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PREFACE.

The present catalogue is intended as a companion to that of the Fifteenth-Century printed books in Trinity College Library, published by me in 1876. This second volume is meant to include all the English books in the College Library printed before the close of the sixteenth century. Under the term *English* books are included: (1) all books, in whatsoever language, printed in England (or Scotland); (2) books in the English language printed abroad; and (3) books printed abroad, which, though not in the English language, have a distinct connexion with the English Church, history, or literature.

The method adopted in the former volume has been pursued in the present. The books are grouped under towns and printers, which are chronologically arranged, the appended dates marking the earliest year at which printing is known to have been practised at a given town or by a given printer.

In the sixteenth century, and especially in the latter part of it, a difficulty arises, which is practically wanting in the fifteenth, in the presence of the bookseller element, as distinct vi PREFACE.

whom the printer. Thus the imprint may merely tell us *for* whom the book is printed, leaving the question of the actual printer's name as a problem to be solved; and at times the bookseller's name is given as though the actual printer. In the present catalogue, when the printer's name is given or can be reasonably identified, a book is of course placed under that name; and under the bookseller's name, when there is one distinct from the printer, there is a cross-reference to the printer. If two or more printers' names are given in the imprint, the book is, as a rule, entered under the one first-named, with a cross-reference under that of the other. When the printer's name cannot be ascertained, the work is entered under the name of the bookseller.

The description of a book will vary in minuteness according to the character of the information already in print concerning it; but, with a few exceptions in the earlier part of the work, the full collation of the signatures is always given. In these few cases a book may always be assumed to have signatures and catchwords, unless the contrary is stated. The numbering, however, of folios or pages is always mentioned when it occurs. With regard to the words *folio*, *quarto*, *octavo*, etc., it is to be remarked that they are used here as one of the means towards the identification of a book, and they relate not directly to size, but to form, as testified to by the water-marks. A statement as to the height or width of a book may be interesting as shewing the condition of a particular copy, but does not give much help towards

identifying books. As Mr. Bradshaw has pointed out (Address to the Library Association, Append. p. 36; Cambridge, 1882), the most sensible plan in dealing with modern books is to describe them by their height and width in inches (as has been done for many years in the Library of this College), or even in the case of books of ordinary shape, by the height alone. In the case of early printed books, however, a note as to the form is often of great importance.

The ordinarily recognised Latin abbreviations are used in the descriptions for the sake of conciseness, and of these a list is annexed. I have used the term "signature-title" for the shortened form of the title found in the lower margin of the recto of one or more of the leaves in the first half of a quire. This is found, e.g., in books printed by Wynkyn de Worde and Pynson.

With regard to references appended to most of the books, whenever the book was mentioned by him, I have cited the page of Herbert's enlarged edition of Ames's *Typographical Antiquities*. So far as this was again re-edited by Dibdin, I have referred to the latter by volume and page; any other work of Dibdin which is cited having the title also given. It seems to me very much to be regretted that Dibdin, though with much fresh materials at his disposal, should so distinctly and so constantly, in so far as he has differed from Herbert, have differed for the worse. We do not want high-flown talk of wide margins and the like, but a more real attempt at scientific arrangement and accuracy.

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Besides the references to Herbert and Dibdin, I have made a point of citing (by the page) the catalogue of the Grenville collection in the British Museum, Dr. Maitland's Catalogue of the early printed books in the Lambeth Library, and the catalogue of the Huth collection. The catalogue of the late Mr. Lea Wilson's Collection of Bibles, etc., is referred to by the number of the entry. The most important recent contribution to the bibliography of early English literature is the catalogue of English books in the British Museum, printed to the year 1640. This, unfortunately, did not appear till the greater part of the present work had been printed. While cordially welcoming this important publication, I cannot help regretting that, in the case of the earlier and rarer books at any rate, collations are not given, by which the usefulness of the book would have been vastly increased, with no very great increase of size.

At the end of the work indices are given: (1) of the towns represented, the foreign towns being grouped separately; (2) of printers and booksellers, the foreign element being, as before, placed separately; (3) of the books themselves, with, I trust, a sufficiency of cross-references; and (4) of donors. This last, doubtless, would have contained a larger number of sixteenth and early seventeenth century names, had it not been for the misdirected zeal of past generations of binders, who, as many a librarian knows too well, found a perverse pleasure in cutting out old fly-leaves, often doubtless containing interesting MS. notes, and replacing them with fresh

paper, or in pasting blank paper over writing or even printed donation-labels, to say nothing of their cutting down the margins so recklessly as constantly to trench upon the print.

