PREFACE.

THE collection of Books and Manuscripts offered in this catalogue contains such distinguishing features that a few words on their main characteristics will probably be found useful before perusing the catalogue itself.

The total value alone of this comparatively small collection, amounting to about £40,000, places it outside the range of ordinary book collections, and it is hoped may give it, in conjunction with the full and careful descriptions, some little interest even to the general reader.

Its intrinsic value however lies in the unusually choice state of the works which compose it, the original owners of the greater portion, from its first foundation about 70 years ago, having in this respect anticipated the chief *desideratum* of the book-collector of the present day.

Several works are in almost if not quite unique condition. In this connexion may be mentioned Large Paper copies of Painter's 'Palace of Pleasure' and of Spenser's 'Complaints' (both first editions), and the almost unique first edition of the latter's 'Shepherd's Calendar'; also a set of original editions, with author's presentation inscriptions, of Izaak Walton's works, and Defoe's 'Robinson Crusoe' as published in the 'London Post,' of which only one other and very imperfect copy is known to exist.

Among early specimens of printing may be mentioned the perfect copy (probably unique) of Caxton's 'Golden Legend' [1483]; and as a specimen of an early Block Book the first edition of the 'Biblia Pauperum,' published before 1450; also a fine collection of rare *Hore*.

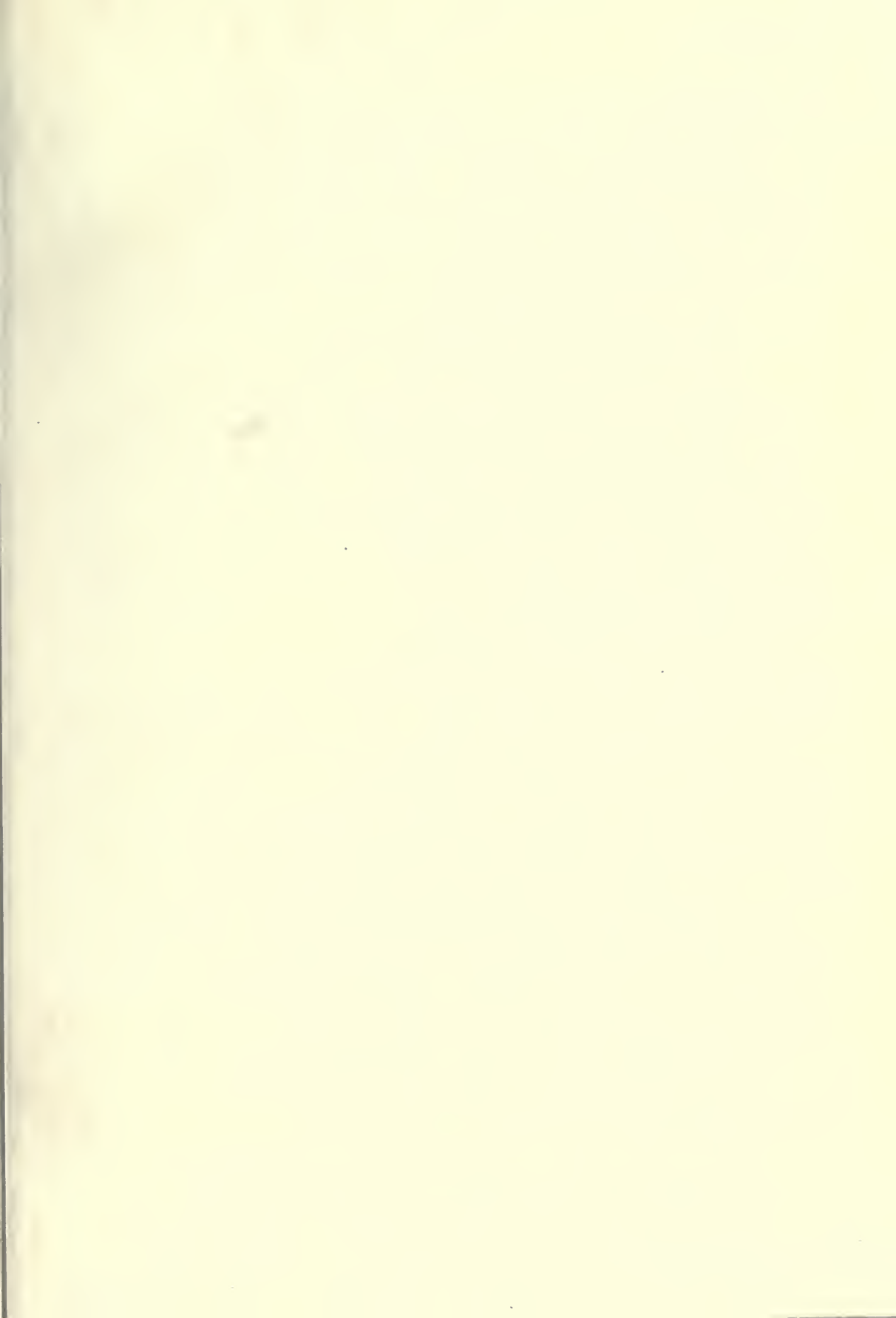
Of great interest is also a collection of most beautiful early Illuminated Manuscripts, and an unusually large one of early and rare editions of the English Bible; while at end will be found a Liturgical Collection, containing many works of great rarity; *e.g.*, a unique portion of the York Breviary of 1533, and a gathering of the various editions and issues of THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER, which regarding extent, rarity, or fine condition, may safely be claimed to be unique.

Attention may finally be called to the fact that collections of such high average value in their contents as the present one have become rarer and rarer of recent years, and with the dispersal of this it is within the range of probability that their era will have come to an end.

The Catalogue itself is therefore commended to the sympathetic perusal of the Collector, and to the use and reference now and again of the Bibliographer.

This edition, consisting of signatures A to M in fours, each treatise having a separate titlepage, is much rarer than that printed by William Copeland about the same time; nor is there a copy in the British Museum.

The above copy, in spite of a few defects pointed out above, is in remarkably good condition, such as is scarcely ever to be met with in books of this character, where frequent use proved fatal to the book itself; for although at one time 'its circulation long vied with and perhaps exceeded that of every other contemporary publication of the press of lesser eminence than Holy Writ' (*Hastewood*), very few copies of old editions are now left, and nearly all are in more or less imperfect condition.

'This is *Nicolson's first edition of Coverdale's New Testament*, printed while Coverdale was in Paris superintending the printing of the Great Bible, 1539. It was intended to be an adaptation of his edition of 1535 (which had been rendered from the Greek), to the accompanying version in Latin. . . . This edition was unknown to Lewis and others. In Heber's Catalogue it is said, 'This is the first of the two editions printed in the same year, and the edition of which Coverdale endeavoured to call in all copies' [on account of the many blunders contained in it].—*Lowndes*.

Very few copies are perfect as above, the only one in the British Museum having the title in fs.

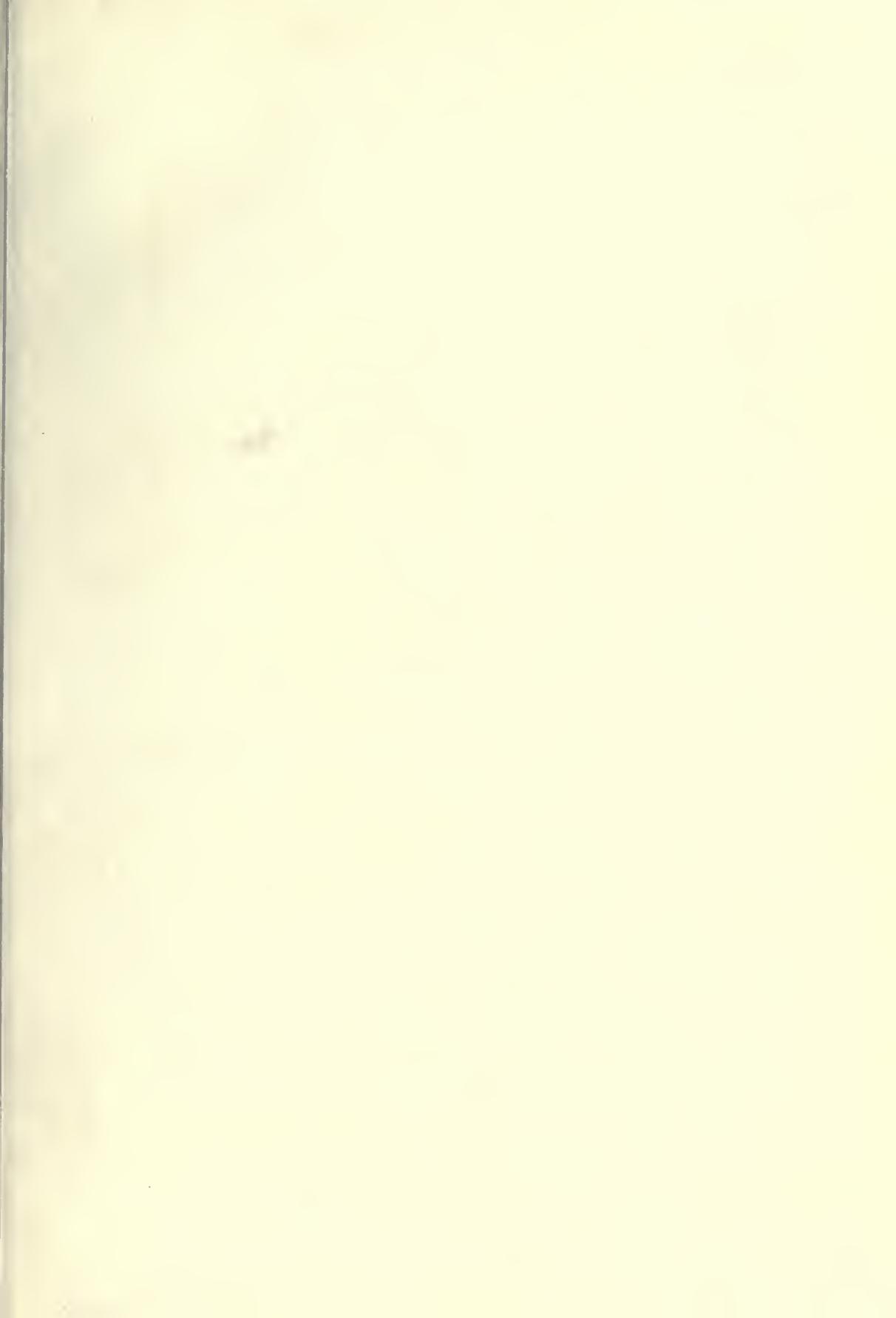
The publication of this *extremely rare and interesting edition* was, according to Foxe the Martyrologist, 'much aided and assisted by Edmund Boner, then Bishop of Hereford, which Bishop *outwardly* shewed great friendship to the Merchants that were imprinters of the same; ' but the principle that moved Bonner in all this was, says Foxe, that he might better curry favour with Cromwell, to whom it is dedicated. It was published in Nov., 1538, the impression consisting of 520 in number, the greater part of which were seized in December following, by authority of the Inquisition in Paris; 'and if (says Cranmer) you would know what was done with them, Lieutenant Criminal caused them to be burnt in Maubert Place as *heretical books*; only a few escaped, the Lieutenant selling them for waste paper to a haberdasher.' Independently of the extreme interest thus attached to this edition, its value is much enhanced by the fact that the errors of the former editions of the same year, which are so severely complained of by Coverdale in his preface, as being 'both base, insensyble, and cleane contrary to the understanding of the texte,' are in this corrected, and the whole so thoroughly revised, that it may almost be considered a new translation.

