

Careless handling and lack of sensitivity about the nature of antique maps are the most underestimated causes of damage. Bob Akers, Principal Lecturer — in — charge of Bookbinding and Paper Conservation at the Camberwell School of Art and Craft, explains to map collectors how best to preserve their maps, the kind of materials which are harmful, the effects of humidity and light and the whys and wherefores of framing.

A COLLECTION OF RARE and valuable antique maps is a source of delight and pleasure to its owner but it also brings with it the responsibility for conserving part of our artistic and scientific heritage.

Naturally, not all the causes of damage can be guarded against but some of the more serious but sometimes less obvious causes of deterioration can be prevented if the owner takes some of the practical measures available to avoid unnecessary loss.

Handling

Probably the most underestimated cause of damage to maps is careless handling and this can be easily avoided by just a little extra care and common sense. Collectors tend automatically to learn from their mistakes when handling maps. Some collectors and dealers display loving care whilst skilfully and cautiously handling valuable map materials, rather like a jeweller showing rare gems, but others seem to lack the necessary feeling or sensitivity and treat maps as though they are yesterday's newspapers. One basic rule is never to be in a hurry when handling maps. Always allow enough time to check for unexpected difficulties such as a map which is more delicate than its initial appearance suggests.

Maps easily mark and become dirty especially if frequently handled with soiled or greasy fingers. Hands should always be clean when dealing with maps, prints, books and other paper based materials. Some museums and galleries even suggest that white cotton gloves be worn when handling maps and documents to prevent soiling and damage.

Maps that are frequently handled, carried or referred to will constantly be prone to suffering damage. When it is necessary to pick up a map it should be held carefully with both hands to prevent bending or creasing. Those maps on particularly thin or fragile paper should always be supported on a strong paper or board base when being moved or lifted rather like a casualty on a stretcher. Always make sure that the surface on which the map is to be placed is clean and free from

food, teacups, and drinking glasses. Many oil, fat, tea and coffee stains are caused by mishaps involving food and drink. Never smoke when inspecting or handling maps. Be particularly careful not to touch, rub or drag anything across the surface of a map, some hand-coloured maps are easily disfigured by this treatment.

Large maps present additional problems. They are often rolled and great care must be exercised when opening them, especially if the map is very old and fragile and has been kept rolled for a long time. Particularly fragile materials will not survive if improperly treated. Special precautions need to be taken when a large map is to be unrolled for inspection. The surface on which it is to be unrolled should be large enough to support the entire unrolled surface area of the map. If allowed to hang over the table edges, large maps can tear from their own weight or become badly creased. Small paper-weights placed at the corners and along the edges of the map will keep it in position and help counteract the tendency to roll up again. Never lean, place heavy objects or write on the surface of a map.

These precautions may seem obvious but it is surprising how often they are neglected or forgotten. One final point on handling, always make sure that others handling your collection adopt the same high standards as yourself. Never be too timid to explain to others how maps should be handled.

Maps may be vellum, parchment, leather, paper, papyrus, wood or metal but by far the largest number are printed or

drawn on paper. Some papers, especially modern ones, quickly deteriorate because they are made from poor quality materials. Papers made before the mid-19th century usually have a good resistance to ageing provided they are kept under good conditions of storage. All types of paper will deteriorate and eventually become marked if placed in prolonged contact with unsuitable materials.

Framing is probably the most popular method of displaying maps and charts. Unfortunately, during the framing process unsuitable secondary materials can often be introduced and placed in close contact with the map or chart. Many framers are unaware of the importance of using materials that will not eventually stain, damage or cause deterioration to the contents of the frame. Unless otherwise directed, framers will often use low grade acidic mounting boards made with a core of unrefined groundwood that will inevitably deteriorate and enbrittle any paper with which it is in prolonged contact.



Maps that have been kept between such boards for a few years will begin to show a characteristic brown stain along the inner edge of the window opening of the board mount. These mounts should ideally be removed and replaced with mounts made from conservation or museum quality mounting board which is acid-free and will not damage the paper.

If the old mount is of historical interest, aesthetic value or contains the marks of famous collectors, you may not want to remove it even though it may be starting to show these warning signs of deterioration. So, in order to prevent further migration of acid it is advisable to have the old back board of the mount replaced with a new acid-free board and have inserted a piece of acid-free long-life paper or polyester film between the window mount and the map. If the frame has an unsurfaced wooden backing board this should also be removed and replaced with acid-free conservation quality mounting board.

Not many collectors or owners will wish to do their own mounting and framing and will, therefore, have to rely on commercial framers. In order to avoid problems choose a framer recommended by a museum and always insist that only conservation quality acid-free materials are used. Additional expense will prove well worthwhile. Also ensure that no pressure sensitive tapes (Sellotape, Scotch Tape, Masking Tape) rubber cement, cow gum, synthetic adhesives or heat sealing tissue are used during the mounting process.

