Long recognized as a leader in the field, RSP has been called by the *Samba Report on Directory Publishing* "a true success in the world of independent directory publishers." 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#### Introduction

#### WHY THIS DIRECTORY IS NEEDED

Despite our country's ongoing economic problems and increased college costs, the financial aid picture for minorities has never looked brighter. Currently, billions of dollars are set aside each year specifically for Native Americans, African Americans, Asian Americans, and Hispanic Americans. This funding is open to minorities at any level (high school through postdoctoral and professional) for a variety of activities, including study, research, travel, training, career development, and creative projects.

While numerous print or online listings have been prepared to identify and describe general financial aid opportunities (those open to all segments of society), those resources have never covered more than a small portion of the programs designed primarily or exclusively for minorities. As a result, many advisors, librarians, scholars, researchers, and students were often unaware of the extensive funding available to Native Americans and other minorities. But, with the ongoing publication of *Financial Aid for Native Americans* that has all changed. Here, in just one place, Native American students, professionals, and postdoctorates now have current and detailed information about the special resources set aside specifically for them.

Financial Aid for Native Americans is prepared biennially as part of Reference Service Press' four-volume Minority Funding Set (the other volumes in the set cover funding for Asian Americans, African Americans, and Hispanic Americans). Each of the volumes in this set is sold separately, or the complete set can be purchased at a discounted price (for more information, contact Reference Service Press's marketing department).

No other source, in print or online, offers the extensive coverage provided by these titles. That's why the Grantsmanship Center labeled the set "a must for every organization serving minorities," *Reference Sources for Small and Medium-Sized Libraries* called the titles "the absolute best guides for finding funding," and *Reference Books Bulletin* selected each of the volumes in the *Minority Funding Set* as their "Editor's Choice." *Financial Aid for Native Americans*, itself, has also received rave reviews. According to *Choice*, "This is a unique and valuable resource" which is "highly recommended." *Reference Books Bulletin* calls it a "landmark resource" and *EMIE Bulletin* concluded that the directory was "definitely designed to ease what can be a very stressful process." Perhaps *American Reference Books Annual* sums up the critical reaction best: "extraordinarily useful...absolutely essential."

#### WHAT'S UPDATED?

The preparation of each new edition of *Financial Aid for Native Americans* involves extensive updating and revision. To make sure that the information included in the 2009-2011 edition of the directory is both reliable and current, the editors at Reference Service Press 1) reviewed and updated all relevant programs covered in the previous edition of the directory, 2) collected information on all programs open to Native Americans that were added to Reference Service Press' funding database since the last edition of the directory, and then 3) searched extensively for new program leads in a variety of sources, including printed directories, news reports, journals, newsletters, house organs, annual reports, and sites on the Internet. Since all program descriptions included in the directory are written directly from information supplied by the sponsoring organizations in printed announcements or online (no information is ever taken from secondary sources), we contacted all sponsoring organizations identified in this

process up to four times in writing and, if necessary, up to 3 times by telephone. Despite our best efforts, however, some sponsoring organizations still failed to respond and, as a result, their programs are not included in this edition of the directory.

The 2009-2011 edition of *Financial Aid for Native Americans* completely revises and updates the previous edition. Programs that have ceased operations have been dropped from the listing. Profiles of continuing programs have been rewritten to reflect operations in 2009-2011; more than 85 percent of the continuing programs reported substantive changes in their locations, requirements (particularly application deadline), benefits, or eligibility requirements since the 2006-2008 edition. In addition, more than 500 new entries have been added to the program section of the directory. The resulting listing describes the 1,350+ biggest and best sources of free money available to Native Americans, including scholarships, fellowships, grants, awards, and internships.