THE FIRST EDITION OF CROMWELL'S OR THE GREAT BIBLE, a wholly different book from that of the following year, in which alone Cranmer had a part. The present is the one to which the honour belongs of having been the first to be placed in the churches for public reading, by the King's injunctions. The impression was begun secretly in Paris, and when nearly finished, the printers, disturbed by the Inquisition, contrived to escape with a considerable number of copies, and to bring them to London together with their types. The great rarity is probably owing to the Royal Proclamation ordering the Bible 'of the largest and greatest volume' to be placed in every Parish Church, where, by constant thumbing, most of the copies must have been destroyed.

The second copy has the following MS. note by Mr. Francis Fry:

'I have carefully examined every leaf and state that it is every leaf the genuine and correct edition 1539. It is a good sound copy, and will be found to agree with the description of this edition in my Work on the Great Bible, the folio Cranmer, and Authorized Version. The Title is by the celebrated Harris. The preliminary ll., first of Text and three last ll., are facsimiles.'

It may be added that although the first title is in fs., the beautiful design by HOLBEIN contained on it exists nevertheless in the original in the present copies, as it is repeated as the title to the Apocrypha, where it is genuine.

Mr. Dunn Gardner's copy sold for £121., and Lord Crawford's for £111.

The above, which is probably one of the tallest copies in existence, must not be confused with the edition printed by Petyt and Redman, also in Apryll 1540, which is not of such great rarity. It is the FIRST EDITION BEARING CRANMER'S NAME on the title, and is the second of the grand series known justly as 'the Great Bible'. Unlike the usually imperfect Bibles of the present day, it contains the whole of the Apocrypha. The erroneous reading of Pharaoh's Wife for Potiphar's occurs in the heading to Gen. xxxix. Besides the fine allegorical title-page, ascribed to Holbein, which appears to the Old and New Testaments (which is genuine in the latter in the above copy), there are three other and different woodcut titles in compartments to the other three 'Partes' of the Bible.

It contains a laboriously worked-out 'Supputation of the yeares and tyme from Adam unto Christ, proued by the Scriptures after the colleccyon of dyuers Authours', by the Editor, and Tyndale's Prologues. At the beginning of the Psalms [and of Isaiah] are woodcuts of the whole breadth of the page, and before each Gospel is the figure of the Evangelist, executed in a different style from the other cuts. To that of St. Mark is affixed the engraver's mark, J. F.

The Epistles and Gospels are given according to Sarum Use.—It is a different edition from the other 'Matthew' edition of 1549, being edited by Becke, by whom the dedication was written, as well as many objectionable notes which are found in no other edition of the Bible. Those to St. Matthew, ch. xix., are indecent, and many consist mainly of abuse of the Church, her doctrine, and her clergy.—*Dore*.

THE FIRST ENGLISH NEW TESTAMENT PRINTED AT GENEVA, finely printed with silver types in Roman Italic letter. It is sometimes erroneously called the first edition of the Genevan Version (probably owing to the imprint, and the allegorical woodcut, here first produced, and contained in many editions of the latter), which really did not appear till 1560. The translator of both versions was WILLIAM WHITTINGHAM, afterwards Dean of Durham ; the present edition differs however considerably from the Genevan version, and no other edition was ever issued—a fact that should render it of special value to the Bible Collector. It is moreover remarkable as the first English New Testament in which the division of the text into verses, and the use of italics in the text for words not found in the original Greek, were employed.

The few copies sold at auction have been all more or less imperfect, while the above copy is in immaculate condition.

A facsimile reprint—itself now rare—was published in 1842.

Published by royal authority and ordained to be placed in every cathedral and exposed in every ecclesiastical dignitary's house for the use of their servants and visitors, copies of this edition, through constant thumping, have now become very rare.

The Ashburnham and Crawford copies fetched £70. each.

The above is a genuine copy of the celebrated '*Pearl Bible*,' beautifully printed, but remarkable for the prodigious number of mistakes contained in it, as referred to by D'Israeli in his '*Curiosities of Literature.*' Two well-known examples are 1 Cor. vi. 9, '*Know ye not that the unrighteous shall inherit the Kingdom of God,*' and Rom. vi. 13, '*Neither yield ye your members as instruments of righteousness unto sin.*'

It is remarkable that in spite of the panhypersebastic character of the party in power, the Bibles printed during the Commonwealth are reputed to swarm with errors. The '*Pearl*' editions themselves according to D'Israeli have 6000 *errata*.

There was a forged edition of this Bible, printed in Amsterdam in 1658. The genuine edition is recognised by having the first 4 psalms on one page without turning over.

This interesting book is the first English Concordance to the whole Bible; its only forerunner being Gibson's one to the New Testament in 1536. Its author was organist of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, and the author of 'The Book of Common Prayer Noted' published in the same year, which was an edition of the musical parts of the First Prayer Book of Edward VI. set to the ancient Plainsong (*q. v. sub* LITURGIES, *post*). The compilation of the Concordance got Merbeck into trouble with Henry VIII., and he was tried for heresy, and only escaped condemnation at the intercession of Bp. Gardiner.

It is a remarkable work of nearly 900 pages, each divided into 3 columns.

It afterwards became the property of SAMUEL WELLER SINGER, the antiquary, who added the following MS. note:

'The Original of this Book appears to have been printed at Antwerp in 1535 by Simon Coquus, with the following title: 'Enchiridion compluscula eorumque in Veteris Testamenti Sacris Bibliis traduntur picturis expressa continens: addito insuper textu: ac mox precationibus piis ad rem facientibus, e lingua vernacula, in Latina per Guilh. de Banteghem, Alostuum Cartusianum tralatis. 12^o.' The identical woodcuts are used in the Latin work of which Thorpe had a copy in 1827.

'I never met with another copy of the English version, which was probably destroyed with the early Editions of the Testament in English.'

He usually engraved after his own designs, and received, from his crowding his compositions with an infinite number of figures, the name of 'The Dutch Callot.' The woodcuts in the above work are most remarkable, not only from their high finish, but also from the delicacy of conception quite foreign to the age in which they were executed. They are in this respect in striking contrast with Holbein's Bible Prints (v. No. 87), published at nearly the same time. The work has a dedication to Sir William Pickering, English Ambassador in Paris (named 'Master Pikeling' in the work), and four lines of text to each woodcut, all written in a barbarous and all but unintelligible jargon, which perhaps represents the earliest printed specimen of 'English as she is spoke.' There is no copy in the British Museum Catalogue of Early English Books to 1640.

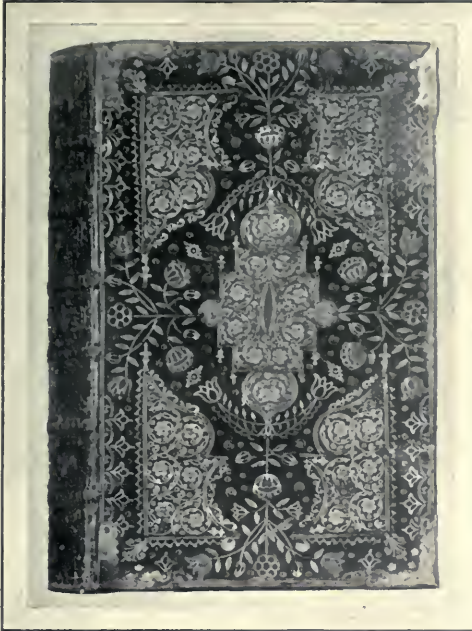

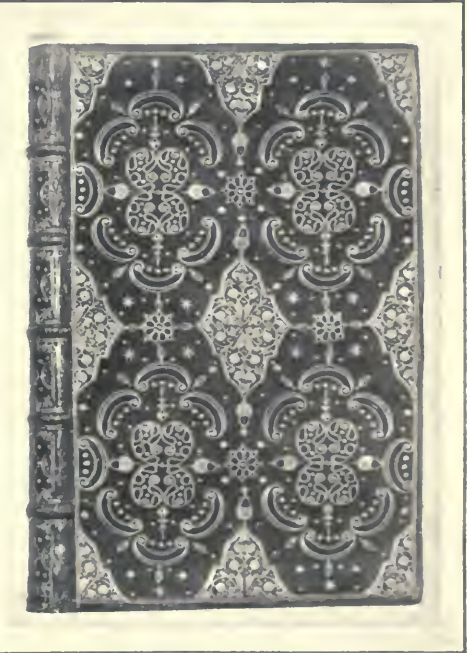
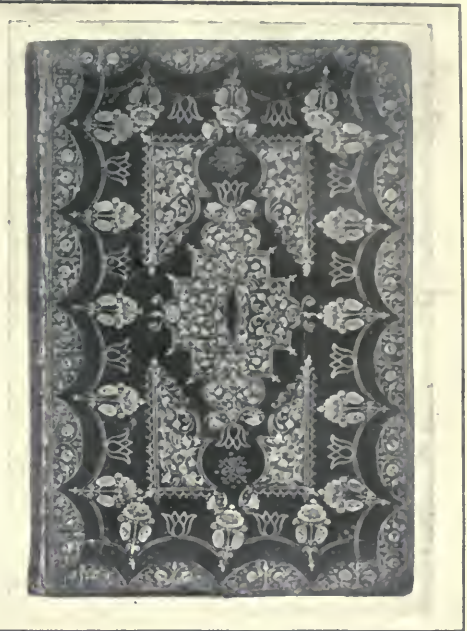

The illustrations were according to Graesse executed by ROGER OF BRUGES, a disciple of JAN VAN EYCK, and the above edition is said to have been executed in Holland.

It is not generally known that Burton for nearly all his life was Vicar of St. Thomas the Martyr, Oxford, the cure, during the Oxford Movement, of Thomas Chamberlain. It is recorded that he always administered the Sacrament there in wafers. 'There is a unique charm in the 'Anatomy of Melancholy.' Dr. Johnson said it was the only book that ever took him out of bed two hours sooner than he meant to rise. 'Tristram Shandy' was permeated with Burton's influence. Charles Lamb was an enthusiastic admirer of the 'fantastic old great man,' and Milton gathered hints for 'L'Allegro' and 'Il Penseroso' from the verses prefixed to the 'Anatomy'.'—A. H. Bullen.

'Of Parts I. and II. there are 3 different editions under the same dates, which, taken merely by the title, may easily be confounded with each other. The legitimate author's edition [Nos. 139 and 140] would seem to be that printed in small 8vo., all three parts uniform in size and type, and on rather stout paper. The *earliest* edition of the first part is no doubt that called *spurious* [No. 145], a small volume, 16mo., dated 1663, without name either of printer, publisher, or licenser. We are led to this knowledge by the following advertisement in the *Publick Intelligencer*, published by authority, Dec. 23, 1662:—'There is stolen abroad a most false imperfect copy of a poem called Hudibras, without name either of printer or bookseller, as fit for so lame and spurious impression. The true and perfect edition, printed by the author's original, is sold by R. Marriot. . . . 'When the legitimate 'author's edition' came out in 1663, another smaller edition [Nos. 141 and 142], the size of the spurious one, appears to have been published at the same time, and by the same publishers, probably to compete in cheapness with its rival.'

The second part of the 'spurious edition' is a 'doggrel substitute' (Lowndes), no 'spurious edition' of the genuine second part having ever been published according to the latter. No 12mo. edition of the Third Part has ever been issued, either genuine or spurious.

THE FIRST EDITION OF THIS MOST CELEBRATED BOOK, of which three editions were published by Caxton himself ; AND THE THIRD WORK WITH WOODCUTS PRINTED IN ENGLAND.

Only about 30 copies of this edition are known to exist, all more or less imperfect, *the above copy being probably the only perfect one in existence.* Every leaf is genuine, beautifully clean, and sound, and very tall, measuring 13¼ by 9¼ inches, and the copy contains the life of St. Thomas of Canterbury, which is nearly always missing, owing to the jealous rage of King Henry VIII. Its only defects are that about 30 leaves are mended (the majority very slightly), the face of a woodcut figure on signature k 2 is damaged, and about 120 headlines have been more or less cut into.

