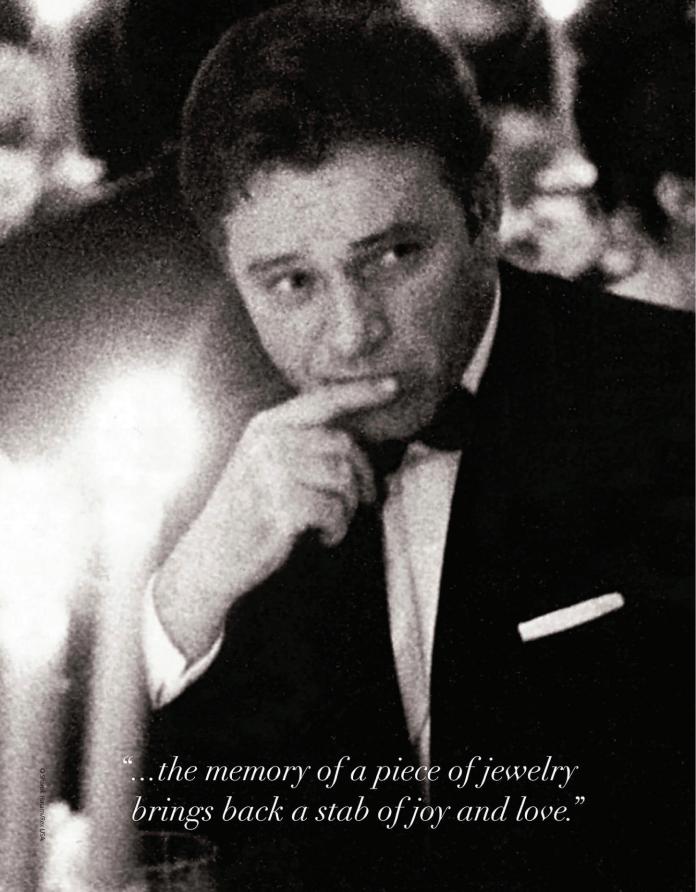

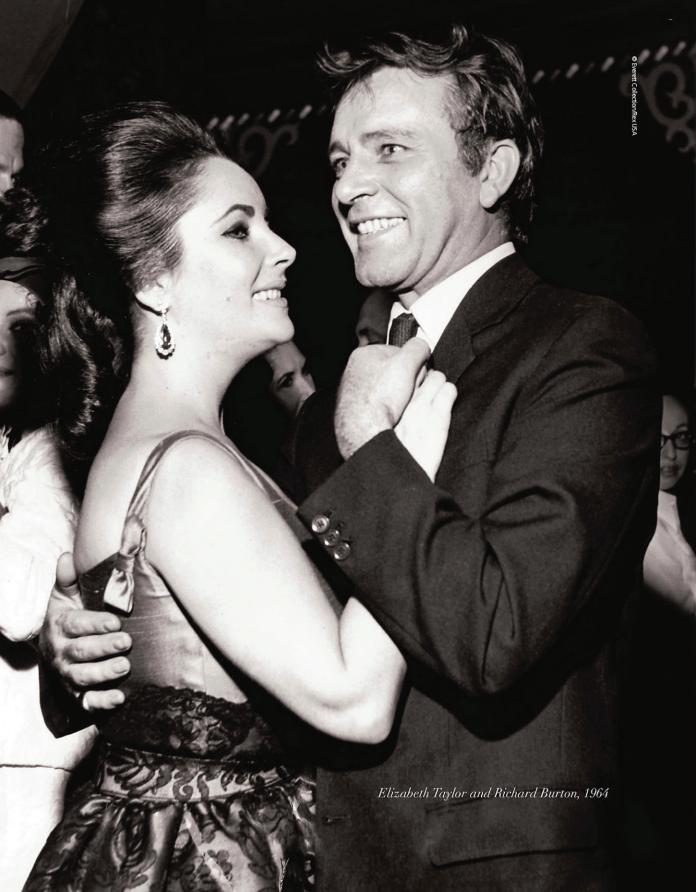

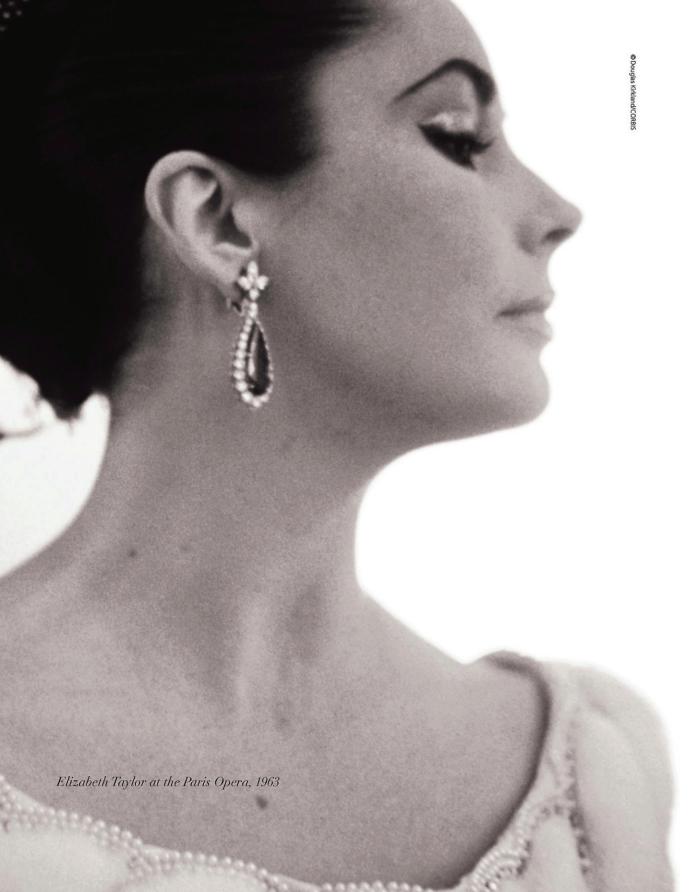

Elizabeth Taylor

During my 20 year career heading Christie's jewelry department, one question has come up again and again in any interview or conversation with a collector: "which top three collections do you dream of offering at auction one day?"