I would venture to repeat here a remark I made in the Preface of my former catalogue: "Bibliographical works are perhaps more than usually liable to errors, and I am fully aware that, in spite of every precaution, some may be detected in the following pages. Still, it may be hoped, there must be some value in every honest attempt to describe a collection on a definite plan, and especially when not a few of the books have hitherto been but slightly described, and several indeed totally undescribed. It may certainly be added that no one who has not been engaged on similar work can have at all an adequate conception of the amount of labour required." Certainly, a further nine years' experience has emphasised on my mind both the paramount need of accuracy in bibliographical matters, and the very great difficulty of attaining it.

In conclusion, I must offer my thanks to the Master and Seniors of the College, who, acting on behalf of the Society, undertook the cost of the publication of the present work. My best thanks are also due to Mr. Bradshaw, Librarian of the University Library and Fellow of King's College, who, as in the case of my former catalogue, has most kindly read the whole of the proof-sheets and aided me in every possible way during the progress of the work; to Mr. Falconer Madan, Sub-Librarian of the Bodleian Library and late Fellow of Brasenose College, Oxford, who has frequently enabled me to

complete my description of imperfect books by most generous expenditure of his own labour among the rich resources of the Bodleian; and to Mr. S. W. Kershaw, Librarian of the Lambeth Library, for kind help in connexion with that library.



Mr. Blades (ii. 79) describes one edition of this Indulgence (which was issued under the authority of pope Sixtus iv. for assistance at the siege of Rhodes), printed in the type of the *Game of Chess* (see next entry); but this edition, in the type of the *Chronicles of England*, remained unnoticed until August, 1881, when the present fragments of a copy were found by Mr. Bradshaw in the binding of the King's Hall (now Trinity College) account-book for the year 1499—1500.

It seems certain that in this second issue some of the sheets as struck off for the first edition were made use of. This follows from the fact that in many of the sheets the very obvious misprints of the first issue are left entirely uncorrected, and from defects in printing occurring in both copies alike. The first sheet, however, and sig. t, besides others, have clearly been struck off afresh (see e.g. f. 2^b, l. 14—f. 3^a, l. 14).

At the beginning of the present copy, some MS. is bound up, consisting of the promise of the Indulgence granted to the readers of the book, a short Latin poem by Joh. Clerk, and the bull of Leo x. [5 id. Oct. 1521, wrongly transcribed 1501] for the confirmation of Henry's work. These are all taken from the printed text of Pynson of 1521, which is found prefixed to some copies of the Assertio of that year.

John Clerk was the King's Orator at Rome, and delivered an

oration before Leo x., on the occasion of presenting to him a copy of the *Assertio*, Sept. 21. He was a Cambridge man (B.A., 1499: college not known). See *Athenae Cantab*. i. 77.

This edition, in the type of Wynkyn de Worde, differs from all the commonly known editions from his press, but bears most resemblance to that of 1512; while the difference between the two editions points to the fragment as somewhat the earlier of the two. Herbert (p. 146) mentions, but with no reference, an edition of 1508; Dibdin (ii. 81) merely refers to the "doubtful edition of 1508." Though as yet I can trace no edition of 1508 in any library, the fragment may well belong to such an edition.

The fragment consists mostly of detached pieces, and many of the quires are incomplete. The present book, though agreeing verbatim with the preceding, is certainly of a different issue, and is apparently the later of the two.

Numerous little variations occur through the whole book, but the following instances will suffice to distinguish the two issues: In no. 425 the woodcut ornaments on the title-page and on the following leaf are the same, but in no. 424 they are different. On f. 2ª there is in both copies a space for an 8-line initial, but in no. 425 the initial only extends over six lines, itself satisfactory proof that we have here the later issue. On this same page, in no. 424, sed is at the beginning of l. 9, in no. 425 at the end of l. 8. In no. 424 the first page of sig. C ends with "esset vt," in no. 425 with "editionibus."

In the present copy the last leaf of sig. A (which forms the first leaf of the Preface of Sixtus V.) has been wrongly bound at the end of sig. B. It is printed in smaller type than the rest of the preface, and I should therefore have thought it borrowed from a different edition, were it not the same in a copy in the British Museum.

It is not improbable that the printer of the above work was Henry Binneman, as the title-page is contained in the same woodcut border as that of Walsingham's *History* (*supra*, no. 384), and the device of the brazen serpent occurs at the end of vol. 1.

The work was licensed to John Harrison and George Bishop (Arber's Transcript ii. 329); other names, however, also occur on the various title-pages. The Grenville copy (infra) bears the name of George Bishop. The first of the two above copies has on its first title-page the name of John Hunne, and on the other three that of John Harrison (or Harison). In the Capell copy, the name of John Harrison (or Harison) occurs on the first three title-pages, and that of Lucas Harrison on the fourth. As regards the last name, the Registers of the Stationers' Company mention Holinshed's Chronicle among the books sold by "mistres harrison wief vnto master Luke harrison" deceased to Tho. Woodcock (Arber ii. 332). In the Huth copy (infra) the name is that of John Hunne throughout.