The importance of this edition as regards typography and woodcuts is too well known to need further comment. It may however be mentioned that it was reprinted as one of the publications of the Kelmscott Press, and that the above copy was the one selected for the Caxton Celebration in 1877, and is described in the catalogue as No. 683.

Needless to say, no perfect copy has ever been recorded as sold by auction, and a very imperfect copy only is noted in 'Book-Prices Current' as having happened for sale within the last 20 years.

The importance of this opportunity to buy what probably constitutes the only perfect copy of one of the marvels of typography of England's earliest printer need not be further urged.

'There are two sizes of type, No. 3 being used for head-lines and headings to chapters, while No. 4* is used for the text. The whole is in double columns, and the lines, which are fully spaced cut, measure 3 inches ; there are 55 lines in a column, and 110 to a full page. There are folios throughout, but numbered very irregularly . . . Woodcuts are used throughout, apparently from the hand of the same artist who engraved the cuts for the second edition of the 'Chess Book'.

'This work may be considered the most laborious, as well as the most extensive, of all Caxton's literary and typographical labours. The compilation of the text only must have been a most arduous task, and the very extensive use of woodcuts must have been extremely expensive and troublesome . . . Although it is evident that this edition must have been larger than usual, *no perfect copy has yet been discovered.* The Legend of St. Thomas of Canterbury has been a special object of destruction, being, in nearly every instance, torn out of the volume.'—*IV. Blades.*

'The first issue appeared almost before the King's body was cold. Copies were eagerly bought and carefully treasured. Forty-six editions of it were issued in English during the first 12 months of its sale, as well as 3 editions in Latin, 4 in French, 2 in Dutch, and 1 in German.'

The authorship of the book was naturally questioned by the Regicide party, and it was for long customary to attribute it to JOHN GAUDEN, Bp. of Worcester, who claimed it at the Restoration. DR. CHRISTOPHER WORDSWORTH, Master of Trinity, who went very carefully into the question in 1824, was fully convinced of the Royal authorship, and that is also the opinion of MR. ALMACK.

'By republishing this Declaration in 1633, and enforcing with great severity the reading of it by the clergy in their churches, Charles I. and Laud excited among the Puritans a degree of indignation which contributed not a little to the downfall of the monarchy and the church. In 1644 the Long Parliament ordered all copies of it to be called in and publicly burned.' Hence the rarity of the work, of which there is no copy in the British Museum.

This is one of the rarest picces relating to the proposed Spanish marriage of King Charles I. when Prince of Wales, and is a florid and enthusiastic attempt to recommend it to the English people. The effort was however wasted, as through the Duke of Buckingham's arrogance the match was abruptly broken off. The infanta was married later to the Emperor Ferdinand III.

There is scarcely a subject in which the minuteness of design, and the delicacy and richness of

colouring of the Chinese artist show to greater advantage than in the delineation of the Vegetable Kingdom. In these he is superior to the best European artists, who might profitably study the methods of colouring from the above work, which not only ranks high as a work of art, but in itself represents a COMPREHENSIVE FIGURING OF THE FLORA OF CHINA.

As in almost all the historical works of its time, its contents mainly form a History of the Christian Church, and thus the earlier part of the book is full of biographies of saints, martyrdoms and miraculous occurrences. Nevertheless it contains many interesting original pieces, and the fact that great historical Collections, such as the 'Rerum Boicarum Scriptores' and 'Scriptores Rerum Polonicarum', give as original information what was merely gathered from this chronicle, is hardly as well known as its typographical interest and the naïf simplicity both of its text and woodcuts. Of the latter, those of the Creation of Eve, the Expulsion from Paradise, the Last Judgment, etc., are very large and vigorous, while the numerous views of cities are very interesting as contemporary views of a kind.

'It appears anciently to have been the practice of those masters who furnished designs for the wood-engravers to work from, carefully to avoid all cross-hatchings, which, it is probable, were beyond the power of the Xylographist to represent. Wolgemut perceived that, though difficult, this was not impossible; and in the cuts of the *Nuremberg Chronicle*, the execution of which (besides furnishing the designs) he doubtless superintended, a successful attempt was first made to imitate the bold hatchings of a pen-drawing, crossing each other, as occasion prompted the designer, in various directions: to him belongs the praise of having been the first who duly appreciated the powers of this art.'—*Otley*.

This is the account of the important Convocation of the Southern Province convened at Queen Mary's accession to vote a proposition declaratory of Transubstantiation. It lasted five days, and according to Heylyn very few of 'King Edward's clergy' were present. The principal participators were JOHN AYLMEY (Archdn. of Stow, later Bp. of London), RICHARD CHEYNEY (Archdn. of Hereford, later Bp. of Gloucester), JAMES HADDON (Dean of Exeter), JOHN MOREMAN (Principal of Hart Hall, Oxon.), WALTER PHILLIPS (Dean of Rochester), JOHN PHILPOT (Archdn. of Winchester, Protestant martyr), THOMAS WATSON (afterwards Bp. of Lincoln), and HUGH WESTON (Dean of Westminster, acting as Prolocutor), the first six being the opposers of the proposition.

It is scarcely necessary to point out the importance of this early work to the historian of political economy and sociology; nor is it of much less importance to the English philologist, as many trade words occur in it which could scarcely be found in contemporary literary works.

The above copy is a remarkably fine one and unusually clean, considering the wear and tear works of this kind must have undergone at the users' hands, which accounts for their extreme rarity.

The above edition contains a special preface by the editor of the Journal; 'If ever the Story of any private Man's Adventures in the World were worth making Publick, and were acceptable when Published, the Editor of this Account [*sic*] thinks this will be so. The Wonders of this Man's Life exceed all that (he thinks) is to be found Extant; the Life of one Man being scarce capable of a greater Variety . . . The Editor believes the thing to be a just History of Fact; neither is there any Appearance of Faction [*? Fiction*] in it,' etc. etc. etc.

It probably also forms the first example of a *feuilleton* issued with a newspaper. Some numbers contain at end *Continental News* under a column 'From the Foreign Prints.' Added is No. 398 of 'Parker's Penny Post,' Nov. 22, 1727, 4 pp. 4to.

The present copy belonged to **DR. PHILIP BLISS**, the antiquary and bibliophile, who has added a letter from the original owner, and a MS. extract from **T. Warton's Memorandum Book**, in which the authorship of the first volume of '*Robinson Crusoe*' is assigned to **ROBERT HARLEY, FIRST EARL OF OXFORD!**

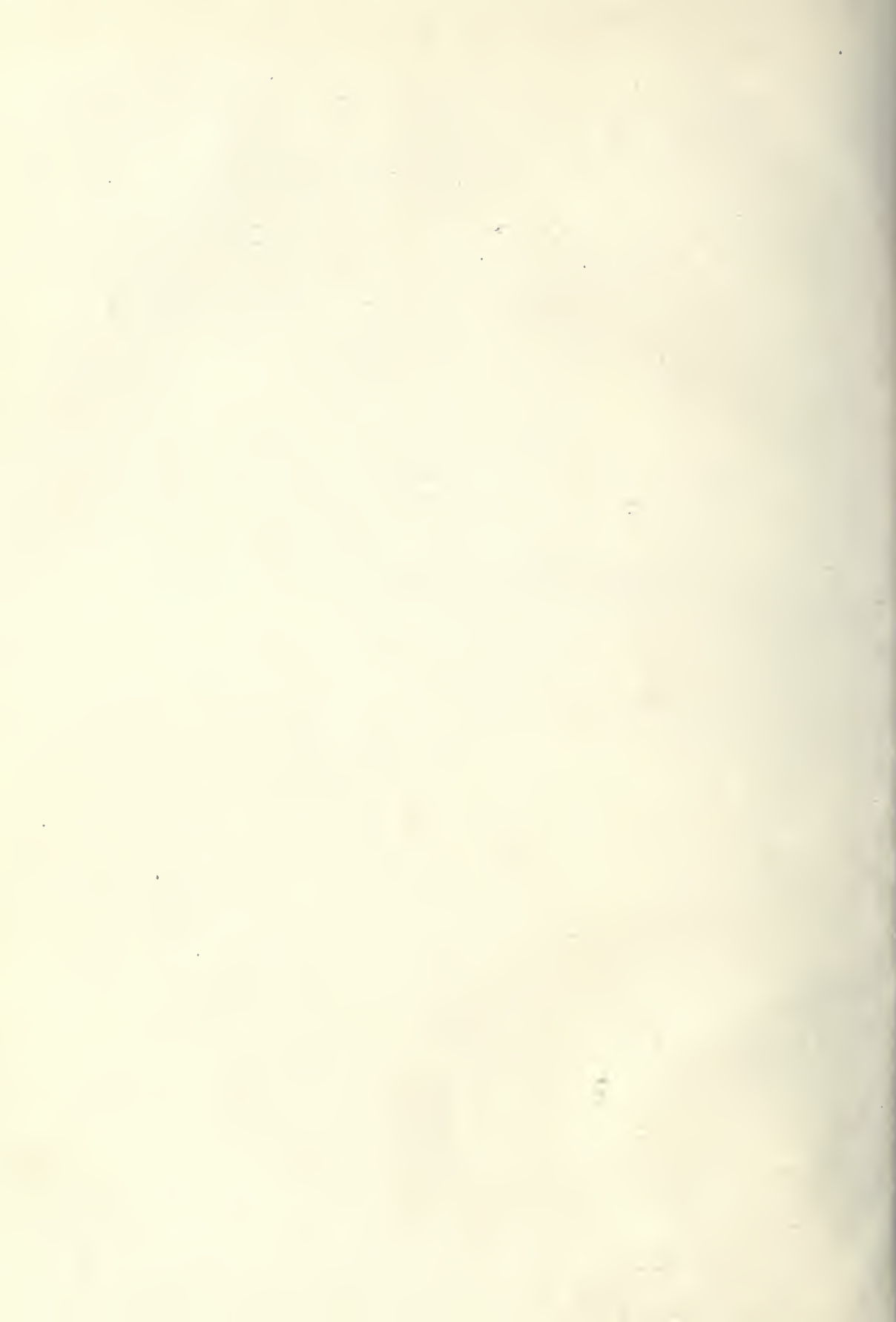

This edition is of excessive rarity, in fact much rarer than the first edition published by Pynson in 1493; as is shown by the fact that of eleven copies of the work sold at auction within the last 20 years, 9 were of Pynson's edition, while only 2 were of the above.

The authorship is generally attributed to HENRY PARKER, D.D., a Carmelite of Doncaster (d. 1470), who about 1464 was imprisoned by the Bishop of London for preaching a violent sermon, at Paul's Cross, in which he denounced the pride, arrogance, and self-indulgence of the bishops and the secular clergy. Much of this spirit is discernible in the above work, which altogether forms a curious commentary on the morals of the time.

A third edition was printed by Thomas Berthelet in 1536, and others in 8vo. (according to Anthony à Wood) in 1538 and 1586. No copies of these are to be found in the British Museum, and it is doubtful whether they were ever issued.

It should be noted that the very few copies of Wynkyn de Worde's edition which happen for sale are nearly always hopelessly imperfect and defective, while the above is a BEAUTIFUL COPY of a most interesting example of his press.

An exceptionally choice and tall copy, measuring $11\frac{7}{8} \times 7\frac{1}{8}$ inches, and containing the 6 unpagued leaves between pp. 643 and 644, comprising 'The famous voyage of Sir Francis Drake into the South Sea, and there hence about the whole Globe of the Earth', which were suppressed in the original work, although originally intended to be published. As an explanation the author mentions in his preface, that he had been 'seriously delt withall, not to anticipate or prevent another man's paines', and to have 'yielded unto his friends.' Some copies of the account were however privately printed, and afterwards inserted in a few copies.

