NEWS OF INDIVIDUALS

Victoria Goddard, anthropology lecturer at Goldsmiths College, has been awarded a prestigious National Teaching Fellowship, worth £50,000, by the Higher Education Academy. The scheme rewards excellence in university teaching, and Victoria is the first anthropologist to receive such a fellowship, one of fifty awarded in 2004. Jointly with Goldsmiths anthropology postgraduate Bonnie VandeSteeg, she has been involved in researching first-year student experiences at Goldsmiths College. The research has been funded by C-SAP, the Centre for Learning and Teaching Sociology, Anthropology and Politics. The fellowship will be used to extend and develop this research.

CAREER PATHS AND TRAINING NEEDS OF **ANTHROPOLOGY RESEARCH STUDENTS**

Jonathan Spencer, David Mills and Anne Jepson report on ESRC-funded research into the training and careers of social anthropologists:

In the first phase of this research we have sought to track down and make contact with everyone who completed a PhD in a UK anthropology department between 1992 and 2002. In order to locate people, we have made use both of personal knowledge networks (academic supervisors and student peers) and targeted Google searches. Those working in academia are relatively easy to find, but those who have left to, for example, bring up a family, are harder to trace. Seven hundred theses were completed over this 10-year period, and we have email or address details for 80% of people.

During the 1990s UK departments doubled their rate of PhD production, and an increasing majority of these doctoral candidates are women. Two-thirds of our cohort work in higher education, one-third of whom are post-docs or in research positions. About 10% are in 'development' jobs. About 20% are in a range of other public and private sector jobs (civil service research, ministerial advisors, ethnographic consultancy, and fiction writing to name but a few of the paths taken). Just under half are working outside the UK. We are trying to find out as much as possible about these people - who they are, where they come from, where they are now, and what they see as the relationship (or lack of same) between what they now do and what they learned in the course of their postgraduate work.

In order to build up a robust picture we need to hear from as many people in this cohort as possible. If you have been sent a questionnaire, and have not yet had a chance to fill it in, we would be most grateful if you could do so before the end of September 2004. If we haven't been in touch, it is probably because we haven't got your contact details - please do email anne.jepson@ed.ac.uk for a questionnaire.

CIA SEEKS ANTHROPOLOGISTS

In a speech on 16.09.2003, the Deputy Director of the CIA said that 'our Intelligence Community could staff several small universities in nearly every discipline from the hard sciences, to history, political science, jurisprudence, psychology and anthropology' (www.cia.gov/cia/public affairs/speeches/ 2003/John_mcLaughlin09152003.html). With the Iraq war now blamed largely on intelligence agencies, new initiatives are under way to improve intelligence gathering, in the formulation of which anthropologists play a role (and for which they are also deemed desirable candidates). A new programme, called Pat Roberts Intelligence Scholars, 'is the brainchild of Felix Moos, a K[entucky]

U[niversity] professor of anthropology [formerly at the Naval War College], and is part of an effort to attract qualified candidates to the field of intelligence-gathering, especially in targeted areas of the world, including Afghanistan, the Middle East, Korea and China.' Endorsed by the chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, this initiative is aimed at correcting the US intelligence community's weaknesses by financing undergraduates and graduates through university by as much as US\$50,000 a head per annum, in exchange for working for the CIA. Before signing up to this programme (www.cia.gov/employment/jobs/ roberts program.html) candidates may ask themeselves some questions: 1. would improved intelligence have prevented the Iraq war? 2. if dabbling in intelligence gathering is ethically problematic for most professional anthropologists, what is to be gained by recruiting undergraduates to this task? 3.