The Huth catalogue mentions a single leaf with "Faultes escaped" (sig. r) at the end of the Description of Britain; and another after sig. Mm, in History of Scotland. Both of these leaves are wanting in both of the above copies, as well as the folding woodcut of Edinburgh in quire Yyyy.

In vol. i., in the History of Ireland, the last three leaves of sig. E were cancelled. They, however, are found in the former of the above copies. In vol. ii., £ 2 is wanting in the former copy, and also L7 [in the Capel copy this is clearly a cancel] and Oooo 3.

In 506, the last line of the first paragraph is in roman, there are three lines in the second, and only l. I of the third is in italics. The general dedication is to all the young Gentlemen of England, dated "From my lodging in Holborne the 15. of October 1576." Then follow commendatory verses from Nicholas Bowyer, R. C. (see below), Humfrey Turner, Abraham Fleming (see no. 540), and John Wytton.

The second, third, and fourth parts begin, with special titles, on D 8, G 5, and K 1 respectively. The third part is dedicated to the Lady Iana Sibilla Greye of Wilton, and the fourth part to Sir Thomas Cicill, Knight. In the fourth part is a poem addressed to R. C., and the answer: the initials are shewn by the poem following to be those of the author's "especiall friend and kinseman, maister Robert Cudden of Grayes In."

The only other copies that seem to be known of the above are one in the Malone collection in the Bodleian, and one in the Heber catalogue (Part iv. 2875, where see Mr. Heber's note).

This book was licensed to Gab. Cawood on Dec. 2, 1578 (Arber's *Transcript* ii. 342); and it has hitherto been supposed that the first edition is one, dated 1579, of which a single copy only (imperfect at the beginning) is known to exist. This is in the possession of Prof. H. Morley, and has been reprinted as the *editio princeps* by Prof. Arber (*English Reprints*, no. 9).

A comparison, however, of the text of the present edition and that of the Morley copy (as given in Arber's reprint) shews conclusively that the former is the earlier, and it cannot be doubted that were the latter perfect at the beginning it would bear the words "corrected and augmented" on its title-page. This at once follows, when it is noted that, passing over innumerable differences of spelling, on which no argument can be based, we find a very large number of changes which are clearly due to the author, and in which the Morley copy agrees with a "corrected and augmented" edition of 1579 (see next article), and the edition of 1581, against the present. Among these differences, we find many large augmentations occurring in the three editions, but not in the one now before us. I subjoin some examples, the references being to the pages and lines of Arber's reprint:-p. 34, ll. 24-37, "who preferring.....owne will," is read merely "and leaving the rule of reason, rashly ranne vnto destruction." The following are all additions in the Morley copy: p. 35, 1. 29-p. 36, l. 5, "Hee coulde...other like." p. 41, l. 27, "vnlesse... nature." p. 45, ll. 29-39, "Ah Euphues...And so saying." p. 50, ll. 22-26, "Either...ridiculous." p. 51, l. 33-p. 52, l. 9, "yet least...welcome." p. 60, ll. 1-14, "Time...hath done." p. 63, 1. 39-p. 64, l. 35, "If Lucilla...frowarde wordes," etc.

It will be seen that there were no less than three editions in 1579.

The present edition is noted by Prof. Arber as the second (op. cit. p. 28), and therefore taking into account the foregoing editio princeps, it would stand third. After comparing, however, the text with that of the Morley copy (in Arber's reprint), I think it exceedingly doubtful which is second and which is third. As regards the three reasons brought forward by Prof. Arber (p. 30) in favour of the earlier date of the Morley copy, it may be remarked (1), that it cannot be doubted that the Morley copy would also have on its titlepage "corrected and augmented." As to (2), the Morley copy may well have had the Address to the "Gentlemen Scholers of Oxford" at the beginning, as in the present copy; and if so, it has simply disappeared with the rest of the preliminary matter. Of (3), I am unable to speak, as the last two leaves are wanting in the present copy.

It is not certainly known who is the author of the above. Strype (Annals, Book i. c. 19) says "Dr. Cosin [Athenae Cantab. ii. 230, 549] perhaps, or Dr. Bancroft." Baker notes in his copy of the work, now in St. John's College Library, "The Answere is by Dr. Cosin." Mr. Maskell [MS. note in copy of the Abstract in this Library, Grylls 1. 33] refers it to Archbishop Whitgift.