Inserted is also, between pp. 505 and 506 (supplied from a shorter copy) the rare revised version of Sir Jerome Bowes's account of his Embassy to the 'Emperour of Moscouia, printed this second time, according to the true copy I receiued of a gentleman that went in the same voyage, for the corrections of the errors in the former impression.'

This 'Second Account' was unknown to Lowndes, and seems to be very rare.

The map of the above edition differs from that contained in the 2nd one of 1598-1600, and is excessively rare, Lowndes remarking, in describing the Jadis copy (1821), that it contained 'a map referred to in the preface, not then known to exist in any other copy.'

An unusually fine copy of the author's first publication, and also unusually complete, agreeing with the collation of the Grenville copy given in *L.c.w.r.d.s.*, and containing the blank leaf after signature G 3, which was absent in the Grenville copy, and unknown to Lowndes. It also contains the 4 ll. forming the second signature A (which are nearly always missing), containing: 'A latin copie of the letters patentes of King Henrie the seventh, graunted vnto John Gabote and his three sonnes, Lewes, Sebastian, and Santius for the discovering of newe and unknown landes' (in Latin); 'The same letters patents in english', and 'A note of Sebastian Gabotes voyage of discoverie, taken out of an old Chronicle written by Robert Fabian sometime Alderman of London, which is in the custodie of John Stowe Citizen, a diligent searcher and preseruer of Antiquities'.

The above copy is moreover most remarkable for its tall and faultless condition, is genuine throughout, without the slightest repair or blemish, and measures $7\frac{3}{8} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, a few ll. showing even their original uncropped state. The maps, which according to Lowndes are to be found genuine only in the Grenville copy, are in well-executed facsimile, and altogether the above copy may safely be called the finest in existence.

The work is of well-known rarity, only one copy, and that very imperfect and in a poor state, having happened for sale at auction within the last twenty years.

While the title and preliminary leaves are of the first issue, the body of the book is probably that of the 2nd issue printed in the same year.

The work was completed after Hall's death by the printer, who unkindly calls him in his address to the reader, 'a man in the later tyme of his lyfe not so paynful and studious as before he had ben'—an early example of the Wicked Publisher. It is however a work of the greatest authority, and frequently quoted by Mr. Froude and other historians. Together with Holinshed's Chronicle it forms the source whence Shakespeare drew the materials for his English historical plays.

'It is for the early years of Henry VIII. that he becomes an authority of the greatest value, not so much for the facts which he relates as for the light which he throws upon the social life and opinions of his times. He expresses the profound loyalty of the middle class, and represents the conditions which rendered possible the policy of the king. His descriptions of festivities of the court are full and vivid; he shows us the discontent awakened by Wolsey, and gives many instructive accounts of London life, and of the growing spirit of independence among Englishmen. His literary merits are of high order, especially in his account of the opposition which Wolsey's masterful proceedings aroused; his power of describing a mob is admirable. Hall has scarcely yet met with due recognition. His chronicle was one of the books prohibited by Mary in 1555, and in consequence became rare'.—*Bp. Creighton*.

Mr. Keble, in his account of this original edition, 'acknowledges his obligations to the Rev. Dr. Bliss, for the use of a copy of this rare volume, including also the fifth book, first edition, in correcting the press', and also for the following note regarding the two:—'The four first books were, according to Maunsel, printed in 1592-3. Walton, however (and he is probably right), says they did not appear till the year 1594. The fifth was published by itself in 1597, the printer being the person who executed the first part in 1594. It is singular that neither Ames nor Herbert, who notice the first part (*Typograph. Antiq.* v. ii. p. 1230), knew anything of the fifth book. What they say of the four first is quoted from Maunsel (*Catalogue*, part i. p. 59), and the *Stationers' Register*.—*Hooker's Works, Keble's edition, preface, vii.*

The above is probably the finest edition of Hours executed by Kerver, and is excessively rare, no copy having happened for sale within the last 20 years. The present copy is not only in an exceptionally fine condition and very tall, measuring 8¾ × 5⅞ inches, but remarkable for its superior colouring, specially important when illustrating contemporary costume.

The large oval illustrations to the Almanac are especially valuable as illustrating the life of man at the period at intervals of 6 years for each month, beginning with the child playing at the age of six (for January) to the death-bed scene at 72 (for December), and illustrating in a remarkable degree the life of the *bourgeoisie* at the beginning of the XVI. Century.

This is no doubt the original manuscript of this celebrated work on the events of the Fronde, and is of the highest interest to every student of the great age of French literature, and second only in importance to the author's 'Maximes' themselves. It bears on the title the following inscription: 'Ces mémoires ont été donnés à M. Dandilly par M. de La Rochefoucauld lui-même. Manuscript infiniment curieux étant orig. et le seul.' An autograph note in French underneath (probably by A. A. Renouard, the editor of the edition of 1804-17) states it to be by [Alexandre Nicolas] de la Rochefoucauld, Marquis de Surgères [1709-60].

The above manuscript is especially interesting in consideration of the fact that so many unauthentic MSS. of the work are known to exist, and that the author himself disavowed the genuineness of the first edition of 1662, and of the two reprints of 1663 and 1664.

No description brief enough for a catalogue can give anything like an adequate conception of the contents of the above set. Some of the engravings are in two states, and in many cases there are several different views of the same place. Here and there is inserted a local Tract, or a MS. copy of a monumental inscription. Altogether, it must have cost many years of patient effort to collect and arrange with so much judgment and taste so large an assemblage of materials for the illustration of these valuable works, and many times the amount at which the collection is now offered.

'A MAGNIFICENT SPECIMEN OF EARLY CALIGRAPHY, WITH EXQUISITE ILLUMINATIONS, from M. LIBRI'S library, who discovered it in a chemist's shop, where it was being used for wrapping up medicines. It is unfortunately imperfect, as it begins with the fourth verse of Isaiah. The Paralipomena (Chronicles) in this MS. follow Daniel. After the Apocalypse is the psalm 'Pusillus eram,' which, occurring neither in the Hebrew nor the Septuagint, was often omitted, followed by 'Oratio devota de Sancto Sacramento quando Sacerdos se preparat ad Missam.' It is apparent that at some period these splendid volumes belonged to the Monastery of Justemont, near Metz, as there is at end a long and ancient inscription of 'Philip the Abbot' (who is not in the list of the Abbots of that house given in the *Gallia Christiana*, vol. XIII. p. 948), recounting that the lamp in the church was to be kept, 'usque in eternum,' with oil at the expense of 'Arnulphus Præpositus,' perhaps the Arnulfus or Ernulfus of Beauvais, a friend of St. Anselm, who became afterwards Bishop of Rochester, a magnificent patron of literature and art. The illuminations in gold and colours contained in the capital letters (from 6 to 8 inches in length and upwards) at the beginning of the Psalter, of the Proverbia, of the different Gospels, etc. are in the finest style of the art of that period, and deserve the attention both of the artist and the antiquary for the manner in which Biblical subjects are introduced in those paintings. The *Canones* also are very finely coloured

The numerous numerical figures are written according to the ancient Roman alphabetical system. Although imperfect, this Biblical manuscript is still, even in its present state, one of the finest and richest specimens of writing of the kind which has come down from our remote ancestors. The illuminations are quite in the style of those which are in the beautiful Bible formerly at St. Mary's and St. Nicholas, at Arnstein in Bavaria, now one of the principal ornaments of the British Museum; but in this Bible the characters are finer and of a more ancient shape, the ink is also blacker and more brilliant than in the Arnstein Bible.—*Description by a former owner.*

This beautiful Manuscript, on the finest thin vellum, with very large margins, is remarkable not only for the unusual freshness of its preservation, its only defect being a few ll. at beginning wormed on the blank margin, but chiefly for the beauty of its illuminations, which can even be better appreciated when seen under the magnifying glass, and such as are only to be met with in Manuscripts of the period.

The ornamental borders to the miniatures, which consist of a quasi-grotesque combination of animals and foliage, show the transitional stage of floriated ornament, which, together with the elongated initial letters, would assign the date of its execution to the end of the Thirteenth Century. The workmanship is probably Italian.

A FINE TENTH CENTURY GOSPEL BOOK:

A Manuscript remarkable alike for its beauty and evenness of execution, and for its excellent preservation.

It is of undoubted English workmanship, an autograph letter enclosed from the late DEAN HENDERSON mentioning 'This seems to be correctly dated X. Century. I should guess it by comparison with facsimiles of dated MSS. to have been written between 910 and 925.' The same very competent authority also assigns the workmanship as English on account of the rope pattern in the illuminated initials, 'some of which are the true Eternity design, *i.e.* without beginning and without end.'

It need scarcely be pointed out that English Manuscripts of such an early date are of extreme rarity—as a matter of fact quite unprocurable; while the above represents not only a remarkable specimen of calligraphy—an art which seems to have been quite lost after the Conquest—but is in a remarkably well-preserved state.

The large illuminated initials are in the well-known 'Celtic' style of the period, of which the first especially is a very fine example.

- 293 FIRDAUSÍ (OR FIRDUSÍ [*i.e.* ABÚ-'L KÁSIM MANSÚR] SHAH NÁMA (OR BOOK OF KINGS): a superb Manuscript, beautifully written in Persian letters on Seven Hundred leaves of native glazed paper, each page comprising four

columns or divisions, separated by gold lines, surrounded by a border of the same character; each of the four books with a beautifully illuminated head-piece, and the first two leaves of each surrounded by gold borders; **FURTHER ILLUSTRATED WITH SIXTY MOST CHARMING ILLUSTRATIONS** in the text (their average size $6\frac{1}{4} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches), very richly coloured and profusely illuminated with gold and silver, chiefly representing **Battle-Scenes and Executions**, folio ($12\frac{3}{4} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ inches), **BEAUTIFULLY BOUND IN A CONTEMPORARY PERSIAN BINDING**, THE LACQUERED PANELS COVERED WITH A RICH AND BEAUTIFUL DESIGN IN GOLD AND BLUE ON A RED GROUND, *double with leather* (? *russia*); the whole in a most perfect state of preservation (see illustration), £500. *Sæc. XVII.*

This Manuscript may fairly claim to rank among the highest of its class in point of artistic beauty and ornamentation, the miniatures being executed in gold and colours of the most vivid hue, in the inimitable manner peculiar to the Oriental School when it had reached its highest point of excellence, and with a minuteness of design, and a profusion and excellence of colouring, which almost dwarfs into insignificance the examples of mediæval European miniature-colouring.

The work itself is well-known as the Persian epic, and as such many illustrated copies were made; but it may well be doubted whether one equal to the present in the beauty of its illustrations has ever come into the market. The above manuscript belonged to Dr. Philip Bliss, pr., and was sold with the rest of his library, in 1853, but there is no clue as to the original owner.

The particular illumination figured in our illustration has an interest of its own in connexion with a celebrated controversy, in which DR. LIDDON was browbeaten by Turcophils for believing that he and Canon MacColl had seen the victims of impalement during the Bulgarian Atrocities.