Contrary to art, there are only very few major jewelry collections in the world, and one of the first names that would always come to mind is that of Elizabeth Taylor.

With this landmark sale, a dream has come true. It is with great excitement, but also much emotion, that I shall hold the gavel, together with my colleagues, for a tribute auction to a screen legend and passionate jewelry connoisseur.

My first encounter with these extraordinary jewels was in September 1998, when I was invited to Elizabeth Taylor's home in Los Angeles to establish a list and appraisal of her collection. I knew it was going to be vast, but was not prepared for the trays and trays that were presented to us. Nor did I expect to meet her. Yet she suddenly came into the room in which we were working, visibly intrigued by our impressions. "So, what do you think?" she asked proudly. And then she proceeded to talk about one jewel and the other, not only the most important ones but also the sentimental pieces. Clearly she knew her collection perfectly, but what impressed me even more was her deep understanding of gemstones and the subtleties of the jewelry world. We were able to

discuss the importance of color and clarity in large size gems, such as the 33ct "Elizabeth Taylor Diamond", the geographic provenance of the emeralds in her extraordinary suite by Bulgari or the history of rare jewels such as the "Taj Mahal" diamond necklace or the Art Deco Egyptian Revival bracelet.

There is no particular theme running in Elizabeth Taylor's collection, because her approach was not intellectual, even though she knew more than enough to appreciate the quality of her "star" pieces. Rather, it is the result and symbol of all the special relationships she nurtured throughout her life, from great love stories to close friendships. To her, a jewel was an expression of "God's workmanship", as she explained in an interview on ABC News. The gems came from earth and therefore had a divine quality to them. Jewelry was also the ultimate romantic gift, the expression of a feeling and a deeply personal object. This is why her collection is so special. It breathes and carries the memory of Elizabeth Taylor's life and personality. Each piece is there for a reason, because it carries a meaning and was chosen for a special occasion. There are iconic jewels, such as an antique diamond tiara

or a pair of chandelier diamond earrings, given to her by her third husband, Hollywood producer Mike Todd. There are the legendary Peregrina Pearl also known as the Abercom, and the "Night of the Iguana" brooch, from her great love Richard Burton. There are presents from her friends Michael Jackson, Malcolm Forbes and Ron Perelman. The collection includes one of the few pieces she purchased herself, the famous Prince of Wales feather brooch from the collection of the Duchess of Windsor. There are classic examples by all the most famous jewelers, from Boucheron to Bulgari, Cartier, Oscar Heyman, Lalique, Schlumberger, Tiffany, Van Cleef & Arpels and David Webb, as well as modern designers, such as Marina B, Illias Lalaounis, Giuseppe Nardi, Elsa Peretti, Paloma Picasso, Angela Pintaldi and

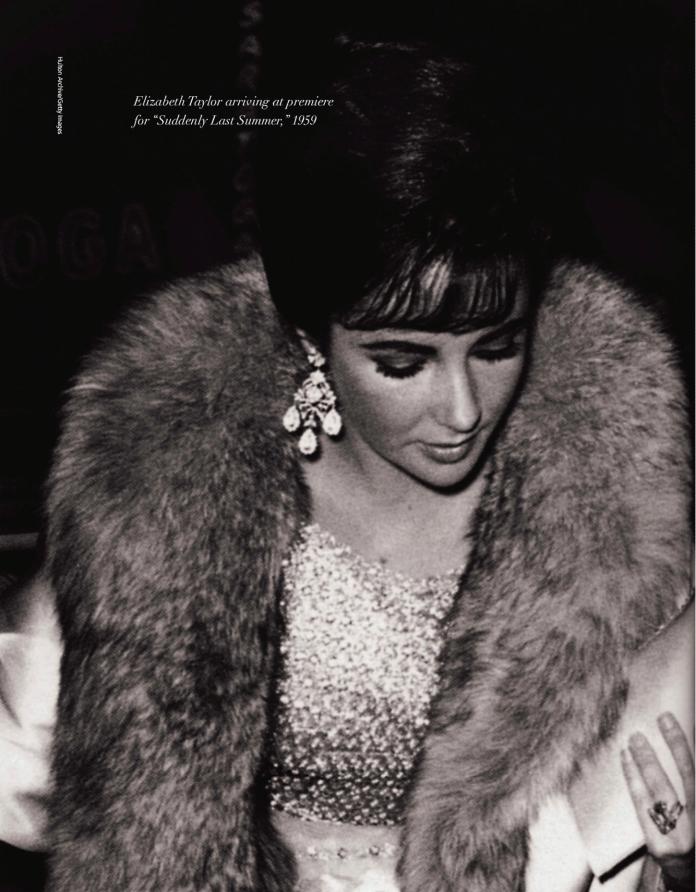
of course, JAR. Elizabeth Taylor herself designed several jewels, even creating a brand bearing her name of which there are a few examples. And there are all the charm bracelets, with inscriptions tracing her career, her travels, her passions and the charitable causes she defended with so much energy, such as amfAR.

Yet there exists a remarkable paradox in Elizabeth Taylor's approach to jewelry collecting. She treasured each and every piece but was never possessive about them. She saw herself merely as a custodian and protector, someone who would cherish and care for them, and above all have fun with them. In fact she always wore her jewels uniquely, playing with them to enhance her beauty. During the years when the famous coiffeur "Alexandre de Paris" styled her hair, she would adorn her locks with pearls or brooches. She was also very generous, loaning her jewelry to museums or allowing an admirer to try on a rare piece.

Elizabeth Taylor knew that one day her jewels would be offered at auction and wrote in her book "My Love Affair with Jewelry", published in 2001: "I hope that whoever buys each piece, loves it as much as I do and takes care of it and realizes that having jewelry is a temporary gift". The time has come for her collection put together during her lifetime with great passion, knowledge and humility to pass on to new owners. I have no doubt that her qualities will live on through this memorable sale and that each piece will celebrate the fame of Elizabeth Taylor, as an actress, a beauty, a friend, a romantic figure, a style icon, a business woman and a great humanitarian. Above all, let the jewels bring as much pleasure and enjoyment as they did to her.