The copy described by Herbert (infra) bore the name of Hen. Denham as the printer. In the absence of the name, however, I did not venture to include it among Denham's books, although the woodcut ornament on A 8 verso of the present is the same as that on Dd 4 recto of no. 344 above, printed by Denham. I have since, however, compared the book with the copy in St. John's College Library, which is "printed by Henrie Denham for Thomas Chard." The preliminary matter (sig. A) is, it may be noted, of a different issue in the two copies, in the present consisting of 8 leaves in rom. in the other of 6 in goth. The title-page, too, is differently arranged. The first and second Treatises of the Abstract are annexed, the first preceding the Answer, the latter between quires P, Q; the same order being found in both copies, I presume they are from the same press, and are to be accounted an integral part of the work. The title runs, An Abstract, of certaine Acts of Parlement; of certaine her Maiesties Iniunctions..... as in the original work to be described in due course. The first treatise is in ff. 40, c. sig. (A-E⁸); the second in ff. 22, c. sig. (A8B8C4D2), in char. goth., without numbering of leaves. The pages, however, of the original edition of the Abstract are noted in the inner margin; itself strong evidence that the work is reprinted for convenience to the readers of the Answer.

It may be noted as singular that the woodcut ornament on N 6 recto (and also on A 2 recto in the St. John's copy) occurs not only in

the accompanying reprint of the *Abstract*, but frequently in the original unauthorised edition. This matter will be discussed fully in its proper place below.

By Gregorie Martin." Duaci, apud Iohannem Foulerum, 1578 (Herbert, p. 1836). Copies of both of these are in the Bodleian, but only the former is in this Library.

Carter was executed on Jan. 10, 1584, for publishing a Romanist book (see Holinshed's *Chronicles*, p. 1357, col. 1, ed. 1587; Stow's *Annals*, p. 1176, ed. 1605; Camden's *Annals*, p. 354, ed. 1615), though the remarks appear to refer to the second-named book. The type, however, of the present book seems unmistakeably English, so that there will perhaps be sufficient à *priori* probability to justify us in placing it here.

It will be seen that the above is quite different from what is ordinarily spoken of as the first edition of the *Essays*, a small octavo published in the same year. 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Mr. F. Madan informs me that in Dorne's MS. daybook of books sold in his shop in Oxford, 1520-21, occurs "Medecens vor hors" (the man was a Dutchman), priced $3\frac{1}{2}d$. (Library of C. C. C., Oxford; cod. cxxxi., fol. 13 verso).

(825) VI^b. 6. 2.—Generydes. (Presumably London, c. 1520–25), char. goth., quarto.

This is a fragment, consisting of 3 imperfect leaves, containing two portions of a poem in 7-line stanzas. It was discovered by Mr. Bradshaw, about 20 years ago, in the binding of a book in this library which formerly belonged to Edmund Castell, the well-known Oriental scholar, Michaelis Menoti Sermones Quadragesimales. Paris, 1525. [This book now stands vib. 6. 3.] No printed text of this poem had previously been known, and the fragment represented a totally independent version from that which was edited by Mr. Furnivall in 1865 for the Roxburghe Club from the Tollemache MS. Subsequently, other fragments of the 7-line stanza version were found by Mr. W. A. Wright, among Sir John Fenn's papers, then belonging to Sir Philip Frere, of Dungate, and now in the Huth collection (Catal. p. 543, s. v. Fragments). These, as well as the present fragments, are given in Mr. Furnivall's edition, pp. xxv. sqq. Mr. Wright, the then Librarian of Trinity College, further found in the Gale Collection in this library a complete MS. [O. 5. 2] of the version in 7-line stanzas, the only one as yet known to exist. This was edited by him in 1878 for the Early English Text Society. The parts answering to the present printed fragments, with only slight verbal differences, are vv. 5339—5396 (p. 171), and 5690—5805 (p. 181).

The ground on which the approximate date of the fragments is given is, that they were clearly used as fly-leaves at the time when the book from which they were taken was originally bound. Besides the date of printing of that book, it may be added that on the sides of the binding are found stamped the Royal Arms of England, surrounded by the Garter and *Honi soit.....* On one side are the rose and fleur-de-lys, and on the other the castle and pomegranate (for Castile and Granada). The whole is surrounded by the legend, "Deus det nobis suam pacem et post mortem vitam æternam. Amen." This device was commonly used in English binding while Catherine of Arragon was queen.

It may be added that in 1568-69 Thomas Purfoot received a license to print *Generydes*: "Recevyd of thomas purfoote for his lycense for pryntinge of a boke intituled *Generydes*—iiijd" (Arber's *Transcript*, i. 389). This edition, however, if actually printed, has entirely disappeared.