- 294 **HORÆ BEATÆ Mariæ VIRGINIS [cum CALENDARIO]**, a Manuscript on 176 leaves of vellum, *probably of FLEMISH WORKMANSHIP, written in a large gothic letter, in black and red ink, with 16 full-page miniatures, WITH BROAD FLORAL BORDERS (2 defaced), also 2 ILLUMINATED INITIALS surrounded by an elaborate floral design, and numerous other initials in blue, red, and gold, 24mo. finely bound in crushed brown Levant morocco super-extra, tooled sides and centre-ornaments, enclosed in a handsome BLACK MOROCCO CASE, lined with purple silk, £35.* *Sæc. XV.*

- 295 **HORÆ BEATÆ Mariæ VIRGINIS, cum CALENDARIO**; a Manuscript on 126 ll. of fine vellum, each page most beautifully illuminated with a broad ornamental border, representing scrolls of flowers, fruits, and animals (*those surrounding the large vignettes on a gold ground*), with 96 very charming large illuminated vignettes (measuring $2\frac{1}{4} \times 1\frac{3}{4}$ inches), and 24 smaller ones illustrating the Almanac; the whole MS. remarkable for the beauty of its execution and the delicacy of colouring; *in addition to the numerous finely illuminated initials, sq. 24mo. finely bound in dark purple morocco antique super-extra, richly blind-tooled sides and back, old g. e. (in very fine condition); see illustration facing page 57, £420.* *Sæc. XI.*

Unquestionably one of the most beautiful specimens of the art of illumination at the middle of the XVth Century. It is no doubt of French workmanship, and the minuteness of the colouring of the vignettes is scarcely less marvellous than the beauty of their conception. They represent the Passion, Biblical Subjects, and scenes from the lives and martyrdoms of the Saints—very prominent among the latter being the slaying of St. Bartholomew, the stoning of St. Stephen, the roasting of St. Lawrence, St. Blaise having his flesh torn by iron combs, the scourging of St. Barbara, etc. etc. The representations are most realistic, although free from any of the coarseness that might be expected bearing in mind their early date. Very beautiful are representations of St. George and the Dragon, the Temptation of St. Anthony, and St. Margaret and the Dragon, and—most interesting to English Churchmen—the murder of St. Thomas of Canterbury. All the details are of great minuteness and fidelity, so as to exhibit a valuable document on contemporary costume, etc. Among these may be mentioned a Bishop in his library, and a row of ships, with a prayer underneath beginning 'O felix Britannia tam decore germine virgini ornata.'

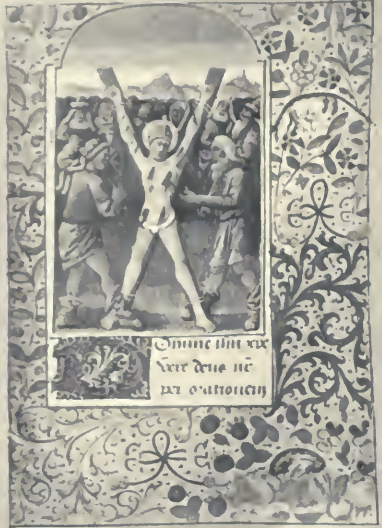
The smaller vignettes of the Almanac illustrate country callings and astronomical symbols.

probably these of the person for whom the work was produced. Altogether it would scarcely be possible to find a more beautiful specimen of illumination of its period, and it would form an ornament even to a library already rich in this fascinating branch of art.

This beautiful Egyptian MS., 'every letter' of which 'is a picture,' is stated by a former owner to have 'belonged to the conventual tomb of the SULTAN BERKOOKH, near Cairo, into whose library it was placed by himself at the close of the XIV. Century, and out of which the Rev. — Lieder of Cairo obtained it and gave it me.'

- 297 **MISSALE ad USUM ECCLESIE EBORACENSIS, cum CALENDARIO; an English Manuscript** on 186 leaves of fine vellum, written in gothic letter in black and red inks, with numerous painted and ornamented initials, the larger ones filled up with elaborate ornaments, folio, beautifully bound in maroon crushed Levant morocco antique super-extra, the sides and back covered with elaborate and fine blind-tooling, by Riviere (first leaf stained and soiled, and a hole in the 4th leaf, otherwise in good preservation), £350. *Sæc. XII. et XV.*

This very remarkable Manuscript was reprinted, under the editorship of the late DEAN HENDERSON, in vol. 59 of the Surtees Society's Publications, where it is given as the EARLIEST KNOWN YORK MISSAL. The following is extracted from a collation of the above MS. in the preface of the reprint: 'Foll. 1-52. Part of a Missal of the 12th Century, containing the Calendar, and followed by the Collects, Secrets, and Postcommunions for the Temporale of the year. It contains also the Canon of the Mass, with an additional clause . . . One or two ll. are missing in this part . . . Foll. 53-154. A fragment of a Missal, also of the 12th Century, but not of the Use of York, which has been corrected by a later hand, and adapted, though imperfectly, to the York Use. This supplies the remaining portion of the Missæ in the Temporale beginning with the first Sunday in Advent, and ending with the 22nd Sunday after Trinity. Foll. 136-42, containing from the Vigil of the Ascension to First Sunday after Trinity, are an insertion in a late hand. This fragment differs from the three printed Uses [other MSS. reprinted in the volume] . . . Foll. 155-85 by later hands, containing the remainder of the Temporale, and full Masses for a Dedicatio Ecclesie, and for the Sanctiorale from the Vigil of St. Andrew to St. Matthew's Day. This part is of the 15th Century and the Use of York.'

A MS. note by a former owner gives the following information as to its crigin: 'This Service Book was originally in Beverley Minster & then in Roche Abbey till its Dissolution. Since that time it has been in the house of a Family in its neighbourhood, from whom I purchased it.'

This beautiful MS., which would seem to be of French workmanship, and was probably executed in the early part of the XV. Century, is most remarkable for the *minutie* in the execution of its illustrations. Although the size of most of these does not exceed one square inch, the faithfulness of all the details is most remarkable, and could scarcely have been produced without the use of a magnifying glass. The illustrations represent Biblical subjects, or episodes from the lives and martyrdoms of Saints.

301 PSALTERIUM LATINUM, cum COMMENTARIO: Manuscript on 204 leaves of fine vellum ($11\frac{1}{8} \times 8\frac{1}{4}$ inches), beautifully executed in a small and neat gothic letter; the text in red, and the commentary in black, with 21 charmingly illuminated initials (one $2 \times 2\frac{1}{4}$, twelve $1\frac{1}{4} \times 1\frac{1}{4}$, and eight $\frac{3}{8} \times \frac{1}{2}$ inches), the first representing the figure of King David, and the rest consisting of beautiful ornaments of plants and animals; also numerous other initials painted in red and blue, with plain ornaments, small folio, old velvet binding on thick oaken boards, the obverse having a painting on a sunken panel, representing the Flight into Egypt, supposed to be by Benozzo Gozzoli, the sides strengthened with brass ornaments, and each corner having a SQUARE BRAZEN TABLET INLAID WITH COLOURED ENAMEL, representing the Evangelistic symbols, the whole enclosed in a green morocco case (see illustration facing page 27), £315. *Sæc. A fine specimen of an early XIV. Century manuscript, in beautiful preservation, and very remarkable from its binding, the painting on the latter being however slightly cracked and rubbed.

The initials are models of contemporary illumination, executed with infinite skill and great resource of ornamentation.

A beautiful and very unusual illuminated manuscript, from the curious figures and ornaments accompanying each miniature. They consist of a leaf-ornament extending from top to bottom of the text, which is often connected with human figures, mostly in grotesque attitudes and sometimes with animals' heads. Of a very original conception is also the connexion formed by the miniature with the ornament, all in a more or less grotesque style.

The colouring is profuse, and the painting extremely well executed, although one type of face seems to preponderate in the 'portraits' of saints.

With the exception of some figures discoloured or disfigured, the manuscript is in an excellent preservation. There is no clue as to its workmanship, which is probably Italian. St. Thomas of Canterbury's day appears in the kalendar without the usual Henrician scrabbling.

Only two English editions were printed of this important work, which caused Melanchthon's estrangement from the more zealous Lutherans for his too close approximation to Calvin's doctrine on the Lord's Supper. The date of the above edition is given on the authority of the British Museum Catalogue. The translator is not known.

The above is really the *first issue (or title-page) of the first edition*, and classed as such by Professor Masson. Lowndes however (in his *Bibliographer's Manual*) makes it the *second title-page*, a statement on which Mr. Henry G. Bohn (editor of 'Lowndes') remarks: 'It should be observed, that although this variation is placed as the second, it is just as likely to be the first, as there is no evidence to the contrary.' A little reflexion moreover should have shown that Lowndes's statement was erroneous, for it is scarcely likely that the small type of the author's name, probably a result of the latter's unwillingness to have his name (none too popular at the time) printed prominently, should represent the second titlepage; while it is much more reasonable to suppose that the author's name should have been brought into harmony with the rest of the text by printing it in a larger type in the second issue.

It should however be noted that Lowndes's *dictum* is still religiously stuck to in booksellers' and auctioneers' catalogues, and the above is therefore still generally catalogued as the 'second-title page.'

The above copy is specially interesting for having belonged to John Philip Kemble, the actor, who has written his name 'J. P. Kemble' on the reverse of the title.

It is no credit to English literary taste, even if we make every allowance for Milton's unpopularity as a regicide and the apologist of Parliamentary oppression and intolerance, that it took three years, after taxing all the publisher's ingenuity in dishing up old issues as new, to sell out the first edition of 1300 copies of the greatest English epic poem.

Lowndes's titlepage summary is by no means complete, and new ones have since been suggested. But on the whole it is still the best, and therefore generally kept by bibliographers. Exception must however be taken to his placing of titlepages 1 and 2, and to his 'No. 5', which probably never existed.

As to the rarity of the various issues, the following summary of 52 copies of the various issues of the first edition, which have been sold at auction within the last five years, may be of interest. It should be noted that all titlepages are according to Lowndes:—1st (4), 2nd (2), 3rd (2), 4th (13), 5th (0), 6th (2), 7th (26), 8th (3).

Gerard of Flanders was the first printer of Treviso. His type resembles that of Nicolas Jenson, in whose office according to v. d. Meersche he was employed.

This copy belonged to PHILIP BLISS, pr., LL D., the antiquary, who has added the following note on flyleaf: 'It appears that the King commanded the Abp. of Canterbury with six other bishops, whom he then named, to advise together concerning a public fast and a form of prayer, to implore the divine mercy, the Pestilence then beginning to spread, and the extraordinary wet weather to threaten a famine. The Bishops were London (Montaigne), Durham (Neal), Winchester (Andrewes), Norwich (Harsnet), Rochester (Buckeridge), St. David's (Laud).' There is also a

MS. note by a former owner, saying: 'Here 1st appears Laud's Prayer for Parliament, introduced into Common Prayer by Convocation 1662.'

The 'Exhortation' at end has an interesting passage, referring to the neglect on the part of the magistrates to take measures for preventing the spread of the contagion, underlined by a contemporary hand, and stating that 'these underlined are left out in the booke of 1636'.

There is no copy of the work in the *British Museum Catalogue of Early English Books to 1640*.

At end is 'An Exhortation fit for the Time' (pp. 17), containing some very plain remarks on the morals of the period.

The 'Great Plague of 1665' was the heaviest that ever visited London with the exception of the Black Death. It started at St. Giles's, and in London alone caused over 97,000 deaths out of a population of about 500,000.

The above copy also belonged to DR. BLISS, and has his initials on signature B1.

It was originally published in 1657.

The Book of Common Prayer 'for the Use of the Church of Scotland' (1637), commonly known as '*Laud's Prayer-book*,' was a revision of the English Prayer-Book, in the construction of which Wedderburn, Bp. of Dunblane, and Maxwell, Bp. of Ross, were chiefly concerned, their English advisers being Laud, Wren, and Juxon. It is mainly remarkable for its reverting in the Communion Service to some of the characteristic features of the First Prayer-Book of Edward VI.—e.g. (1) the 'Invocation', and (2) the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. It is also interesting to notice that the Scottish revision anticipated and happily met some of the difficulties that have since been raised in respect to the Athanasian Creed. The prose psalter of this prayer-book was taken from the authorised Version of the Bible. The word 'presbyter' was used instead of 'priest.' The calendar records the names of certain Scottish saints—e.g. Columba, Ninian, Serf, Queen Margaret, etc.