#### WHAT MAKES THIS DIRECTORY UNIQUE?

The 2009-2011 edition of *Financial Aid for Native Americans* will help American Indians, Native Alaskans (including Eskimos and Aleuts), and Native Hawaiians tap into the billions of dollars available to them, as minorities, for study, research, creative activities, past accomplishments, future projects, professional development, work experience, and many other activities. The listings cover every major subject area, are sponsored by nearly 900 different private and public agencies and organizations, and are open to Native Americans at any level, from college-bound high school students through professionals and postdoctorates.

Not only does *Financial Aid for Native Americans* provide the most comprehensive coverage of available funding (1,356 entries), but it also displays the most informative program descriptions (on the average, up to three time the detail found in any other listing). In addition to this extensive and focused coverage, *Financial Aid for Native Americans* also offers several other unique features. First of all, hundreds of funding opportunities listed here have never been covered in any other source. So, even if you have checked elsewhere, you will want to look at *Financial Aid for Native Americans* for additional leads. And, here's another plus: all of the funding programs in this edition of the directory offer "free" money; not one of the programs will ever require you to pay anything back (provided, of course, that you meet the program requirements).

Further, unlike other funding directories, which generally follow a straight alphabetical arrangement, *Financial Aid for Native Americans* groups entries by type of funding (scholarships, grants, awards, etc.), to make it easy for you to search for appropriate programs. This same convenience is offered in the indexes, where title, sponsoring organization, geographic, subject, and deadline date entries are each subdivided by type of funding.

Finally, we have tried to anticipate all the ways you might wish to search for funding. The volume is organized so you can identify programs not only by type, but by subject focus, sponsoring organization, program title, residency requirements, where the money can be spent, and even deadline date. Plus, we've included all the information you'll need to decide if a program is right for you: purpose, eligibility requirements, financial data, duration, special features, limitations, number awarded, and application date. You even get fax numbers, toll-free numbers, e-mail addresses, and web sites (when available), along with complete contact information.

#### WHAT'S EXCLUDED?

While this book is intended to be the most comprehensive source of information on funding available to Native Americans, there are some programs we've specifically excluded from the directory:

Programs that do not accept applications from U.S. citizens or residents. If a
program is open only to foreign nationals or excludes Americans from applying,
it is not covered.

- Programs that are open equally to all segments of the population. Only funding opportunities set aside primarily or exclusively for American Indians, Native Alaskans, and/or Native Hawaiians are included here.
- Money for study or research outside the United States. Since there are
  comprehensive and up-to-date directories that describe the available funding for
  study and research abroad (see the list of Reference Service Press titles
  opposite the directory's title page), only programs that fund activities in the
  United States are covered here.
- Programs that offer small monetary awards. The emphasis here is on programs that offer significant compensation. If the maximum a programs offers is less than \$1,000 per year, it is not included in this listing.
- Programs administered by individual academic institutions solely for their own students. The directory identifies "portable" programs—ones that can be used at any number of schools. Financial aid administered by individual schools specifically for their own students is not covered. Write directly to the schools you are considering to get information on their offerings.
- Money that must be repaid. Only "free money" is identified here. If a program
  requires repayment or charges interest, it's not listed. Now you can find out
  about billions of dollars in aid and know (if you meet the program requirements)
  that not one dollar of that will ever need to be repaid.

#### **HOW THE DIRECTORY IS ORGANIZED**

Financial Aid for Native Americans is divided into two sections: 1) a descriptive list of funding opportunities open to Native Americans and 2) a set of six indexes to help you pinpoint appropriate funding programs.

**Financial Aid Programs Open to Native Americans.** The first section of the directory describes more than 1,350 sources of free money available to American Indians, Native Alaskans, and/or Native Hawaiians. The focus is on financial aid available to American citizens or permanent residents and tenable in the United States. The programs described here are sponsored by nearly 900 different government agencies, professional organizations, corporations, sororities and fraternities, foundations, religious groups, educational associations, and military/veterans organizations. All areas of the sciences, social sciences, and humanities are covered.