This book was by Ames (p. 211) assigned to the press of John Wayland, no reason being given for this conclusion. Herbert (infra) includes it among Wayland's books, under protest, simply on Ames's authority. This conclusion has been generally followed. The following is evidently the true solution of the matter: In Hazlitt's Collections and Notes, 2nd Ser., p. 598, is a notice of this work, where, after a transcript of the title-page, follows a colophon including John Wayland's name. But in the above copy (which was Herbert's), and in all others which I have seen, a colophon occurs on f. 225b without a printer's name; and therefore one might have supposed that there were two different issues of the work in 1550, were it not for Mr. Hazlitt's remark that the colophon he cites was "taken from the title-page preserved in Harl. MS. 5010 [one of John Bagford's volumes]. It is there pasted on to the foot of the leaf, and is in the same type as the rest." That is to say Bagford, the well-known mutilator of rare books in many libraries, has happened to paste together a certain title-page and colophon, wrongly combining, by a very easy mistake, his ill-gotten gains. The colophon Mr. Hazlitt cites, which is at the bottom of the whole affair, can have nothing to do with the present book unless there were two distinct issues, of which there is no trace, although the book is fairly common. As to the alleged identity of type, this is a very ordinary sort of large black-letter, on which, taking into account the date when

the book was printed, it would be altogether absurd to base any argument.

The work is dedicated by the translator to "Mayster John Cheke."

This work was originally published by Thomas Berthelet in 1549 (Herbert, p. 453). In the present edition the author (for whom see above, no. 403) protests (f. 1b) that that "set forth by Marshe and Ceres in the yere of Christ .1559. is none of myne."

The worke is dedicated to "Lorde Russell Earle of Bedforde." Herbert 1614.

The above, preached in St. Giles's church, Edinburgh, is the only sermon of John Knox's which has come down to us. It will be found in Dr. David Laing's edition of Knox's *Works* (vol. vi. pp. 221 sqq.), and the *Exhortation* (op. cit. p. 431). It was committed to

writing on the last day of August (see G 1 recto); and the preface is dated Sept. 19. The Exhortation is dated Dec. 28.

I have followed Dr. Laing in considering that not only the type, but the words on the title-page "within the Realme of Scotland," seem to shew that the work was printed in London.

An edition of the above, printed by Henry Binneman in 1584, has been already described (supra, no. 403).

In the first of the above copies the first blank leaf is wanting, and the date on the title-page has been altered by a pen into 1578. In the second copy, all before A 2 is wanting, but the title and A 1 have been supplied in MS. In this copy, the *Dictionarium Historicum et Poeticum* at the end of the volume are taken from the edition published by Henry Wykes in 1565. In the Capell copy, the last 6 leaves are taken from Binneman's edition of 1584, by which a certain slight amount is given in duplicate; but after this ff. 1, 2, 4, of the last quire of the present edition are also bound up.

Now Grindal was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury in 1576, which is thus the earliest possible date for the publication of the above; and as Drant died in 1578, and the book was clearly published in his life-time, we obtain a posterior limit. Thus the date given by Herbert (infra), 1575, cannot stand.

The Carminum Sylua begins on sig. Eiij, and to this are prefixed three short poems to Queen Elizabeth.

The above date is given on the authority of the *Life* by Lightfoot prefixed to the collected edition of Broughton's works (London, 1662), where the detailed circumstances of the publication of the *Concent* are entered into.

It would appear that the printers of the above work were Gabriel Simson and William White, a copy bearing their names being stated to be in the King's Library, British Museum (Sandars, *Books printed on vellum*, p. 33). These printers were on Aug. 18, 1595, fined ten shillings for having, without authority, begun to print a book by

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Hugh Broughton, and were ordered to bring what they had done to Stationers' Hall (Arber's *Transcript*, ii. 824). It is impossible, however, that the present work is the one in question, as has been sometimes suggested.

F. 13, Title, engraved on copper, with border of pillars encircled by vine. ff. 1, 2, do not form part of the same half-sheet, consisting of quite different paper. f. 2. To the most high and mightie Prince Elizabet..... This leaf was originally printed with a o-line initial, containing the arms of Francis Russell, Earl of Bedford*; and this, having been cancelled, was replaced by a leaf with an 8-line initial, representing an old man and a youth. In the former of the above copies both the original leaf and the cancel occur. Before sig. A is inserted a folding map of the world, engraved on copper. The four engravings on copper at the end of the book are symbolical representations of the powers of the world from Babylon to Rome. In the second of the above copies the map is bound so as to follow A 3, and the engravings come after F 1, F 2, and G 4. In the copy printed on vellum in the University Library a second set of the four plates, on paper, comes at the end, in which the names are printed in Hebrew letters.