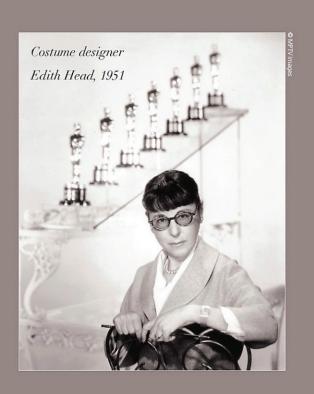

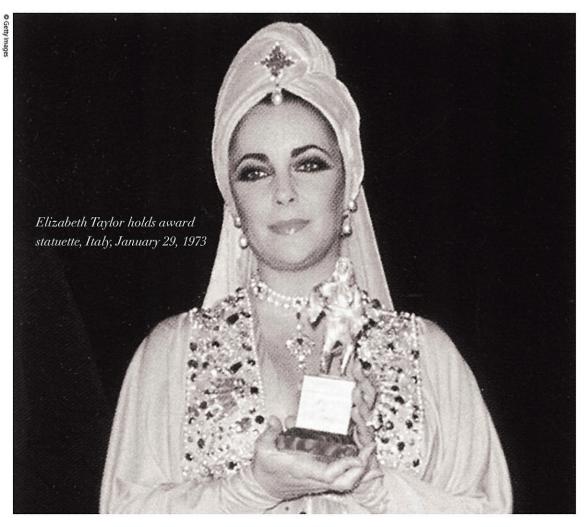

Cartier

In 1957, Mike Todd presented Elizabeth Taylor with a ruby and diamond Cartier jewelry set while they were staying at Villa La Fiorentina, a home the couple rented near St-Jean-Cap-Ferrat.

One of the actress's close friends captured this intimate and romantic moment in a home movie: Liz is by the pool, where the producer brings her the renowned red case, revealing first the necklace, then the earrings and ultimately the bracelet. Glowing more brightly than the strong Mediterranean sun an excited and joyous Liz dons her new gifts with some help from her husband. The color home movie captures these moments of joy for the couple during that summer, a day Elizabeth Taylor would later describe by saying: "It was a perfect summer day and a day of perfect love."

Through frequent visits to our boutiques in Paris, London, New York, Cannes and Monte Carlo, the American actress developed a relationship of intimate trust with Cartier. In addition to buying jewelry, Elizabeth relied on the Maison to create special pieces of jewelry that showcased the most precious and prestigious gems she received as gifts, and as demonstrations of love from her admirer, actor Richard Burton. In 1969, for Saint Valentine's Day, Burton gave her a pear-shaped pearl he purchased at an auction, at the time identified as the famous *Peregrina* pearl from the Court of Philip II of Spain. The couple trusted Cartier designers to dream up a Renaissance-style piece necklace for the gift, inspired by a portrait of Mary Stuart,

Queen of Scots. On design drawings for the necklace that are currently stored in the Maison's archives, the actress's personal choices can be seen written in red ink, providing precious and moving testimony to the intimate relationship she enjoyed with Cartier.

In 1970, the couple was among the first to wear the Love bracelet, a tribute to their legendary love story. In 1972, they acquired the Taj Mahal diamond from Cartier, marking another important declaration of love. While they were waiting in Kennedy Airport, Richard Burton insisted on getting this famous diamond, a gem dating back to the early seventeenth century, and presented the stone to Taylor to celebrate her fortieth birthday. Cut in the shape of a heart, the diamond is engraved with the name Nur Jahan, wife of the Mughal Emperor Jahangir. It later passed into the hands of Mumtaz-I-Mahal, in whose memory her husband Emperor Shah Jahan would eventually build the Taj Mahal. The diamond inspired Richard Burton to claim that he'd originally intended to purchase the celebrated white marble monument for Taylor, but that it proved impossible to move. Cartier designed an Indian-style gold and ruby chain for the precious stone, and an advertisement published in The New York Times to celebrate the historical purchase proclaimed "Cartier is for lovers..."



Peregrina



An Exquisite, Royal Pearl

Nothing has been more constant in the history of jewelry than the fascination for pearls, prevalent in the most ancient and diverse civilizations, a fascination which continues its hold even today.

For a long time, the origin of the pearl remained clouded in mystery, leading to various poetic and even mythical beliefs, which only reinforced the gem's preciousness and power for centuries.

As we now know, the pearl is formed by certain oysters, which will deposit thin layers of aragonite on foreign bodies such as bacteria, accidentally introduced into their shells. Pearls can be found in many different shapes, even very tormented ones described as "baroque", but the most sought after are naturally the most regular: from round, to pear, ovoid or button-shaped. Their color, which will vary between white and black, through all the nuances of cream, pink, aubergine, gold, grey or blue, depends on their composition and the sea temperature. Other key factors include the quality of their skin, their luster and naturally their weight - the larger pearls being the most rare and valuable. The traditional measurement is the "grain", though today it is more common to use metric carats. One carat equals 4 grains. It will take ten years for a pearl of 10 millimeters or roughly 100 grains to be produced!

Amongst the legendary pearls in history, the most famous pear-shaped pearl and one of the oldest is no doubt the *Peregrina*. Here again various legends have added a touch of mystery over the centuries, as three other pearls were

thought at times to bear this name: one belonging to Queen Victoria-Eugenia of Spain (1887-1969), weighing 223.8 grains; another of 133.20 grains from the family of Russian Prince Felix Youssoupoff (1887-1967), now referred to as the *Pelegrina*; and a third of 111.05 grains, known as the *Pellegrina*, which appeared in Moscow in the 19th century and is now believed to originate from the French Crown Jewels. Today, thanks to extensive research and the study of numerous archives, it is possible to distinguish these four gems and trace the history of the one and only *Peregrina* through its four main respective owners: the Spanish Royal family, Joseph Bonaparte and his descendants, the Duke & Duchess of Abercorn and Dame Elizabeth Taylor.