Entries in this section are grouped into the following five categories, to help you in your search for a specific kind of financial assistance (e.g., a scholarship for undergraduate study, a grant for independent research, an award for outstanding literary achievement):

**Scholarships:** Programs that support studies at the undergraduate level in the United States. Usually no return of service or repayment is required. For information on funding for research on the undergraduate level, see the Grants category below.

**Fellowships:** Programs that support studies at the graduate level in the United States, including work on a master's degree, doctorate, professional degree (e.g., law, medicine), or specialist's certificate. Usually no return of service or repayment is required. For information on funding for research on the graduate level, see the Grants category below.

**Grants:** Programs that provide funds to support Native Americans' innovative efforts, travel, projects, creative activities, or research on any level (from undergraduate to postdoctorates, professional, or other).

**Awards:** Competitions, prizes, and honoraria offered in recognition of Native Americans' personal accomplishments, professional contributions, or public service. Prizes received solely as the result of entering contests are excluded.

Internships: Work experience programs for Native American undergraduates, graduate students, and recent graduates. Only salaried positions are described.

Programs that supply more than one type of assistance are listed in all relevant subsections. For example, both undergraduate and graduate Native American students may apply for the Council of Energy Resource Tribes Scholarship, so the program is described in both the scholarship and the fellowship subsections.

Entries in each subsection are arranged alphabetically by program title and have been written to give you a concise but clear picture of the available funding. In addition, information (when available) is provided on organization address and telephone numbers (including fax and toll-free), e-mail address, web site, purpose, eligibility, money awarded, duration, special features, limitations, number of awards, and application deadline. The sample entry on page 7 illustrates and explains the program entry structure.

The information reported for each of the programs in this section was obtained as a result of research inquiries sent or searches conducted during the first quarter of 2009. While *Financial Aid for Native Americans* is intended to be as comprehensive as possible, some sponsoring organizations did not respond to our research requests and, consequently, are not included in this edition of the directory.

**Indexes.** To help you find the aid you need, we have constructed six indexes; these will let you access the listings by program title, sponsoring organization, residency, tenability, subject focus, and deadline date. These indexes use a word-by-word alphabetical arrangement. Note: numbers in the index refer to entry numbers, not to page numbers in the book.

**Program Title Index.** If you know the name of a particular funding program and want to find out where it is covered in the directory, use the Program Title Index. To assist you in your search, every program is listed by all its known names, former names, and abbreviations. Since one program can be included in several subsections (e.g., a program providing assistance to both undergraduate and graduate students is described in both the scholarships and the fellowships subsections), each entry number in the index has been coded to indicate program type (for example, "F" = Fellowships; "G" = Grants). By using this coding system, you can avoid duplicate entries and turn directly to the programs that match your financial interests.

**Sponsoring Organization Index.** This index makes it easy to identify agencies that offer funding primarily or exclusively to Native Americans. Nearly 900 organizations are indexed here. As in the Program Title Index, we've used a code to help you determine which organizations offer scholarships, fellowships, grants, awards, and/or internships.

**Residency Index.** Some programs listed in this book are restricted to Native Americans in a particular state or region. Others are open to Native Americans wherever they live. This index helps you identify programs available only to residents in your area as well as programs that have no residency requirements. Further, to assist you in your search, we've also indicated the type of funding offered to residents in each of the areas listed in the index.

**Tenability Index.** This index identifies the geographic locations where the funding described in *Financial Aid for Native Americans* may be used. Index entries (city, county, state, province, region, country, continent) are arranged alphabetically (word by word) and subdivided by program type. Use this index when you are looking for money to support your activities in a particular geographic area.

**Subject Index.** This index allows you to identify the subject focus of each of the financial aid opportunities described in *Financial Aid for Native Americans*. More than 250 different subject terms are listed. Extensive "see" and "see also" references, as well as type-of-program subdivisions, will help you locate appropriate funding opportunities.