It will be seen that the above is a different edition from that described by Herbert (p. 1265), and in the Huth catalogue (p. 228). Which of the two is the earlier, I am unable to say.

This last work, however, was printed for Simson and White, not by

them; and, in the present copy at any rate, the border is of a kind too frequently met with to justify any inference being drawn from it.

The work is dedicated to "Henrie, Earle of Huntingdon," to whom the author relates many details of his early life at Cambridge.

The above is the second of the two editions printed by Nicolson in 1538; and it has usually been stated that a sufficient test to distinguish the two editions is that the title to the first is printed in black and red, and the name of Coverdale is given as the translator, while in the second the title is entirely in black, and bears the name of John Hollybush as the translator. The Huth catalogue (infra), however, shews that this is a mistake, and that the second edition, like the first, had the title in black and red, and had the name of Coverdale on the title. In some copies this title has been cancelled, and a fresh one, printed entirely in black, and bearing the name of Hollybush has been substituted. In the present copy, for instance, the first leaf is on quite different paper from the rest of the quire. Two copies in the Huth collection have the original title-page.

In some, as in that described by Herbert (infra), it runs, "Excudebatur praesens opus Wesaliae per Theodoricum Plateanum, Anno a seruatoris natiuitate. M.D.XLVIIII. Pridie Calendas Augusti." For this in copies like the present we have, "Excudebatur praesens opus, anno a Nativi-|tate unicæ illius pro peccatis uictimæ, patri in crucem oblatæ, quadragesimo octa|uo supra millesimum & quingentesimum, pridie Calendas Augusti." The date of the former imprint is doubtless due to a misprint, for as the two issues of the book absolutely agree except in the above imprints, it is clear that we may more readily suppose an extra I added to the date in the former than allow an error in the octavo in the latter. Moreover, Bale's own statement of his plans (f. 244b), to which I shall again refer, is absolutely conclusive.

As regards the place of printing, I have put the book here because of the statement of the concluding colophon, but there can be no doubt whatever that the book was printed at Wesel. This is clear from the following reasons: (1) Bale's own statement at the end of the present work (f. 244b), where he is looking forward to a speedy return to England from his exile, "anno hoc a Christi incarnatione .1548. & ætatis meæ .liii. finitis his laboribus, et dño fortunante reditū maturo." At some unspecified point therefore in 1548, Bale's return to England is yet in the future, though the printer's work is done by July 31 of that year. (2) Bale's remark cited by Herbert from the introduction to a register of English writers, annexed to "The laboryouse Journey and serche of Johan Leylande," described above, no. 201. In this work, printed in London in 1549, Bale remarks (G 2 recto), "Sens I returned home agayne from Germany, where as I both collected and emprinted my symple worke, de Scriptoribus Britannicis....." (3) The presence of the name of Theodoric Plateanus in the imprint of one title-page (the two issues being exactly the same in all other respects) is inexplicable if the book were really printed in England; and we may certainly infer that the imprint with the name is the earlier, both from the misprint as to the date therein, and from the unusually full statement of the date in the other, as though to fill up the space. (4) The character of the type and the woodcut initials points clearly to a foreign press.

Besides the woodcut on the title-page, there is on f. 11^a a medallion of the Saviour, on f. 12^a a half-length figure of Wickliffe, and on

f. 12^b a small woodcut (different from that on the title) of Bale presenting his book to Edward vi. This last is the same as that found in "The first two partes of the Actes or vnchast examples of the Englysh votaryes" (title-page of part i. and A 8 verso of part ii.), printed in 1551. See above, no. 288. Of the half-length portrait of Bale mentioned by Herbert as coming on a single leaf at the end of the preliminary matter, there is no trace in this copy.

The character of the type of this book is clearly English; and as regards the date, while the title-page shews it to have been published after the death of Cranmer, the first page of the Preface (A 3) shews it to have been published in the reign of Mary, therefore not later than 1558.

Ames (p. 229) referred this book to the press of Reynold Wolfe, and this statement has been echoed in certain books of reference, as Lowndes, and the British Museum Catalogue of English books printed to the year 1640 (vol. i. p. 424). Herbert (p. 612) justly remarks, "I do not find in my copy anything to found such a criterion upon"; and considering the undoubted date of the book, it is clear that its publication would be attended with very great danger.

A work of similar title, published by Thomas Raynalde in 1548 (Herbert, p. 583), of which there is a copy in the University Library,

is a quite independent work from the present. Both are given at length in Dr. Jenkyns's edition of Cranmer's works (vol. iv. p. 144 and App. xxxv.).