The first reference to this pearl can be found in Commentarios Reales de Los Incas, by the great historian Garcilaso de la Vega (1539-1616). He tells of an exceptional pear-shaped pearl, which was brought back to Spain from Venezuela (other sources of the time mention Panama) in 1579, where it was sold to Philip II (1527-1598). It was meant as a gift for his daughter on the occasion of her marriage, but the King found it so beautiful that he kept it for himself. Later, in his testament, he elevated it to the rank of a Spanish Crown Jewel and from then on, the pearl is recorded in every royal inventory for more than 200 years.





It is always described as a pearl "shaped as a pear" suspended from a small rivet and white enameled hoop, weighing together 58.5 carats (234 old grains with the mount). It adorned Spanish Kings and Queens alike, and can be seen, for example, in the state portrait of Margaret of Austria, Queen of Spain (1584-1611) by Juan Pantoja de la Cruz.

In 1808, after the French invasion of Spain, the eldest brother of Napoleon, Joseph Bonaparte (1768-1844), became the sovereign. Five years later, he abdicated and fled to the United States, where he took with him part of the Spanish Crown treasure, including the Peregrina. Considering the difficult situation in which the Bonaparte family found itself after the abdication of Napoleon in 1814, it was not worn publicly for several years and many wondered as to its actual location. The pearl re-appeared in the hands of Louis-Napoleon, the future Napoleon III (1808-1873), who had received it from his uncle while in exile in England to finance his political activities and successive plots in the 1840s. Thus it was sold to James Hamilton, Marquess of Abercorn, later first Duke of Abercorn, whose family kept it and wore it until the beginning of the 20th Century. During this period, the pearl was drilled to make the mounting more secure (until then, only a minute hole would hold the rivet and hoop) and it might also have been "skinned" and polished to bring back its superb natural luster. These interventions resulted in a certain weight loss.

In 1914, the Abercorn family gave the pearl for sale to the London jeweler Hennell & Son, who presented it to King Alfonso XIII of Spain (1886–1941) due to the obvious historic connections. Being too preoccupied by the beginning of World War I, he turned it down and it was eventually acquired by an anonymous American millionaire. It remained in the United States in private hands until 1969, when it was offered at auction by Parke-Bernet in New York and purchased by Richard Burton for Elizabeth Taylor, as a gift for her 37th birthday. He paid \$37,000 at the time, outbidding a member of the Spanish Royal family, and making the *Peregrina* one of the most legendary jewels in Elizabeth Taylor's famous collection.

A new owner will now add a new chapter in the long life of this extraordinary pearl charged with history. It has always been a source of marvel for its incomparable beauty. No other pearl suits better the description of this gem given by the French poet Paul Claudel (1868–1955): "It radiates from all sides… It is something kind, exquisite, unctuous, affectionate, I would say almost human… It is not so much the fruit of eternity than that of persistence, something linked to the permanence of time."

The True Peregrina

Diamonds from the Golconda mine in India, emeralds from Peru and baroque pearls from Central America fascinated royal collectors in the Renaissance, who bought them for their jewel cabinets from merchants stationed in all four corners of the globe.

But no other jewel has fired the imagination more than the *Peregrina* pearl due to its richly colored past, historical importance as a crown jewel and mysterious disappearance from Spain in the early 19th century. Its most recent owner, the late Dame Elizabeth Taylor, called it the "most perfect pearl in the world."

The *Peregrina*, fished out of the Gulf of Panama in 1579, was then the largest natural pearl ever found. Its extraordinary beauty and size inspired the Italian court jeweler of the time, Jacopo da Trezzo, to christen it the "rare one", or perla peregrina. Habsburg emperors and kings vied to own it, and, for over 200 years, a succession of Spanish queens wore it and were immortalized in court portraits by Diego Velázquez, Francisco Goya and others.

After its theft by Joseph Bonaparte in 1813, countless jewels were declared to be the stolen *Peregrina*. Prince Felix Yusupov, Rasputin's assassin, inherited a pearl given the name of Pelegrina, which since 1826 has been marketed as the "true" pearl. Actor Richard Burton was intrigued by another very similar jewel—better known when he bought it for his wife in 1969 as the *Peregrina* pearl—and hoped to discover the true story. Several years ago, I decided to revisit the *Peregrina*'s provenance, debunk assumptions and clarify misconstrued facts passed down for centuries. After years of investigating royal inventories, correspondence and documents in Spanish archives, I have concluded that Yusupov's *Pelegrina* was, indeed, a pretender that pales in comparison with Dame Elizabeth Taylor's celebrated and true royal pearl, the *Peregrina*.

Then came disasters, wars, revolutions and the *Peregrina* vanishes among these upheavals. Maria Luisa, Queen of Spain, who was painted many times by Goya, was the last Queen of Spain to wear the pearl. It reappeared in England at the court of Queen Victoria worn by the Duchess of Abercorn. Another century later, the pearl was given as a token of love to one of the most glamorous stars Hollywood has ever created: Elizabeth Taylor. At a time where most of the historical gems of the world are shut up forever in showcases in museums, a new chapter of the extraordinary life of the *Peregrina* was written.

This sale is the latest in such chapters which stretch far back in history. For the *Peregrina*, like the Regent diamond which has been part of the French royal treasury for centuries, or the Hope diamond, or the Orloff diamond from the Russian crown jewels, tells us the story of human passions: love, hate, crime and war. Gems such as the *Peregrina* embody the essence of something every man dreams of: Immortality. And because of this, they are priceless...