The attempt to force this prayer-book on the Scottish people in an arbitrary manner, emphasised, as it was, by the riot in St. Giles's Cathedral, Edinburgh, on the occasion of its first being read (23d July 1637), and the national uprising that followed, are parts of civil history. It should be added that the Scottish prayer-book, which had seemed to be strangled at its birth, was 24 years afterwards among the most potent influences affecting the revision which has brought the English Prayer-Book to its present shape.—*Bp. Dowden.*

This is an excessively rare edition, quite unnoticed by bibliographers. It is the last edition but one printed by Wynkyn de Worde (the British Museum Catalogue fixes the date as ca. 1520), and generally agrees with the collation of his last edition of 1527, although it widely differs in its type and woodcuts.

The above copy wants the Title, and signatures A 8, x 4-5, ll 2-7, rr 7-ss3, xx 1, and yy 8—in all 17 ll., but is, save for a few wormholes, in remarkably sound and tall condition.

It may be mentioned here that the above copy is much more perfect than the one in the British Museum, and that very few other copies of this edition are known to exist.

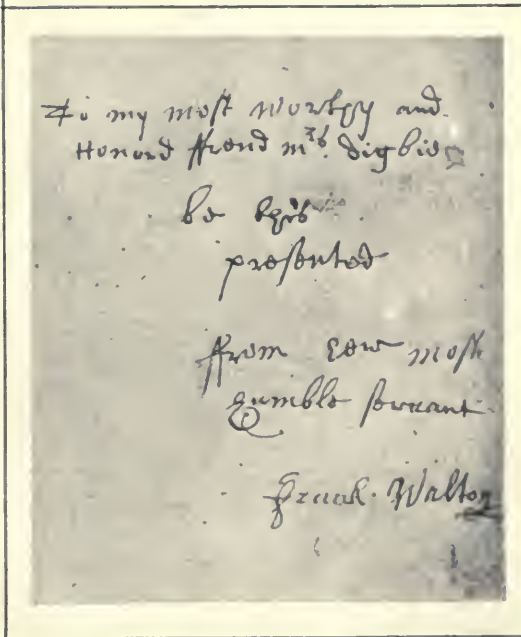
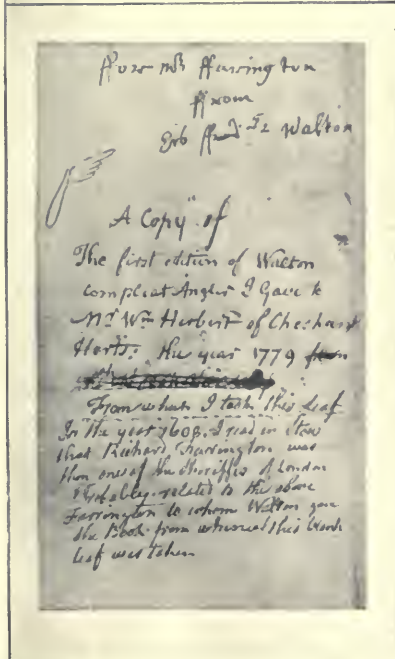
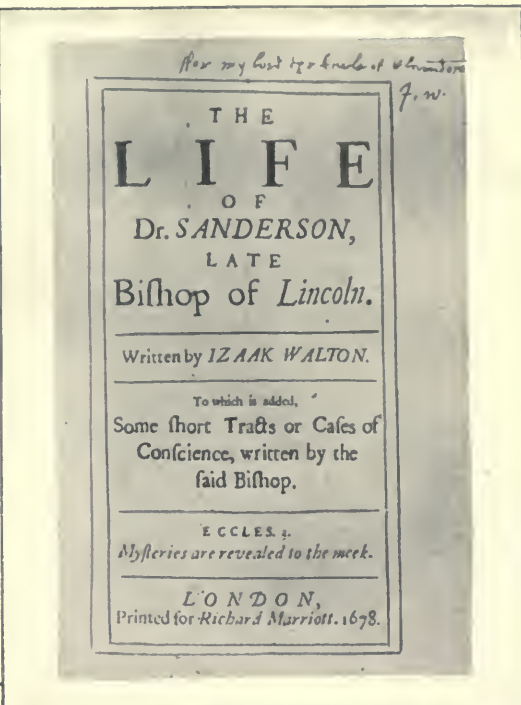

John Fitzwilliam, D.D., was Walton's brother-in-law, and afterwards became chaplain to the Duke of York and tutor to Princess (afterwards Queen) Anne, and was a fellow of Magdalen College, Oxon., from 1661 to 1670.

This offer of original editions of Walton's ' Angler ' and ' Lives ' forms a unique opportunity which may never again happen, bearing in mind the choice and genuine condition of all the above copies, and the interesting inscriptions in most of them.

Nearly all copies of the above works now occurring for sale are more or less imperfect, and fine copies are very difficult to get. The prices realised for good copies of original editions have moreover been rapidly rising during the last few years.

It may be added that as far back as 1897 the Ashburnham collection of the first five editions of the ' Angler ' alone fetched £800.

A former owner has added a neat note to the title, expressing some doubt, whether the inscription was actually by Walton. This was however satisfactorily settled by the late owner of this copy, who has added a MS. note on flyleaf: 'I have compared the handwriting on the title page with several of Walton's Autographs, & there is no Doubt it is his.' The seal on p. 57, representing the Body of Christ extended on an anchor, accompanies the text 'In Sacram Anchoram Piscatoris George Herbert.' These seals were made for Dean Donne, who sent specimens to some of his best friends. A printed account of this is added to the book.

This, one of Wiclif's few writings in English, was very popular among the early Reformers, and was often reprinted by them. The last 17 pp. contain 'The testament of maister Wylliam Tracie esquier, expounded by William Tyndall. Wherein thou shalt perceyue with what charite the chaunceller of worcester burned when he toke vp the deed carcas and made asshes of it after it was buried.'
- 'Tracy adopted Luther's religious views, and shortly before his death in 1530 he made a will in which he expressed his belief in justification by faith, and refused to make any bequests to the clergy. Objection was taken to the will as an heretical document when it came to be proved in the ecclesiastical courts, and eventually it was brought before Convocation. After prolonged discussions the will was pronounced heretical, Tracy was declared unworthy of Christian burial, and Abp. Warham directed Dr. Thomas Parker to exhume Tracy's body. Parker exceeded his instructions, and had Tracy's remains burnt at the stake. The incident created some sensation . . . and Parker had eventually to pay a fine of £300. Tracy's will became a sort of sacred text to the reformers; possessing copies of it was frequently made a charge against them.'—A. F. Pollard.

THE FIRST ISSUE OF THE FIRST PRAYER BOOK OF KING EDWARD VI., AND OF EXTREME RARITY.

There were at least seven editions of the Common Prayer issued in 1549, which differ not only in the colophons, but in the body of the text. It was for many years disputed as to which was really the first issue, the priority of the above edition being not so obvious as it would at first sight appear, from the New Year often only beginning with Lady Day, in which case the *Mense Martii* edition would have been issued according to modern reckoning in 1550. Mr. Lathbury however proved in his 'History' that the above edition actually appeared in March, 1549: 'I have proved by direct evidence that the Book was used in London on Easter Day, which in that year fell on April 21st; consequently the Book must have been printed before that day: and therefore the March edition must be the first, since the next did not appear until May.'

The above copy has the rare official price list, printed on rev. of the 'Certayne Notes for the more . . . decent ministracion, . . . , stating 'that no maner of person do sell this presente booke unbounde, above the price of ii shyllinges the piece. And the same bounde in paste or in boordes, not above the price of three shyllinges and foure pence the piece.'

The above copy is specially interesting for having belonged to NATHANIEL LORD CREWE, Bp. OF DURHAM (1633-1722), the munificent founder of the Charity at Bamborough Castle, who has added the following note on flyleaf: 'N.B. This is so great a Curiosity I apprehend $\frac{1}{2}$ value of it to be at least Ten Guineas.' In confirmation a MS. note by a former owner states: 'This Book belonged to Lord Crewe Bp. of Durham, time of Chas. 2nd, and descended to LORD ALVANLEY [C. J.]. At his death his Library was sold and I bought this Vol: The opposite leaf was the flyleaf of the old binding & is in the handwriting of the Bp.'

'In this book, with singular ability, attaining at times the level of genius, Cranmer and his coadjutors translated and adapted the breviary services of Matins, Lauds, and Prime, so as to construct the 'Morning Prayer' of the Book of Common Prayer; while in a similar way Vespers and Compline were brought into the form of the 'Evening Prayer.' The English services were shortened chiefly by the great reduction of the number of psalms to be 'sung or said' daily. The lectionary was so arranged that the greater portion of the Old Testament was read through systematically in the course of the year, while the whole of the New Testament (with the exception

of the Apocalypse) was read through thrice. The old English Missals formed the basis of the English Communion Service, but therewith were combined the new features which had appeared in the 'Order of the Communion' (1548). The other services, as those for Baptism, Matrimony, Burial, etc., were similarly framed, with much discrimination, from the corresponding mediæval services. The ecclesiastical books of the Eastern Church were not wholly unknown to the Reformers, as is testified to by their adoption of the so-called 'Prayer of St. Chrysostom,' and by the unquestionable fact that the Athanasian Creed was translated by them from a Greek and not from a Latin text. Occasionally the revisers did not scruple to adopt features from more modern sources (*e.g.* the *Pia Deliberatio* of the reforming Abp. Hermann of Cologne). The liturgical revision of 1549 was conducted in a spirit at once conservative and critical, and is marked by a singular combination of independence with reverence for the past.—*Bp. Dowden.*

The above choice copy belonged to ROBERT DALY, Bp. of Cashel, and contains on a blank leaf at end an inscription by an earlier owner (a WILLIAM WOODDE), in a late XVIth Century hand, presenting the book, with elaborate blessings, to 'his trewe servante.'

The above volume, of the greatest rarity, is of the deepest interest to English Churchmen—second only to that of the First Prayer Book itself—as it gives, within a year of the publication of that book, the complete English Ritual set to the ancient Plainsong. It is in fact one more evidence that the reform and translation of the Sarum Missal and Breviary, whose result was the Book of Common Prayer, was felt to be no break with the past, as even the ancient ritual music was at once adapted by authority to the reformed Ritual. From the religious point of view there are those who regret that owing to the troubled times of the ensuing century this Gregorian setting never came into general use, with the result that, save for the responses and the Litany, Church music at the Restoration became stereotyped in florid 'Anglican' compositions, to the practical destruction of congregational singing, and the consequent deadening of the people's faith.

The adapter, JOHN MERBECKE or MARBECK, was organist to St. George's Chapel, Windsor, and is also known as the author of the first English Concordance to the Bible (*q. v., No. 83 anti*). Copious accounts of the book, with large extracts, will be found in Burney's History of Music, Vol. II, pp. 578-84, and Hawkins's History, Vol. III, pp. 469-76. It was reprinted in facsimile by William Pickering (itself scarce), while it was published in an amplified form, with valuable illustrative matter, by that earnest Churchman William Dyce, R.A., in 1844.

Copies are of extreme rarity, and the present is only the second copy that the advertisers have been able to trace as having happened for sale for over forty years. The above copy is both perfect and genuine throughout, and in excellent condition with good margins.

This copy is most remarkable for its excellent preservation, being not only genuine and perfect throughout, but also in beautifully clean condition—a unique circumstance as regards copies happening for sale.

Equally unique, and of great interest, is the woodcut of the Blessed Virgin at end, which was unknown to Lowndes, and is absent from the British Museum copy. As it has the same watermark, there is no doubt that it was published with the work.

Another unique occurrence is a leaf between sigg. O 1 and 2, beginning 'Although no ordre can be perfectlye deuysed' etc. (the original 'BLACK RUBRIC'), of which a MS. note by a former owner says: 'It was inserted after the Book was prepared for issuing & delayed its publication till Nov. 1552. The only reprint I find of this leaf is in the 4to. Edition of Edw. 6. without date [q. v. infra] showing that it was printed between Nov. 1552 & July 1553 when Edward died.'

