing.

Rnd 30: (Sc2tog, 5sc) around. 42sc

Work one rnd even in sc without decreasing. Begin to stuff body.

Rnd 32: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around. 35sc

Rnd 33: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around. 28sc

Rnd 34: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around. 21sc

Rnd 35: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around. 14sc

Rnd 36: (Sc2tog) around. 7sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.



FOOT

(make two)

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn B, ch 4.

Row 1: Work 1sc into 2nd ch from hook, sc into each ch to end, turn. 3sc

Row 2: Ch 1, work 2sc into first st, sc, 2sc into last st, turn. 5sc

Row 3: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, work 2sc into first st, sc, 2sc into last st, turn. 7sc

Row 5: Ch 1, sc to end of row.

Fasten off yarn.

WING

(make two)

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn A, ch 3.

Row 1: Work 1 sc into 2nd ch from hook, sc into next chain, turn. 2sc

Row 2: Ch 1, work 2sc into first st, 2sc into last st, turn. 4sc

Row 3: Ch 1, work 2sc into first st, 2sc, 2sc into last st, turn. 6sc

Row 4-6: Ch 1, sc to end of row, turn.

Fasten off yarn.

BEAK

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn B, ch 3.

Work in the round in spirals.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into 2nd ch from hook, do not turn.

Work 1 rnd even.

Rnd 3: Work 2sc into each sc around. 10sc

Fasten off yarn.

TUMMY

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook and yarn C, ch 2.

Work in the round in spirals.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into 2nd ch from hook, do not turn.





ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will work well for this project.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) and size E/4 (3.5mm) crochet hooks
- *Darning needle
- *Sewing needle and thread
- *Toy stuffing
- *Felt for claws
- *Two buttons for eyes
- *Oddments of yarn for embellishment

PATTERN NOTES

The body and head are worked in rounds—join with a ss and do not turn. The tail is worked in the round in spirals—do not turn and and do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 42sc

Work one rnd even without decreasing. Begin to stuff head from now.

Rnd 31: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc

Rnd 32: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 33: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc





1 x 134oz (50g) ball—approx 104yds (95m)—Sirdar Snuggly Baby Bamboo DK, 80% bamboo, 20% wool, in each of: Yarn A: shade 128, tigger

Yarn B: shade 154, poppy Yarn C: shade 134, babe (only very small amounts used, scraps of other yarns are fine to use here)

ALTERNATIVE YARNS

Any DK or light worsted weight yarn will make the same sized cat, but try other weights for different-sized toys.

GAUGE (TENSION)

Exact gauge isn't essential for this project but make sure that you crochet tightly so that the stuffing does not show.

NOTIONS

- *Size D/3 (3.25mm) crochet hook
- *Darning needle
- *Sewing needle and thread
- *Toy stuffing
- *Felt for ears
- *Two buttons for eyes
- *Oddments of yarn for embellishment

PATTERN NOTES

Pieces are worked in the round, do not turn throughout. Head and body are worked in completed rounds. Arms, legs and tail are worked in spirals—for these, do not join rounds. Place a marker in first stitch of round to mark beginning of rounds and count rounds, moving marker up every round.



HEAD

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 3: (Work 2sc into next st, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc Change to yarn B.

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc Change to yarn A.

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc Work seven rnds even in sc without increasing, continuing in alternate 2-row stripes of yarns A and B.

Begin to decrease, continuing to work in stripes as established, as follows:

Rnd 14: (Sc2tog, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Rnd 15: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Begin to stuff head from now.

Rnd 17: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 18: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

Change to yarn B.

Rnd 4: (Work 2sc into next st, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Rnd 5: (Work 2sc into next st, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 30sc

Change to yarn A.

Rnd 6: (Work 2sc into next st, 4sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 36sc

Rnd 7: (Work 2sc into next st, 5sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 42sc

Change to yarn B.

Rnd 8: (Work 2sc into next st, 6sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 48sc

Work eight rnds even in sc without increasing, continuing in alternate 2-row stripes of yarns A and B.

Rnd 20: (Sc2tog, 3sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 24sc

Begin to stuff head from now.

Rnd 21: (Sc2tog, 2sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 18sc

Rnd 22: (Sc2tog, 1sc) around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Rnd 23: (Sc2tog) around, join rnd with a ss. 6sc

Fasten off yarn and sew up final hole to secure.

ARM

(make two)

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made. Do not join rnd.

Work even in sc in spirals on these 5 sts until arm is approx ¾in (2cm) long. Fasten off yarn.



LEG

(make two)

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made. Do not join rnd.

Work even in sc in spirals on these 5 sts until leg is approx 1in (2.5cm) long.

Fasten off yarn.

TAIL

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn A, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 5sc into first ch made. Do not join rnd.

Work even in sc in spirals on these 5 sts until tail is approx 3in (8cm) long.

Fasten off yarn.

NOSE

Using size D/3 (3.25mm) hook and yarn C, ch 2.

Rnd 1: Work 6sc into first ch made, join rnd with a ss.

Rnd 2: Work 2sc into each sc around, join rnd with a ss. 12sc

Fasten off yarn.

FINISHING

Sew head to body, with first rnds you made facing front, so that stripes appear as circles on the face and tummy. Sew arms to body, just below neck. Sew legs to bottom of body. Sew on tail at back of body.

Sew nose circle to front of face and embroider nose, mouth, and whiskers with simple straight stitches. Sew on buttons for eyes. Cut out felt ears and sew to top of head.