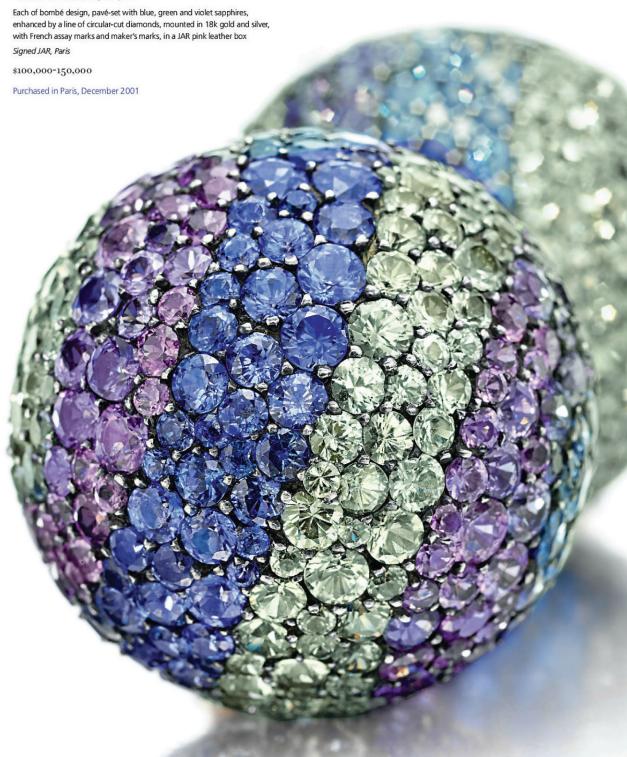

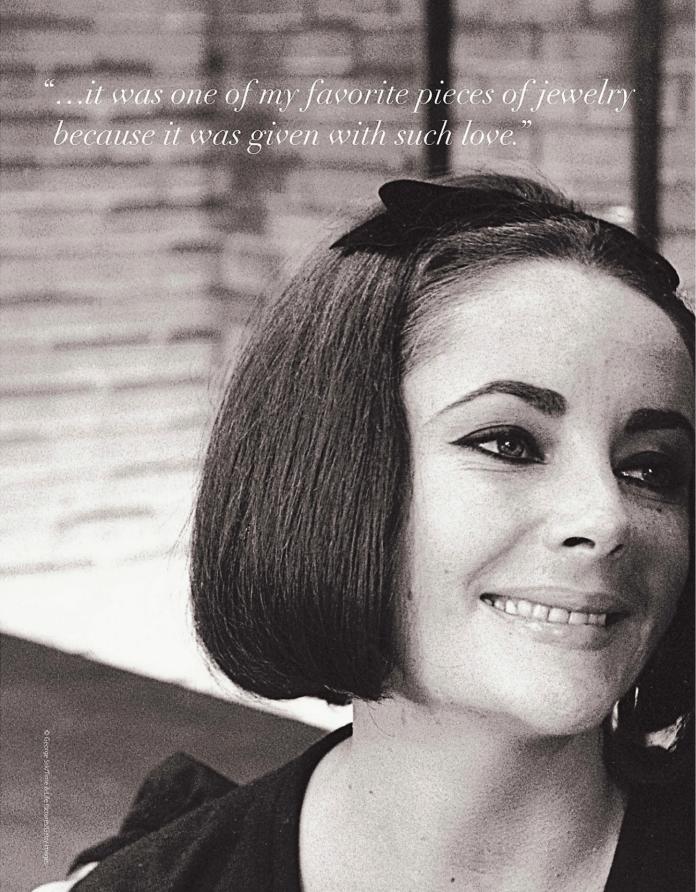

Elizabeth Taylor not only had a passion for jewelry, but also an extensive knowledge and deep understanding of gemstones and jewels.

This is perfectly illustrated by the selection of creations by Boucheron in her collection, such as an Art Nouveau gold and enamel butterfly brooch set with rubies, emeralds, aquamarines and topazes, from 1900. During this golden period in the history of Boucheron were produced many great examples which are highly sought after in auctions or period jewelry stores around the world.

Traditionally, international collectors, particularly from the United States, have enjoyed purchasing pieces of "haute joaillerie" on the famous Place Vendôme in Paris, where some of the most renowned jewelers, such as Boucheron, have their flagship stores. As a result, many of the greatest New York period jewelry dealers have sought to include signature creations by Boucheron amongst their offering. This is probably why some of our most distinctive jewels can be found in Elizabeth Taylor's collection.

The director of the Boucheron boutique in Gstaad remembers with great fondness his extraordinary encounter with the legendary actress when, in 1984, she came in personally to purchase a jewelry set made of rose quartz, black pearls, rubies and diamonds. It included a necklace, a pair of clip earrings, a watch made of quartz and crystal, as well as a rope necklace transformable into four bracelets. These jewels were part of a brand new collection using rock crystal and quartz, which marked an important turn in the creative history of Boucheron in the 1980s, when audacious and modern inspirations jostled the codes of the past.

Elizabeth Taylor had been a client of Bulgari for some time when she started to film 'Cleopatra' in Rome and met Richard Burton for the first time when he co-starred with her.

Later, Burton would say that 'the only word Elizabeth knew in Italian was Bulgari' and that 'I introduced beer to Liz, and she introduced me to Bulgari'.

Indeed, the stellar couple visited our store very frequently, because Richard Burton used any and every occasion to give her a jewel. I am particularly proud that the first official gift he gave Elizabeth was the emerald and diamond brooch she wore on the occasion of their marriage, from which she was never parted.

I remember they were both always very interested in the history behind every piece of jewelry they looked at, and they always asked for more details on the carats and on other features of our stones. When he picked up a piece, he looked to her to see her reaction; there was always an electricity in the air, a kind of telepathy so he always knew what she preferred. I think they had a very special relationship with jewels; they were a sort of completion of their love and a tangible symbol of the happy times they shared.

Sometimes the parures she owned had been split up and sold separately at different times. I remember particularly the case of the magnificent sautoir with a sugarloaf cabochon sapphire set with diamonds which Richard Burton gave her in 1971 which perfectly matched a cabochon sapphire ring Elizabeth came across by chance several years later.

Elizabeth once told me that she felt she was the custodian of her jewels, watching over them and loving them. Jewels were a source of pure happiness for her and she loved wearing them, because she could then share with others their magic powers of joy and excitement. For a jeweler like myself, there is nothing more gratifying that having the sensation of adding to the happiness of a client. That is why I feel so grateful to Elizabeth, because in choosing and wearing Bulgari jewels she gave them the inestimable added value of rare beauty and prestige. To me, her star will shine forever in the history of movies, and in the history of Bulgari as well.