The present copy belonged to Bishop Burnet, and has his bookplate.

Of the two *errata*, one has been corrected in the present and one in the preceding issue.

On A 4 verso are addresses to the reader from the author and the printer. The latter apologises for the faults in printing: "And

being for wante of long training vp in thys mysterie, not so skilfull to spie a faulte, so soone as it is made, haue lefte oute, or euer I was aware, diuers quotations in the margent, displaced other some, and committed some other faultes in the texte." This was largely due to the absence of the author during the printing of the first half of the work. The *errata* in the text are corrected with the pen, presumably by Cartwright himself.

The authorship of the above has been frequently attributed to Robert Beale (*Athenae Cantab.* ii. 311). It has also been assigned to Henry Jacob.

As regards the date of the book, we have an allusion on p. 217 to the reign of Elizabeth having lasted 24 years, which brings us to Nov. 17, 1582. On the other hand, the answer to the above work (above, no. 549) is dated 1584.

As regards the printer, Mr. Mullinger, in a note appended to the second volume of his *History of the University of Cambridge*, brings forward arguments, resting on typographical similarities, for assigning it to Thomas Thomas at Cambridge. I think, however, that it is on the whole more likely that Robert Waldegrave was the printer, on

the ground of the peculiar manner of printing the signatures, in which the *letter* is only given on the first *recto* of the quire. This peculiarity is frequently found in books printed by Waldegrave in London (see above, no. 577 *sqq.*) and in Edinburgh (above, no. 851 *sqq.*), as well as in the books known to be printed by him at the wandering Marprelate press, to be described below.

It may be added that l. 3 of the title-page of the *Abstract* is printed in *very* large lower-case letters, which I have not observed in any contemporaneous printer except Waldegrave. See the title, dedication, and final imprint in Alex. Gee's *Ground of Christianitie*, 1584 (above, no. 576).

A small woodcut ornament of a woman's head at the end of the *Abstract* also occurs at the end of this book.

The peculiarity in the method of printing the signatures, already mentioned in the case of the Marprelate books, is itself strong evidence that Waldegrave was the printer. We find that Waldegrave, after printing the earlier Marprelate books, had gone to Rochelle, about May, 1589 (op. cit. p. 100). Here he stayed long enough to print Master Some laid open in his coulers as late as a date subsequent to Jan. 29, 1590 (op. cit. p. 179 n.), and Penry's

Appellation dated March 7, 1590. If therefore, as we believe, Waldegrave was the printer, the place of printing, if not Edinburgh, must have been Rochelle, the former being much more probable.

Penry's sojourn in Scotland was from October, 1589, to the autumn of 1592, and Waldegrave left Rochelle for Edinburgh in the spring of 1590. Now, an allusion in the Address to the Reader shews that Elizabeth had by this time reigned thirty-two years; because, after speaking of the hopes felt by the anti-prelatical party at the beginning of her reign, he adds (A 4 recto), "The deuill indeede hath within this twelmoneth, shewed himselfe to bee grieuously wounded in their (the bishops') persons, because he hath

raged so mightily, as these 32. yeares his furie was neuer seene so great against the truth as at this present." This is followed by a reference to Nash's satirical tract, *An Almond for a Purrot*, in which Penry was severely handled, and which appears to have been published in 1590 (see Arber's *Introd*. 200).

It may be noted that, except in sig. A, we find the same peculiarity in the method of printing the signatures already referred to as characterising books printed by Waldegrave.

The only exceptions are B 5, D 2), et pp. n., quarto.

Alexander Hume was M.A. of the University of St. Andrew's, and was incorporated at Oxford in 1581 (Wood's Fasti Oxonienses, i. 217). He had been a schoolmaster at Dunbar (Athenae Oxon. i. 623). He dedicates the work to "Robert Erle of Essex and Ewe."

I am disposed to assign this work to the press of Robert Walde-grave for the following reasons: (1) From the above-mentioned peculiarity in the signatures. (2) From the identity of the floriated initial I at the beginning of the Address to the Reader in the above (B 1 recto) with that in the same position in no. 924 above. (3) Works were printed for Hume in Edinburgh by Waldegrave in 1594, 1599, etc.

Only two other copies are known of the above, one printed on vellum in the British Museum, which acquired it by purchase from St. Cuthbert's College, at Ushaw; the other on paper in the Library of Christ Church, Oxford. The Museum also possesses the only copy at present known of the *Pars Estivalis*.

It may be noted that in the Museum copy of the *Pars Hyemalis*, several leaves are wanting in part i., and the whole of parts ii. iii. is discarded (*Catalogue of Books printed up to the year* 1640, vol. ii. p. 985).