It contains the 2 ll. of the Act of Uniformity, and the separate title to the Ordinal, and its collation agrees with that given by Lowndes for the Third Issue.

'Owing to home influences, and partly to the influence of foreign reformers (many of whom were

then resident in England), Cranmer and his associates ceased to be content with the doctrinal colouring of the First Prayer-book; and in 1552 there appeared a revised book (the Second Prayer-book of Edward VI.), marked by many changes mainly favourable to more Protestant views. As a characteristic example may be cited the change made in the words used at the Communion in delivering the consecrated elements. In 1549 the words ran 'The body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was given for thee, preserve thy body and soul unto everlasting life'. 'The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ', etc. In 1552 these words were expunged, and for them were substituted 'Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee, and feed on him in thy heart by faith, with thanksgiving'. 'Drink this in remembrance', etc. . . . From the baptismal service the exorcism, trine immersion, anointing, and the use of the chrisom (or white robe) were omitted. From the burial service prayers for the dead were removed. The vestments of priests and deacons were reduced to the surplice, and those of the bishop to a rochette, for all ministrations. Among changes then made, though of little or no doctrinal significance, may be mentioned the addition of the sentences, introductory address, general confession, and absolution of morning and evening prayer and of the decalogue and responses to the Communion service.'—*Bp. Dowden*.

'On Queen Elizabeth's accession the personal ecclesiastical sentiments of that masterful monarch made themselves sensibly felt. In the newly-revised Prayer-Book of 1559 [Q. Elizabeth's first; uniform with the above] very few changes were made, but they pointed in one direction. The vestments and ornaments of the prayer-book of 1549 were again enjoined; in the litany the words 'From the tyranny of the bishop of Rome and all his detestable enormities, good Lord, deliver us', were omitted; in the Communion Service the words of Edward's two books at the delivery of the Elements were combined in the form still in use; the declaration concerning kneeling (the so-called 'Black-Rubric') appended to the Communion Service of Edward VI.'s Second Prayer-book was omitted.'—*Bp. Dowden*.

THIS QUARTO EDITION IS ALMOST UNIQUE, and all but quite unknown, forming the fourth edition of James I.'s Prayer Book, the second and third being published in the same year in FOLIO.

Mr. Bohn as editor of Lowndes mentions with regard to this edition: 'No allusion has hitherto been made to an edition in *quarto* of this date (1604), and by the royal printer. A copy with the Psalms by Sternhold and Hopkins, 1598, bound in one vol., occurred in the Libraries of Sir Henry and John Savile, at Sotheby's, Dec. 1860, and was sold for £120.'

No copies of the 4to. edition have happened for sale by auction within the last 20 years, although a number of the folio editions have been sold within that period.

The Prayer Book of James I. embodied the results of the *Hampton Court Conference* (Jan. 14-18, 1604), urged on him by the growing Puritan and Calvinistic party, with a view to have 'offences' removed from the Prayer Book. The result of the Conference however 'was deeply disappointing to the Puritan party. The alterations made were comparatively few and unimportant. . . . The only changes of much significance were (1) the addition to the catechism of the part treating of the Sacraments (attributed to the pen of Overall, Dean of St. Paul's [afterwards Bp. of Norwich], and certainly not favourable to the views of the Puritans), and (2) the insistence on Baptism being administered by the 'lawful minister', as the Church's order; while the *validity* of the baptism administered by any person using water and the prescribed form of words is still implied in the text of the service,' *etc. etc. etc.*—Bp. Dowden.

In the present edition, according to Lowndes, was introduced the Form 'at the Healing', which however is absent in the above copy. This copy is moreover interesting for having belonged to WILLIAM MASKELL, pr., having his auto. and the inscription 'Repurchased, at the sale of the duplicates of my collection, now in the British Museum. Aug^t. 1848', on flyleaf.

The woodcut border on title shows that the royal arms contained in it had been corrected, as the insertion of the new wood-block is clearly visible.

This most interesting copy was presented to Ralph Thoresby by JOHN SHARP, ABP. OF YORK, one of the commissioners for the reform of the Prayer Book and the ecclesiastical courts (1691), a MS. note on the engraved title reading: 'His Grace, my Lord Archbishop of Yorks gift to RALPH THORESBY'. Thoresby has also added MS. notes, pointing out passages differing from former editions.

The above copy is moreover of great interest in differing from the Large Paper copy by having Williamson's frontispiece (dated 1686, and unknown to Lowndes), and more especially for mentioning the names of WILLIAM and MARY, instead of James—a circumstance very curious considering the fact that the Revolution did not take place till 1688, and that William III. was not proclaimed king until Feb. 13th, 1689.

With these exceptions the above corresponds exactly with the first-named copy, and has also the special prayers on the anniversary of the Martyrdom of King Charles I., the Accession of Charles II., and Gunpowder Treason.

A UNIQUE VOLUME, NO OTHER COPY BEING KNOWN TO EXIST. An imperfect copy of its fellow volume, the *Pars Estivalis*, which is also unique, is in the British Museum. Mr. Lawley, in describing the above volume in his work on the York Breviaries, published by the Surtees Society in 1871, says: 'This with its fellow volume [*pars estivalis*] in the British Museum, gives us the latest known arrangement and text of the York Breviary. They are therefore of great value: and being very correctly printed, are most useful for collation. . . . Except for the Kalendar [which most probably never was issued with the Winter Service], and for a slight portion torn off the last leaf, it is complete: bound in calf, and in excellent preservation. The size is 4 × 3: it has double columns, and thirty-six lines in each column. (1) *Temporale a1* to *v8 b*, all in eights. (2) Kalendar gone. (3) *Psalterium* and *Commune*. *A1* to *P8 b*, all in eights, numbered in righthand corner of the page from *Fo. j* to *Fo. rrr*. (4) *Sanctorale*, from *S. Andrew* to *Wilfridi episcopi et confessoris, aa1* to *hh4*.

'This is the edition probably noticed by P[HILIPPE] D[ESCHAMPS] in his 'Dictionnaire de Géographie,' col. 441-2, where he says that Gachet at Paris reprinted 'en très petit format' the York Breviary, which he had before printed in 1526.'

The printed editions of the York Breviary are rarer than almost any other English Use, and the above volume is not only UNIQUE IN ITSELF, BUT ONE OF THE ONLY TWELVE VOLUMES, portions or full copies, eight of known dates and three undated, WHICH ARE KNOWN TO EXIST (*Mr. Lawley*). It is therefore of the extremest interest and importance to the English ritualist.

It is further most interesting for having belonged to HENRY FITZALAN, 12TH EARL OF ARUNDEL (1511?-1580), well known in connexion with his attempt to depose Queen Elizabeth in favour of Mary Queen of Scots, and the Ridolfi Plot. It bears his autograph and MS. notes on the title and flyleaf.

AN EXCESSIVELY RARE IF NOT UNIQUE VOLUME, unknown to bibliographers. It consists of signatures a and b in eights, c in sixes, B to T in eights, and V in fours, or 170 leaves in all. There is no separate title (which probably was not issued), or colophon.

The 'Catechisme' fills the first 6 ll. of sig. a; a 7-8, and b 1, and the recto of b 2, are occupied with 'Graces,' some of them in rhyme; on the rev. of b 2 begins 'A Preparative unto Prayer.' This, with other Prayers, extends to the foot of c 6, when begins on a fresh set of signatures 'Mornyng Prayer for Sunday,' B 1; after this, Evening prayer for Sunday, followed by daily Morning and Evening Services for the week; and the 'Collectes for Sondays and Holye-dayes throughe oute all the yeare,' and the volume closes with 'Sondrye godlye Prayers for dyverse purposes.' These include prayers for Gentle men and for Landiordes, in which their economical duties as Christians are rehearsed in detail in a way strikingly unlike the actual policy of the sharks and harpies who formed the lay portion of the Council and bear-leaders of Edward VI., for Marchauntes, for Lawers (that they by no means suffre themselves to be corrupted wyth brybes and gyftes), for Labourers, ryche Mannes Seruauntes, Maydes, Syngle Menne, Husbands, Wyves, and others. Their inspiration is very likely due to the noble Christian Socialism of HUGH LATIMER.

A clue to the editor is contained on the rev. of sig. b 5: 'And in thy faythfull prayers remembre

Thomas Cottesforde ꝑ preparer of thys preparatiue. For the date, the prayers for the King in various parts are on behalf of 'Edwarde the Sixte,' and the Orders for Morning and Evening Prayer are either a condensation from the First Prayer Book, or in anticipation of it, which would give the date of c. 1548.

THOMAS COTTESFORDE, the editor, was at various times rector of Walpole St. Peter, Norfolk, and of St. Martin, Ludgate, and Prebendary of York, and in the scanty notice of him in *D. N. B.* is said to have been one of the compilers of the Book of Common Prayer.

This Catechism is so rare that Heylin in his *Certamen Epistolare* asserts 'it is so hard to come by, that scarce one scholar in 500 hath ever heard of it, and hardly one of a thousand hath ever seen it.' The authorship is disputed—on the title of the above copy in a contemporary hand is written 'Authore D. Cranmero Cantuar Epis.' and beneath, in a later hand, 'Alii a D. Poyneto scriptum esse putant'. It has been ascribed by various authorities to Dean Nowell, Abp. Cranmer and Bp. Ridley, and Bp. Poynet; but Heylin in his *History of the Reformation* attributes it to Cranmer assisted by learned men.

The author was ordained priest by GEORGE HICKES, titular Bp. of Thetford, in his oratory at St. Andrew's, Holborn. He was a learned Canonist and a zealous Nonjuror, and for a pamphlet in

which George I. was denounced as a usurper was sentenced at the Old Bailey to a fine of £500., to 3 years' imprisonment without bail, and to be twice whipped. On his protesting against the last indignity because of his sacred calling, the court answered that he was a disgrace to his cloth, and that his ordination by the so-called Bp. of Thetford was illegal. By the court's direction the common executioner then and there roughly pulled his gown off his back. On his petitioning George I. a few days later his whipping was remitted, but he died in Newgate after three years' imprisonment in 1720.

According to *D. N. B.* the author 'was admitted a member of Doctors' Commons, and practised in the Court of Arches and the Exchequer Court of York. According to the statement of his nephew RALPH ROKEBY, he was counsel for Henry VIII. in the divorce, and so confounded the Pope by his canon law that Henry offered him the Bishopric of London, which he declined. He became Vicar-General of York. According to his nephew, he held for 32 years the post of 'justice' in York. During that period no sentence of his was annulled on appeal . . . In 1545 he became Chaunter or Precentor of York, with the Prebend of Driffeld attached. On 7 Sept. 1558 he was admitted Prebendary of Dunham in Southwell Cathedral [*recte* Minster]. Both these preferments he held till his death. From the accession of Edward VI. to 1572 he was a member of the King's [and afterwards the Queen's] Council in the North. In later years he was sent as commissioner into Scotland with SIR THOMAS GARGRAVE and others to reform the law of the marches.'

Among the best known of the divines of the Episcopal side were Bishops Cosin, Sanderson, and Brian Walton, with Drs. Pearson, Gunning and Heylin. Among the Presbyterians the most eminent were Baxter, Calamy, Bates, Manton, and Reynolds. One of the most notable episodes in the history of the conference was the presentation by Baxter of a liturgy, composed by himself in the space of a few days, which the Presbyterian commissioners desired should be authorised and placed on a footing of equality with the Book of Common Prayer. The conference, as was to be expected from the temper of the times, ended in the discomfiture of the Puritan party, very few of whose suggestions were adopted.'—*Bp. Dowden.*

FIRST EDITION of this excessively rare work, the British Museum copy of which is imperfect. Besides the general woodcut title, the divisions for Easter- and Trinity-Tide have each a separate title with date. Lowndes mentions only the Bodleian and Bp. Daly's copies of this edition. Later editions were published, without date, c. 1542 and 1545, and a reprint was published in 1841 by EDWARD CARDWELL, D.D.