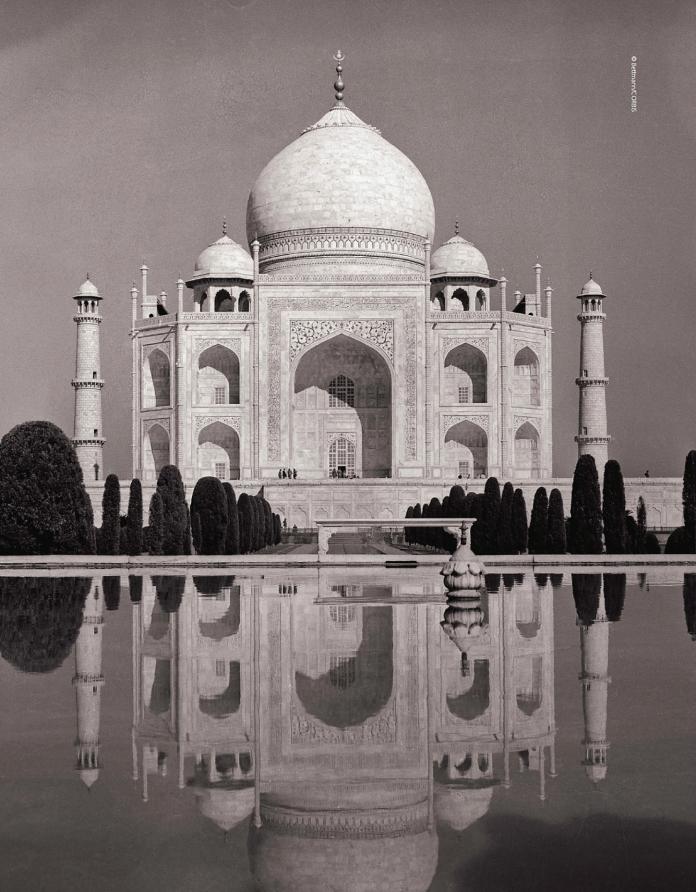

The literal translation of the Persian inscription on the stone has three entries: Nur Jahan Baygum-e Padshah; 23; and 1037. This means that Nur Jahan was a lady of the Padshah, while the number 23 refers to the regnal year of Shah Jahangir, which was indeed 1037, equivalent to 1627-28 A.D. Research indicates that Shah Jahangir had the stone engraved with his wife's name, Nur Jahan, although it is not known whether in fact Nur Jahan ever owned or wore the jewelry. It is believed that at some point Shah Jahangir gave the jewel to his son, Mughal Emperor Shah Jahan "King of the World" (1592-1666). Shah Jahan presented the diamond to Mumtaz-I-Mahal, his favorite and most beloved wife. In 1627, at the age of

thirty-five, Prince Khurram, as he was then known, ascended the throne and although he had several wives, Mumtaz-I-Mahal was said to have been his most trusted advisor and friend. After bearing him fourteen children, she died in childbirth in 1631, at which point the emperor, overcome by grief, locked himself in his room, refusing food for eight days. In memory of his wife, the emperor commissioned a grand mausoleum in her honor that took 20,000 laborers twenty years to complete and utilized only the finest materials available. Initially referred to as the rauza, or tomb, it was later named the Taj Mahal and stands as one of the greatest testaments of architectural elegance in the world today.

There was drama to every aspect of Ms. Taylor's Van Cleef & Arpels collection: the magnificent jewels, the occasions for each acquisition and where she wore the designs.

"One day I'm going to find you the most perfect ruby in the world" was the romantic promise Richard Burton once made to Elizabeth Taylor. After four years searching for the stone, he found it at Van Cleef & Arpels. Then, finally, for Christmas in 1968 Mr. Burton gave Ms. Taylor the 8.24-carat Puertas ruby ring.

This remarkable ruby is one of more than forty Van Cleef & Arpels designs in Ms. Taylor's collection, the largest number from any jeweler in the estate. The collection includes pieces Ms. Taylor received from Michael Jackson and Ron Perelman, as well as designs she purchased herself. During their remarkable romance, Richard Burton provided Ms. Taylor with the majority of her Van Cleef & Arpels jewels.

For their tenth wedding anniversary, Mr. Burton presented his bride with a 32.14-carat cognac diamond ring and diamond earrings featuring cognac diamonds weighing 7.87-and 6.83-carats. Ms. Taylor debuted the Van Cleef & Arpels jewels at the 1974 Oscars where she delivered the Best Picture Award to "The Sting." In 1968, Mr. Burton gave Ms. Taylor a dazzling diamond pendant-brooch by

Van Cleef & Arpels. Frequently, she put the piece at the end of the Taylor-Burton diamond necklace instead of the famous gem to avoid the security detail required by the insurance company every time she wore it. Ms. Taylor's legendary violet eyes inspired Mr. Burton to purchase a number of Van Cleef & Arpels jewels with amethysts. One of the most astonishing, the 1973 "Triphanes" necklace, features a luminous 55.70-carat kunzite pendant. When Ms. Taylor learned she was going to become a grandmother in 1971, Mr. Burton gave her a sensational Van Cleef & Arpels gold and diamond lion choker and pendant earrings. One of Ms. Taylor's favorite Van Cleef & Arpels gifts from Mr. Burton was the stylish 1971 "Sèvres" gold and diamond pendant necklace. She continually wore it over the years including to the White House in 2001 where Bill Clinton presented her with the Presidential Citizens Medal for her work benefiting AIDS research.

The fairy tale ending to Ms. Taylor's Van Cleef & Arpels story came in 2000 when she acquired one of her final pieces. To celebrate becoming a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire, she commissioned beautiful one-of-a-kind Rose de Noël and butterfly coral, diamond, yellow sapphire and pearl pendant earrings. When Dame Elizabeth posed for photographers after the investiture, the radiance of her jewels mirrored the joy in her eyes. Those famous violet eyes sparkled the same way they did in images of her wearing Van Cleef & Arpels jewelry since the time when she received her ruby ring for Christmas in 1968.

