The Fellowship's webmaster began publishing the meeting minutes of the Board and of the Executive and Ecclesiastical Councils on the official website, which had become a source of much information, including the Heindel books and Rosicrucian Fellowship pamphlets 2002 Mar. 7 By decision of the Board these corporate minutes became password protected, but the legal documents, such as the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws could be examined by anyone at the website without a pass-word. The Board decided to publish a periodic treasurer's report in Echoes. Apr. 2 As an economy move to save money on postage, the Executive Council voted to downsize the Echoes which had grown to an eightpage format with photos, by limiting it to a maximum of four pages. July 13 Kenneth Ray resigned from his position as Head of Grounds and Maintenance in order to devote all of his time to the development of the Max and Augusta Heindel Memorial Garden. A market recession and impending financial problems forced radical summer cut-backs. The Board explored many cost-saving and revenue-producing ideas including the possibility of selling or leasing 4.5 acres of land purchased in 1925. 2003 Oct. Kenneth and Elizabeth Ray resigned from their respective jobs of Gardens Volunteer and Esoteric Secretary. autumn Political moves by the Spaniard Francisco Nacher resulted in a board majority that orchestrated the November 24 abrupt dismissal, expulsion and eviction of Charles Weber who had been editor of the Rays From the Rose Cross magazine for 9 years and was head of Grounds and Maintenance. Subsequently, about 10 other loyal workers were discharged from their positions of employment, and Headquarters ceased publication of the Rays magazine. 2004 June Nadine de Galzain brought suit against The Rosicrucian Fellowship and the Board of Trustees; the Board was legally dissolved, and a re tired Judge was appointed as mediator. A new interim board of six members, three people from each side, was established to conduct the business of the Fellowship until a new Board could be elected. It was decided that the ongoing "proposed bylaws election" be recognized as valid. The voting probationers would either accept or reject the proposed bylaws. The administration sold four very large palm trees, which landscapers removed from the grounds and hauled away on June 8, 2004. July The members approved the new bylaws by majority vote. Dec. The Board signed a letter of intent to give land developer and builder, Dan Jensen, a 99-year lease of several acres of prime Mount Ecclesia land for development of high-density condominiums. Dec. Mount. Ecclesia received a donation of \$12,000. 2005 Ian. Mount Ecclesia received a legacy of \$93,800. A new nine-member board was elected on February 28 to begin in Feb. April. Member terms expire after one, two, or three years depending on rank as determined by the number of votes received. All members will serve 3 months longer than specified by the bylaws with terms expiring in July, since this election was conducted early as dictated by the mediation agreement.

2005 Dec.

From July to December Charles Weber digitized and loaded 52 issues of *Rays from the Rose Cross magazine*, which he had originally edited, into his newly established website, www.rosecrossrays.com. Late in December he received a letter from the Fellowship's attorney ordering him to immediately remove the Rays from his website and stop using the RF emblem. These issues were removed from the site.

2006 July

With help from several members, Charles Weber completed a project to digitize and format the *Echoes* and *Rays* from 1913-1919 and he placed these on his website.

Oct. 22

The Board of Trustees removed Danielle Chavalarias and Virgilio Rodriguez from their respective positions as Chairman of the Board/Vice President and President. Members of the Chavalarias, Rodriguez, and Manimat families were dismissed from employment and ordered to vacate their cottages by December 31. D. Chavalarias and V. Rodriguez, however, retained their positions as board trustees. The new officers: Alexandra Porter, Chairman; Renate Shoemacker, President; Luis Blanco, Vice President; Gustavo van Humbeeck, Corporate Secretary; Madeline Burgess, Treasurer.

autumn

The staff at Mount Ecclesia consisted of 10 wage-earning workers (3 of them non-members) and 5 volunteer workers. Two of the volunteers were paid by a county subsidy program for seniors working in non-profit organizations.

Dec. 5

Marie-José Clerc announced that the lawsuit against the Board was dismissed and that she had, through signed agreement, reached her goal to protect the land of the Fellowship from being leased or sold.

2007 summer

The President, Alexandra Porter, and the Board decided that palm trees would be sold to offset the cost of removal of the 5 dead trees. The President expelled some loyal members, stopped the organizing of Summer School and prohibited member activities and lectures on the grounds. The bare bones economies for several years resulted in understaffing. Courses were no longer given and books in English and Spanish were out of print

2008 spring

and Spanish were out of print.

July 5

A new Board was chosen with Mr Edgar Anderson as Chairman. Mr Jim Noel was Vice President, while Ms Alexandra Porter was dispatched wherewith a new trail was blazed.

Chapters 22 to 27: Progression of the Horoscope—Fate and Freewill; Different Methods of Progression; Adjusted Calculation Date; Progression of the Angles; Progressed Solar Directions; Progressed Lunar Directions; Mutual Aspects of Planets; Transits.

Chapters 28 to 30: Astro-Diagnosis of Disease; Pathogenic Effects of Signs; of Planets; The Ductless Glands; 36 Example Horoscopes, giving a system of diagnosis based on many years of experience.

The first edition was rather a booklet and appeared about 1910.

The second edition was enlarged to 729 pages and revised in 1916.

Simplified Scientific Astrology

This textbook on the art of erecting a horoscope, makes the process simple and easy for beginners. It includes a philosophic encyclopedia and tables of planetary hours and gives information regarding the planets and aspects, and the principles underlying astrology.

The first edition appeared in Seattle 1909 and was enlarged to 198 pages in 1916.

Simplified Scientific Ephemeris

Printed in clear type, convenient and easily readable, it registers the New and Full Moons, eclipses, the Moon's Nodes and the length and declinations, including a logarithm table of 24 hours.

These commenced in 1923 but the data about Pluto was added from 1936 on.

Simplified Scientific Tables of Houses

Tables of Houses according to the system of Placidus from 0 to 66 degrees latitude (this system is not suitable for higher degrees than 66). Also provides the coordinates of 4500 world cities.

312 pages; first edition 1949.

Studies in Astrology

Elman Bacher

In nine volumes, it studies 'in depth' various aspects of astrology; planets, signs, houses, astrological influences on the arts and other facets of life, relating the chart to various stages in the individual life cycle and other matters.

Each about 96 pages; from 1962 to 1968.

Your Child's Horoscope, volume 1

This is a compilation of delineations full of valuable astrological information by Max Heindel and printed in early issues of *Rays from the Rose Cross*, but it loses much of its value, because the horoscopes that were well represented in *Rays* are missing.

97 pages; first edition 1971.

Your Child's Horoscope, volume 2

As in volume 1, this book also lacks the horoscopes.

96 pages, first edition 1984.