Some of the leaves in the above copy are imperfect.

The above volume contains twelve large and eighteen small miniatures, besides a large amount of illumination generally. Inside the covers are two full-page miniatures, of the Annunciation and the Nativity.

The binding of the above is of fish-skin, edged with broad ornamental borders of silver, which were originally gilt. To these were attached two silver clasps, only one, however, of which remains, set with a jacinth; and in the middle of each side is a silver boss set with the same stone.

The above volume-was a gift to the College from Dame Anna Sadleir (daughter of Sir Edward Coke), and the letter of thanks of the Master and Seniors, dated Aug. 10, 1660, is preserved among the MSS. in the Library (R. 5. 5). In this letter the present volume is spoken of as a MS.

On F 4 recto, speaking of the present work, he says, "my Printer was much lacking in letter, and altogither in our language."

The author was a native of Norwich (A 6 verso), and was expelled from his benefice under Mary. He was a friend of Dr. John Barret (B 2 recto), for whom see Athenae Cantab. i. 224. As regards the place of printing, Geneva has been suggested by some, apparently on the ground that Cartwright retired there after his departure from England. The typographical characteristics are not at all those of Geneva. An edition in octavo was printed at Geneva in 1580, but this is not at all similar to the present. The British Museum *Catalogue of books printed up to the year* 1640 (vol. i. p. 538) suggests Middleburgh, on what grounds is not stated.

The first of the Grylls copies of the above was Miss Currer's, and the second was the property at different times of Tho. Baker, Mr. Bayntun, the Duke of Sussex, and Mr. Lyte. Baker has added some MS. notes, including the following details as to Travers from the University and College registers: Matriculated (as a member of Christ's College), Dec. 14, 1560; elected a minor fellow of Trinity, Sept. 8, 1567; and a major fellow, Mar. 25, 1569.

It may be noted here, although the book is slightly beyond our period, that appended to the second copy of the above is a work which appears to be absolutely unknown save by the present copy, "A discourse of some troubles, and excommunications in the banished English Church at Amsterdam. The former part of the above is a translation of part of a Latin Historiola, compiled by the order of Archbishop Parker (apparently by John Josselin), which gave a brief history of the foundation and successive Masters of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, of which college Parker had previously been Master (1544—1553). The translator, a man of strong Puritan bias, took that part of the above which referred to Parker's own mastership, and added to his translation "foolish, scurrilous, and malicious notes." See

Strype's Life of Parker, vol. ii. pp. 414 sqq. (ed. Oxford, 1821). Strype (p. 418) is inclined to refer the authorship to John Stubbs (for whom see above, no. 294). It may be noted that Stubbs was brother-in-law to Thomas Cartwright, and the Ecclesiastical Discipline, translated by the latter (see the preceding article), is printed in the same type as the present work.

The Athenae Cantab. (i. 332) and Dean Hook (Lives of the Archbishops of Canterbury, ix. 512 n.) speak of the date of the translation as 1573. This is presumably an error, as Strype speaks only of an edition of 1574, and all copies which have been described are of the latter date.

Prof. Arber suggests (Introd. to Mar-prelate controversy, p. 199) that the above may have been printed by Waldegrave at Rochelle in the summer of 1589; and it may be noted that the woodcut initial on A 2 recto is often found in books printed by Waldegrave. On the other hand, the method of printing the signatures is not that characteristic of Waldegrave; and the characters in the Dialogue are represented as walking towards London, while the Puritan says, "I came from Rochell my selfe, which is a part of France." This would rather suggest that if Waldegrave were the printer, he had by this time left France. He is referred to by name on B 3 verso.

copy (infra), the leaf signed M comes at the end of the volume, but it is clear that the position the leaf holds in the present copy (as also in Herbert's) is the true one, if only from the "set-off" of the following page on the blank verso of this leaf.

This following page is a fresh title, not in a border, but with a woodcut ornament at the top, "La Lepanthe de Iaqves VI. Roy d'Escosse, Faicte francoise par le Sieur Du Bartas. 

The above consists of a printed title surrounded by a border engraved on copper, and occupying two leaves, and should be followed by 39 plates illustrating the history of France from 1559 to 1570, each occupying two leaves, of which, according to Brunet (infra), five are on wood and the remainder on copper. In the present copy no. 10 is wanting, but the set otherwise agrees exactly with the description given by Brunet, save that 8, 9; 25, 26; 27, 28; 37, 38, are respectively interchanged. Plate no. 25 has been printed on the back of a sheet on which plate 5 had already been printed.

The notice to the reader following the title, and enclosed in a like border, is not found in this copy.

The descriptions of the plates in English are pasted at the foot of the respective plates.

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
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