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Biographies

BOUCHERON

Frédéric Boucheron opened his first jewelry salon at the Palais Royal in 1858, and soon acquired fame as an expert in precious stones, a masterful technician and a creator of beautiful jewelry. In 1893, he was the first jeweler to set up shop at the Place Vendôme, where he continued to serve the social elite, and from where the firm still operates successfully today. Over the years, the Maison Boucheron opened branches in Moscow and London, and also in Japan, the Middle and Far East. Boucheron exhibited in many international expositions, including the 1876 Philadelphia Centennial, the 1889 and 1900 Expositions Universelles in Paris, the 1893 World's Colombian Exposition in Chicago and the 1925 Exposition of Arts Décoratifs in Paris. Boucheron was acquired in May 2000 by the Gucci Group (PPR), one of the world's leading multi-brand luxury goods company.

BULGARI

The firm of Bulgari was founded by Sotirio Bulgari, who was born in 1857 in Greece and was descended from a family of silversmiths. In 1884, he opened his first shop in Rome on the Via Sistina, and then in 1905 he moved to the Via dei Condotti. Upon Sotirio's death in 1932 his sons, Giorgio and Costantino, took over the business, They are credited with creating the highly distinctive 'Bylgari' style, inspired by Greek and Roman classicism, the Italian Renaissance, and the 19th century Roman school of goldsmiths. The 1970s marked the beginning of Bulgari's international expansion with the opening of stores in New York (the first overseas), Paris, Geneva and Monte Carlo, building towards more than 155 international stores open today. It was also in this decade that Bulgari introduced the 'Bylgari-Bylgari' which was to become a successful watch classic. Bulgari Time was established in the early 1980s in Neuchâtel, Switzerland, for the creation and production of all Bulgari watch lines.

CARTIER

Cartier was founded in Paris in 1847 by Louis-François Cartier. It was his three grandsons, Louis, Pierre and Jacques, who were responsible for establishing the famous world-wide empire. Louis retained responsibility for the Paris branch, moving it to the rue de la Paix in 1899. Jacques took charge of the London operation in 1906, which had opened in 1902, eventually moving it to the current location on New Bond Street. Pierre established the New York branch in 1909, relocating it in 1917 to the current location at 653 Fifth Avenue. Branches were opened in Moscow and the Persian Gulf in 1910, followed by openings in Cannes and Monte Carlo. Prominent amongst Cartier's gifted team were Charles Jacqueau, who joined Louis Cartier in 1909 for a lifetime and Jeanne Toussaint who was appointed Director of Fine Jewelery from 1933. In 1964, following the death of Pierre, Cartier Paris, London and New York were sold by the family. In 1972, a group of investors led by Joseph Kanoui bought Cartier Paris, whose President became Robert Hocq, originator of the concept "Les Must de Cartier" in collaboration with Alain Dominique Perrin. In 1974 Cartier London was bought back, and Cartier New York in 1976. In 1983, the "Art of Cartier Collection" was initiated by Eric Nussbaum. Today, Cartier is part of the Richemont group.

GÉRARD

Louis Gérard, formerly of Van Cleef & Arpels, founded the firm of M. Gérard in 1968 at 8 Avenue Montaigne in Paris. Within nine years, he was sighted as the largest French exporter of fine jewelry. In November 1985 he sold the company to a group of American investors, but continued to operate it until his retirement, when it closed its doors. In September 1988, Louis Gérard reopened the firm at 16 Avenue Montaigne, near its original location, under the name of Louis Gérard, Joaillier International. It closed its doors definitively in December 1991.

JAR

Joel (Arthur) Rosenthal was born in New York City. He graduated in art history from Harvard in 1966 before moving to Paris. He initially worked in the film industry, and then opened a needlepoint shop, where his clients included Hermès and Valentino, and where his work with multi-colored yarns would have a lasting effect on his designs. After working with Bulgari in New York, he returned to Paris and opened a shop in the Place Vendôme in 1977, his initials, JAR, the only source of identification on the façade. Mr. Rosenthal works with his partner, Pierre Jeannet, to create exquisite jewels, superbly crafted in unique settings. His work is meticulous and imaginative, incorporating stones in unexpected color combinations Only 70 to 80 jewels are created each year, for an exclusive clientele. In November 1987, in celebration of his 10th anniversary in Paris, Mr. Rosenthal held an exhibition of his work at the National Academy of Design in New York City. In November 2002, a retrospective of 400 jewels was held at the Gilbert Collection, Somerset House, in

KUTCHINSKY

The firm Kutchinsky, located today at 73 Brompton Road, began manufacturing fine jewelety in East London in 1893. Founded by Hirsch Kutchinsky and his son Morris, it was later handed ower to Morris' sons, Joseph and Solomon, in 1930. After the war, they opened a new workshop. Its great success led them to open the boutique in Knightsbridge specialising in gold work and diamond jewelery. The firm was bought by the Moussaieffs in 1991.

MARINA B

Marina Bulgari, who currently resides in Monte Carlo, hails from one of the world's famous jewelry families, and she created jewelry for the firm until the mid-1970's. After the death of her father, she started her own eponymous brand, Marina B., which was located in Geneva. Almost immediately, her iconic designs, based on playful use of bold color combinations, adorned movie stars like Sophia Loren, and other women of international society who frequented St. Tropez, Ibiza, Capri, Monte Carlo, and St. Bart's. In June 2010, the firm was acquired by Windsor Jewelers Inc., which will re-launch Marina B's best-selling archive pieces and designs while continuing her tradition of design and craftsmanship.

MASSONI

The firm of Massoni was founded in Rome in 1790 and has remained in family hands until this day. In 1832, they relocated to the prestigious Via Condotti where they can be found currently. In past times, they were a supplier to the Italian Royal family and aristocracy. Their creations are designed and manufactured by the family.

MOUAWAD

The prestigious firm of Mouawad was founded in 1890 when David Mouawad, grandfather of the current head, Robert, opened his workshop in Beirut, Lebanon. David's son, Fayez, broadened the business by moving to Saudi Arabia in 1950. The firm's development is due mainly to the dynamism of Favez's son. Robert, and the invaluable contribution of his sons, Fred, Alain and Pascal. Mr Mouawad's choice of artists and craftsmen has enabled him to create masterpieces worthy of royalty such as the jewelled Bonsai presented by the diplomatic community to the new Emperor of Japan in 1993. Above all, however, he is renowned for having handled and owned some of the world's greatest diamonds, including the Indore Pears, the Taylor-Burton, the Tereschenko, and the many fine diamonds named by him. The firm of Mouawad extends from the Middle East to the main jewelery centres of Antwerp, Geneva, London, New York, Paris and the Far East.