**Calendar Index.** Since most financial aid programs have specific deadline dates, some may have closed by the time you begin to look for funding. You can use the Calendar Index to determine which programs are still open. This index is arranged by program type (e.g., scholarship, loan, internship) and subdivided by month during which the deadline falls. Filing dates can and quite

- (4) Purpose To provide financial assistance to Native Americans who are attending a Tribal College or University (TCU) and are the first in their family to attend college.
- (5) Eligibility This program is open to American Indians or Alaska Natives who are enrolled full time in their first or second semester at an eligible TCU. Applicants must have a GPA of 3.0 or higher and be able to demonstrate financial need. They must be the first in their immediate family to attend college. Along with their application, they must submit 1) short essays (up to 500 words each) on how they perceive themselves as leaders in their school or community and how their education will help the Native American community: and 2) a personal statement of 1,000 words that includes their personal background, their academic background, their educational and career goals, and how this scholarship will help them achieve those goals.
- (6) Financial data The stipend is \$5,000 per year.
- (7) Duration 1 year; may be renewed, provided the recipient maintains a GPA of 3.0 or higher and participates actively in campus and community life.
- (8) Additional information This program is sponsored by the Coca-Cola Company in partnership with the American Indian College Fund.
- (9) Number awarded 1 or more each year.
- (10) Deadline May of each year.

#### DEFINITION

- (1) **Entry number:** Consecutive number assigned to the funding profiles and used to index the entry.
- (2) Program title: Title of scholarship, fellowship, grant, award, or internship.
- (3) Sponsoring organization: Name, address, and telephone number, toll-free number, fax number, e-mail address, and/or web site (when information was available) for organization sponsoring the program.
- (4) Purpose: Identifies the major program requirements; read the rest of the entry for additional detail.
- (5) **Eligibility:** Qualifications required of applicants, plus information on application procedure and selection process.
- (6) Financial data: Financial details of the program, including fixed sum, average amount, or range of funds offered, expenses for which funds may and may not be applied, and cash-related benefits supplied (e.g., room and board).
- (7) Duration: Period for which support is provided; renewal prospects.
- (8) Additional information: Any unusual (generally nonmonetary) benefits, features, restrictions, or limitations associated with the program.
- (9) **Number awarded:** Total number of recipients each year or other specified period.
- (10) Deadline: The month by which applications must be submitted.

often do vary from year to year; consequently, this index should be used only as a guide for deadlines beyond 2011.

#### HOW TO USE THE DIRECTORY

Here are some tips to help you get the most out the funding opportunities listed in *Financial Aid for Native Americans*.

To Locate Programs Offering a Particular Type of Assistance. If you are looking for programs offering a particular type of financial aid (e.g., a scholarship for undergraduate courses, a grant for independent research, an award for outstanding literary achievement), turn first to the definitions of the various program types on pages 5 and 6 in the Introduction and then browse through the entries in each of the appropriate categories in the first section of the directory (scholarships, fellowships, grants, awards, or internships). Keep in mind that more than one of these subsections may contain funding leads for you. For example, if you are a graduate student looking for money to help you pay for the educational and research costs associated with your master's degree, you will not want to overlook the opportunities described in the fellowships, loans, grants, and even awards subsections. Note: since programs with multiple purposes are listed in every appropriate location, each of these subsections functions as a self-contained entity. As a result, you can browse through any of the subsections in the directory without first consulting an index.

To Find Information on a Particular Financial Aid Program. If you know the name of a particular financial aid program, and the type of assistance offered by the program (scholarship, fellowship, grant, etc.), then go directly to the appropriate category in the first section of the directory, where you will find the program profiles arranged alphabetically by title. But be careful: program titles can be misleading. For example, the John Shurr Journalism Award is a really a scholarship, the Holly A. Cornell Scholarship is actually a fellowship, and the Mickey Leland Energy Fellowship is, in fact, an internship. So, if you are looking for a specific program and do not find it in the subsection you have checked, be sure to refer to the Program Title Index to see if it is covered elsewhere in the directory. To save time, always check the Program Title Index first if you know the name of a specific award but are not sure under which subsection it has been listed. Since we index each program by all its known names and abbreviations, you'll also be able to track down a program there when you only know the popular rather than official name.