The above copy was bought in 1857 from the Toovey collection, but singularly enough bears the British Museum stamp on first title and last leaf.

The author was a *protégé* of Cromwell, 'actively engaged in producing works designed to encourage the reformation in England' (*A. F. Pollard*). But he is perhaps best known for his English translation of the Bible (*see No. 46 on page 10 for a copy of the first edition*).

'In 1540 Taverner brought out a commentary on the epistles and gospels for the year. . . . They were written with Henry VIII.'s authority, and the 'sacraments of the church be here not heretically contemned, but catholykly avauced'; and 'anabaptists, sacramentaries, and other heretics' are denounced. Nevertheless the book contains many exhortations of great force, arguments that do full justice to their subjects, and some discourses which were adopted at a later period by the church almost without the change of a single sentiment' (*Cardwell*).—*A. F. P.*

No copy of this edition can be traced at auction within the last 20 years. The Quarto Edition of this work, bearing the same date and imprint, was really printed in London about 22 years later, and is far commoner, as are also the following editions.

'An exposition of the parable of the unjust steward, treating chiefly of the doctrine of justification by faith, and containing also passages on property strongly controverting the idea of a right of absolute ownership apart from social obligations. These opinions did not prevent Sir Thomas More from styling it 'a very treasury and well-spring of wickedness'. BISHOP GOTT'S LIBRARY.

Messrs. Sotheby, Wilkinson, and Hodge began yesterday and will conclude to-day the sale of the library (or what remains of it) of the late Dr. John Gott, Bishop of Truro. The library was formed by the late owner's great-grandfather, John Gott, of Wood-hall, and continued by his grandfather, Benjamin Gott (1762-1840), of Armley-house, Leeds, chairman of the Leeds and Selby Railway Company (one of the earliest formed). Benjamin Gott was a man of considerable wealth and an excellent judge of rare books; his mansion at Armley and his collection of pictures testified, according to the obituary notice of him published in the *Gentleman's Magazine*, "to his tastes and pursuits." Armley-house has presumably been dismantled of much of its treasures, for, apart from the fine library, "the remaining portion of the Gott heirlooms removed from Armley-house, near Leeds," was sold at Messrs. Christie's on July 10, 1897, and among these were two companion-portraits by Sir Thomas Lawrence, one of Benjamin Gott and the other of his wife Elizabeth.

An article dealing with the Gott library appeared in *The Times* of January 28 last, and its attempted piecemeal sale last year through the medium of a bookseller's catalogue, with the title "Bibliotheca Pretiosa," was pointed out. As originally constituted the library was of a very choice character, and many of the "gems" were sold either before or soon after the "Bibliotheca" appeared; the five series of Shakespeare quartos were, with one exception, sold, although, if an "I understand" statement in Mr. W. C. Hazlitt's recently-published "Roll of Book-collectors" is accurate, it is some consolation to assume that these quartos were purchased by the late Mrs. Rylands. To deal, however, with what is in the public sale rather than what is not there, the most remarkable feature revealed yesterday was the extraordinary discrepancies between the (necessarily) arbitrary prices of a bookseller's catalogue and those of the public sale-room. Only in about two or three instances were the "Bibliotheca Pretiosa" prices exceeded—one in the case of a 10s. 6d. book which fetched 11s., and in another case an advance of £1 was reached. The obvious result of first offering a choice library for sale book by book, and then sending the residue to the auction-room is to reduce considerably the selling "properties" of what remains.

The most important volume in yesterday's sale was the only known perfect copy of Voragine's "Golden Legend," printed by W. Caxton, 1483, the first of his three editions, genuine throughout, and in very fine condition; this was secured by Mr. Quaritch at £1,300 (it was priced in the "Bibliotheca Pretiosa" at £1,000). A "most desirable" copy of the "Biblia Pauperum" (ante 1450), consisting of 37 plates, each containing five woodcuts (but wanting three leaves), was also purchased by Mr. Quaritch at £1,290, as compared with the £2,000 at which it was priced in the "Bibliotheca." The unique "Breviary" (no 39), "Pars Hymnalis," printed in Paris by F. Regnaud, 1633 (of which an imperfect copy of its fellow volume, the "Pars Estivalis," also unique, is in the British Museum), sold for £355 (Quaritch), as against its previous price of £1,200; and a reasonably good and tall copy of the excessively rare first edition of the Bible in English and of Coverdale's translation, printed at Antwerp by Jacob Van Meteren, 1535 (the four preliminary leaves and the last leaf in excellent facsimile), sold for £175 (Leighton), as compared with the £600 of the "Bibliotheca."

Vostro, Paris, Almanach, 1502-20, a rare edition (B.P. £80)—£30 (Maggs); another, printed by Thielman Kerver, Paris, 1522 (B.P. £105)—£56 (Leighton); John Milton, "Paradise Lost," 1667, first issue of the first edition (B.P. £200)—£155 (Quaritch); a copy with the second title-page, 1667 (B.P. £260)—£192 (Quaritch); a copy with the seventh title-page, 1669 (B.P. £27)—£27 (Dobell); and a copy with the eighth and last title-page, 1669 (B.P. £24)—£25 10s. (Edwards); and "Paradise Regained," 1671, first edition (B.P. £100)—£25 10s. (Bain).

BISHOP GOTT'S LIBRARY.

Messrs. Sotheby, Wilkinson, and Hodge concluded on Saturday the sale of the library of the late Dr. John Gott, Bishop of Truro, the amount realized being £7,122 3s., making for the two days' dispersal of 324 lots £12,830 12s. 6d. More than one-half of Saturday's total, however, was nominal rather than actual, for the very choice set of four Shakespeare folios did not reach the reserve at £3,850, and the volumes were consequently withdrawn. The set is one of the finest in existence, being remarkable not only for size, but also for condition, the third folio being especially interesting on account of the rare variation in the title-page, bearing the 1663 imprint, and as originally issued, without the portrait and the seven spurious plays; the latter, however, have been inserted. In offering the set Mr. Hodge stated that there was a reserve, and if that was not reached the set would be entirely withdrawn. Bidding began at £1,000, and, as already stated, at £3,850 the lot was declared to be unsold. The set was priced at £7,000 in the "Bibliotheca Pretiosa." The four volumes are uniformly bound in red morocco super extra, with Harleian gold tooling on the sides, by Charles Lewis, the famous binder, of Duke-

street, St. James's, who, with John Clark, of Soho, and F. Bedford, was the leading bookbinder of the earlier half of the last century. Nearly all the Gott books were bound by either one or the other of these talented craftsmen.

The solitary Shakespeare quarto was a copy of the *Merchant of Venice*, printed by J. Roberts, 1600, with the earlier of the two rival editions of the same year, the bottom corner of the title and the date in facsimile, sold for £290 (Frank), as compared with the "Bibliotheca Pretiosa" price of £700; whilst a fine copy of a Shakespearean book of the highest interest and rarity, William Painter's "Palace of Pleasure," the two parts, 1566-7, but with two leaves in facsimile and six leaves supplied from a smaller copy, only reached £140 (Quaritch), as compared with the bookseller's estimate of £275; and the collection of about 1,100 drawings and engravings illustrative of the county of York, probably one of the finest collections of its kind in existence illustrating Yorkshire, in ten atlas folio volumes, sold for £230 (Quaritch), as compared with last year's price of £350.

Among the more important of the remaining books were the following, with the prices in parentheses at which the books were appraised in last year's "Bibliotheca Pretiosa":— "Missale ad Usam Ecclesie Eboracensis," an English MS. of the 12th-15th century, on 186 leaves, 11½ in. by 7½ in., with numerous painted and ornamented initials (B.P. £350)—£260 (Quaritch); "Musées Français et Royal," 1803-13, with brilliant picked proof impressions of the plates before letters, on large paper, six atlas folio volumes (B.P. £75)—£22 10s. (Maggs); and G. Piranesi, 52 original drawings of architectural remains of Rome, in sepia or in red chalk, in an oblong atlas folio volume (B.P. £100)—£50 (Quaritch). The long series of various editions of the Book of Common Prayer and other rare liturgies, &c., included:—The first issue of the first Prayer Book of King Edward VI., printed by Edward Whitechurche, March 7, 1549, with the rare official price list stating "that no maner of person do sell this presente booke unbounde above the price of ii shyllinges" each, or "bounde in paste or in boordes, not above the price of three shyllinges and four pence the piece" (B.P. £275)—£105 (Quaritch)—this excellent copy belonged to Nathaniel Lord Crewe (1633-1722), Bishop of Durham, and descended to Lord Alvanley, at whose sale, in February, 1858, bound up with five other Psalters, &c., it realized £87, the purchaser being Boone, the bookseller; an excellent copy of the second issue, by the same printer, May 4, 1549 (B.P. £210)—£72 (Ellis); another copy of the second issue, "an unknown variety, being differently set up, and varying considerably in the spelling (B.P. £175)—£40 (Frank); a fine and clean copy of the third issue, by the same printer, June 16, 1549 (B.P. £210)—£84 (Ellis); a copy of Grafton's first edition of the Prayer Book, March 8, 1549, published one day after Whitechurche's first edition (B.P. £250)—£92 (Ellis); a fine copy of Grafton's first edition of the Second Prayer Book, August, 1552 (B.P. £175)—£85 (Quaritch); "The Booke of Common Praier Noted," 1550, of the highest interest to English Churchmen, as it gives the complete English ritual set to the ancient plain-song, the adapter being John Merbecke, or Marbeck, organist to St. George's Chapel, Windsor (B.P. £250)—£153 (Quaritch); Whitechurche's first issue of the Second Prayer Book, 1552 (B.P. £115)—£72 (Quaritch); another issue of the same, unknown to Lowndes and agreeing with none of the collations of the first four folio editions of 1552 given by him (B.P. £115)—£48 (Frank); a copy of Whitechurche's third issue of the Second Prayer Book of Edward VI., 1552 (B.P. £210)—£124 (Leighton); Whitechurche's quarto edition of the Second Prayer Book, 1552 (B.P. £125)—£49 (Frank); a large and clean copy of the second quarto edition of Queen Elizabeth's Prayer Book, printed by Juge and Cawood, 1562 (B.P. £65)—£46 (Quaritch); another edition, printed by C. Barker, 1560 (B.P. £35)—£20 10s. (Leighton); the fourth edition of James I.'s Prayer Book, printed by E. Barker, 1604, excessively rare (B.P. £100)—£21 (Frank); a very fine and large copy in the original calf of the first edition of Laud's Prayer Book for Scotland, 1635 (B.P. £45)—£19 10s. (Frank); and "The Prymer of Salisbury Use," in English and Latin, 1530, excessively rare, the only other recorded copy is in the Bodleian, and this is imperfect (B.P. £105)—£47 (Quaritch).

There were also:—S. Purchas, "Hakluytus Posthumus, or, Purchas his Pilgrimes," 1625-6, a choice and perfect copy of the fourth and best edition (B.P. £105)—£61 (Pickering and Chatto); Edmund Spenser, "The Faerie Queene," 1590-6, first editions of both parts (B.P.

£185)—£113 (Edwards); W. Spenser, "Complaints," 1591, large paper copy (B.P. £100)—£97 (Frank); another copy (B.P. £100)—£53 (Maggs); E. Spenser, "Colin Clouts Come Home Againe," 1595 (B.P. £42)—£23 (Tregaskis); Walton and Cotton, "The Complete Angler," 1836, Pickering's splendid edition and his own copy (B.P. £55)—£29 10s. (Maggs); and "Catalogue des Tableaux de Mr. de Julienne," the original MS. on paper, 137 leaves, oblong quarto, with 147 clever miniature drawings, stated to be by Watteau, in colours, of the chief pictures in the gallery—£140 (Frank).