RUSER

William Ruser gained his early jewelry experience while working for Thaber & Hoeffer, Inc.-Mauboussin in their Atlantic City shop. From there, he was transferred to the Los Angeles branch as manager. After serving in the armed forces during World War II, he and his wife, Pauline, opened Ruser on Rodeo Drive, Beverly Hills, in 1947. He is most noted for his sculptural gold jewelry with pavé-set diamonds, precious and semi-precious gemstones as well as his nature-inspired jewelry featuring birds, butterflies, fish, flowers and swars. Hollywood stars regularly visited his salon. Ruser closed its doors in 1969.

SCHLUMBERGER

Jean Schlumberger was born in 1907 in Mulhouse, in the German-controlled Alsace, into a family of textile industrialists. Preferring art to textiles, his first jewelry creations were china flowers mounted as clips, which he gave to his friends. They caught the attention of the couturière Elsa Schiaparelli who commissioned Schlumberger to design costume jewelry. After serving in the Army and then the Free French Forces, he set up workshops with his business partner, Nicolas Bongard, in New York and Paris. In 1956, Walter Hoving, the new chairman of Tiffany & Co., brought Schlumberger into the firm as a vice president. He also invited Schlumberger to stamp his creations with his name, the first designer to be given this privilege. In 1961, the Wildenstein Gallery in New York held an exhibition of his jewelry and objets d'art. The Virginia Museum of Fine Arts has on permanent exhibit a selection of his jewels and fantasy objects on loan from Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mellon. Jean Schlumberger died in 1987, and his creations continue to be offered by Tiffany & Co.

LORRAINE SCHWARTZ

An American jeweler and third generation diamond dealer, Lorraine Schwartz took over her family business in 1989 in New York and quickly became an icon for her expertise in creating unique and bold jewelry. She renamed her family company Lorraine Schwartz Diamonds & Fine Jewelry and restructured the company business model so that her designs were sold exclusively at Bergdorf Goodman and her private showroom in New York City. After growing the company, her creations soon caught the eye of A-list celebrities and fashion icons who regularly commissioned her unique pieces for private collections and red carpet worthy occasions. Lorraine had earned a reputation as one of the worlds most sought after jewelry designers. Known for her one-of-a-kind pieces, crafismanship, and dramatic styles, Lorraine creates iconic statement pieces and trend-setting movements.

TIFFANY & CO.

On September 21, 1837, Charles Lewis Tiffany and John P. Young opened a stationery and fancy goods store known as Tiffany & Young at 259 Broadway in New York City. Within ten years, jewelry and silver items were added to their stock. By 1853, Tiffany had assumed complete ownership of the business and the name was changed to Tiffany & Co. During the 10th century, designers such as Edward C. Moore and G. Paulding Farnham, as well as renowned gemologist George Frederick Kunz, propelled Tiffany & Co. to the forefront of the international jewelry world. From 1907, the firm manufactured and sold the jewelry designs of Louis Comfort Tiffany, son of the founder. Upon taking over the management of Tiffany & Co. in 1955, Walter Hoving invited several talented designers to join the firm. Among them were Jean Schlumberger and Donald Claflin. In 1974, they added Elsa Peretti as an exclusive designer, followed by Paloma Picasso in 1980. In 1979, Avon Products purchased Tiffany & Co. After the management-led buyout of Tiffany in 1984, headed by then chairman William R. Chaney, and a successful public offering of stock in 1987, the company has successfully expanded into key domestic and international markets. Today they comprise more than 100 locations worldwide.

VACHERON CONSTANTIN

Vacheron Constantin was founded in 1755 in Geneva by the watchmaker and historian Jean-Marc Vacheron. In 1819, Francois Constantin joined the firm. His main task was to travel to France and Italy to sell the watches. Georges Leschot came to the firm in 1839 to help accomplish the biggest challenge of the time, the mechanical manufacture of watch parts. In 1880, the firm adopted the Cross of Malta as their emblem. In this period, they were pioneers in the development of the watch-bracelet. Today they remain innovators, creating high quality pieces with all of the most complicated mechanisms such as chronographs, repetitions and calendars. In February 1996, the firm became a part of the Richemont Group.

VAN CLEEF & ARPELS

The history of the famous Parisian jewelry house began in 1896 with the marriage of Estelle Arpels to AlfredVan Cleef. The company was founded in 1906 by Alfred and his brother-in law, Charles Arpels at 22, Place Vendôme. Julien Arpels joined the family business in 1908, and Louis Arpels in 1913. The design collaboration between René Sim Lacaze and René Puissant, the daughter of Estelle Arpels and Alfred Van Cleef, began in 1926, marking the start of two decades of highly creative design for the firm. The oldest son of Julien Arpels, Claude, joined in 1932, followed by his brothers Jacques and Pierre in 1936 and 1944. An American boutique was opened by Claude in Rockefeller Center in New York in 1939, soon relocating to its definitive address at 744 Fifth Avenue, and the first of six boutiques in the US today. The 1930s saw some of the company's most iconic designs: the house's arguable trademark, the Mystery Setting - where the mounting of the gemstones is cleverly hidden behind the continuous calibré-cut ruby and sapphire surface of the jewel - was invented in 1933; and the concept of the Minaudière, made in honour of Florence Jay Gould, was invented in 1930 by Charles Arpels. The versatile 'Passe Partout' range was also developed at this time. In the following decades, the firm upheld its reputation for innovation with the snowflake jewels of the 1940s, the zip necklace of the 1950s, the ballet jewels of the 1960s and the Alhambra theme of the 1970s. The Boutique Des Heures was inaugurated in 1972 to house the new watch designs launched by Pierre Arpels. Today, Van Cleef & Arpels is part of the Richemont Group with more than 45 boutiques around the world.