**To Locate Programs Sponsored by a Particular Organization.** The Sponsoring Organization Index makes it easy to identify agencies that provide financial assistance to Native Americans or to identify specific financial aid programs offered by a particular organization. Each entry number in the index is coded to identify program type, so that you can easily target appropriate entries.

**To Browse Quickly Through the Listings.** Turn to the type of funding that interests you (scholar-ships, fellowships, awards, etc.) and read the "Purpose" paragraph in each entry. In seconds, you'll know if this is an opportunity that you might want to pursue. If it is, be sure to read the rest of the information in the entry, to make sure you meet all of the program requirements before writing or going on the Internet for an application form. Please, save your time and energy. Don't apply if you don't qualify!

**To Locate Funding Available to Native Americans from or Tenable in a Particular City, County, or State.** The Residency Index identifies financial aid programs open to Native Americans in a specific state, region, etc. The Tenability Index shows where the money can be spent. In both indexes, "see" and "see also" references are used liberally, and index entries for a particular geographic area are subdivided by type of program (scholarships, fellowships, grants, awards, internships) to help you identify the funding that's right for you. When using these indexes, always check the listings under the term "United States," since the programs indexed there have no geographic restrictions and can be used in any area.

**To Locate Financial Aid Programs Open to Native Americans in a Particular Subject Area.** Turn to the Subject Index first if you are interested in identifying financial aid programs for Native Americans in a particular subject area (more than 250 different subject fields are listed there).

To facilitate your search, the type of funding available (scholarships, fellowships, grants, awards, internships) is clearly labeled. Extensive cross-references are provided. As part of your search, be sure to check the listings in the index under the heading "General Programs;" those programs provide funding in any subject area (although they may be restricted in other ways).

**To Locate Financial Aid Programs for Native Americans by Deadline Date.** If you are working with specific time constraints and want to weed out the financial aid programs whose filing dates you won't be able to meet, turn first to the Calendar Index and check the program references listed under the appropriate program type and month. Keep in mind: not all sponsoring organizations supplied deadline information, so not all programs are indexed in this section. To identify every relevant financial aid program, regardless of filing date, read through all the entries in each of the program categories (scholarships, fellowships, etc.) that apply.

**To Locate Financial Aid Programs Open to All Segments of the Population.** Only programs available to Native Americans are listed in this publication. However, there are thousands of other programs that are open equally to all segments of the population. To identify these programs, talk to your local librarian, check with your financial aid office on campus, use a computerized scholarship or grant search service, look at the list of RSP resources on the page opposite the title page in this directory, or go online to: www.rspfunding.com/prod prodalpha.html.

#### PLANS TO UPDATE THE DIRECTORY

This volume, covering 2009-2011, is the sixth edition of *Financial Aid for Native Americans*. The next biennial edition will cover the years 2011-2013 and will be issued in mid-2011.

#### OTHER RELATED PUBLICATIONS

In addition to Financial Aid for Native Americans, Reference Service Press publishes several other titles dealing with fundseeking, including the award-winning Directory of Financial Aids for Women; Financial Aid for the Disabled and Their Families; and Financial Aid for Veterans, Military Personnel, and Their Dependents. Since each of these titles focuses on a separate population group, there is very little duplication in the listings. 



They also conduct an internship there during the summers. Travel outside the United States is allowed if it is essential to the research effort and charged to a grant.





To do that, go to the type of program (scholarships, fellowships, etc.) that interests you, think about when you'll be able to complete your application forms, go to the appropriate months, jot down the entry numbers listed there, and use those numbers to find the program descriptions in the directory. Keep in mind that the numbers cited here refer to program entry numbers, not to page numbers in the book. Note: not all sponsoring organizations supplied deadline information to us, so not all programs are listed in this index.

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
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
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


















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