Unframed maps

For optimum protection small maps should be placed in a mount even if there is no intention of framing. This will protect them from one another and allow them to be handled without being actually touched. Alternatively small loose maps can be kept in portfolios or acid-free folders made from Permalife or Archive long-life paper. Large collections are best kept in plan chests, map storage cabinets or large Solander boxes (specially constructed boxes that give additional protection). Unmounted maps should never be stacked directly on top of each other but should be kept separated by interleaving with smooth surfaced acid-free paper or board.

Ideally maps should always be stored flat but if it does prove necessary to roll a large map for storage or transport it should be carefully rolled on a strong cardboard cylinder at least 125mm. (5 ins) in diameter and cut 150mm. (6 ins) longer than the width of the map and the cylinder covered with linen or acid-free paper to prevent acid migrating to the map. Always avoid rolling maps too tightly as this tends to crease the surface and may disturb the colouring. For long-term storage a piece of cloth or linen, cut 150mm. (6 ins) wider than the cylinder at each end so that the overlap can be tucked in, can be wrapped around the outside of the map on the cylinder to form a protective dust-proof cover. This can be tied or held in position around the cylinder with strips of wide cotton or linen tape. Never stand or store a rolled map on its

Maps should never be stored inside metal cylinders because it is almost impossible to withdraw or replace maps without causing serious damage. In addition, metal cylinders are seldom non-corrodible and tend to rust.


Fight

In addition to damage from careless handling and contact with unsuitable materials, maps can be damaged by environmental conditions. Acting in isolation or together, light, heat and humidity can bring about a slow physical and chemical deterioration of paper, parchment, vellum, inks and colours.

Good lighting is obviously necessary for examining and admiring maps and other works of art, but it can be an active and insidious enemy. Sunlight, both direct and indirect, and fluorescent lighting are rich in ultra-violet rays which are harmful to paper, inks and colouring media. Most people will have gained a knowledge of this problem from personal experience; for example, a newspaper turning brown and brittle when overexposed to light and heat. Positive measures are now taken by museums and galleries to keep light intensity to a level acceptable for good viewing purposes but less damaging to the material on display. It is, however, surprising how often the problems presented by over-exposure to light are ignored or misunderstood. Maps, prints, drawings and other articles made from paper can still be found displayed for sale in the unprotected sunlit windows of galleries and shops.

Light damages paper in two ways. It has a bleaching action which causes whitening or yellowing of paper and the fading of inks and colours. In addition, the photochemical action of light on paper can cause rapid deterioration especially when the paper is of a poor quality.

Experts agree that, all things being equal, paper will survive longer in the dark than in the light. However, few people would wish to keep their collections in the dark, permanently hidden from view. Fortunately, those with modest collections can prevent unnecessary exposure to light by using a few simple precautions. For example, avoid hanging maps and charts on a wall directly opposite or near a window where they will be


exposed to direct sunlight. When this proves impossible sunlight can be moderated at windows and doors by the use of curtains or louvred blinds. Single items or small areas can be protected by placing covers over them.

A more permanent and effective protection for larger collections is to use a material which filters the ultra-violet radiation whilst allowing visible light to pass. Perspex VE and Oroglas UF3 are grades of acrylic transparent sheeting available in a range of thicknesses and specially formulated to give protection from ultra-violet radiation. This material can be used as a substitute for regular window glass or may be fixed over existing window glass to form double glazing.

Sunblinds made from 'Uvethon' transparent film fitted to the inside of windows and lowered during the daylight hours will also effectively reduce the amount of ultra-violet entering a building. Maps that are to be framed can be given protection by using Perspex VA or Oroglas UF3 instead of ordinary picture glass. In addition to acting as a filter for ultra-violet it also offers the advantages of being almost unbreakable and will not condense moisture as readily as glass.

Meat

High temperatures will accelerate the deterioration of paper. A sheet of paper kept in a very high temperature for a number of days will begin to show the same signs of ageing as paper

kept in a normal temperature for many years so the lower the temperature to which maps are subjected the longer the paper will endure. Vellum and parchment are also adversely affected by excessive heat and will become dry and brittle. Do not hang framed maps over a source of heat such as a fireplace, radiator or heating duct. Lighting can also be a source of heat, especially tungsten filament lamps and it is advisable not to position lamps, likely to generate heat, too near maps on display. Maps should be stored away from heat. In winter the central heating thermostat should be carefully regulated to prevent overheating during mild spells.

Humidity

Maps exposed to a very high or low humidity will eventually begin to show signs of deterioration. Paper is a hygroscopic material which under normal circumstances should have a moisture content of approximately 6%. If exposed to a high humidity it has a natural tendency to absorb additional moisture which may hasten deterioration. It may result in the growth of mould which will discolour, disfigure and spoil the appearance of the map. Vellum and parchment are especially prone to mould growth and will not remain flat under conditions of high humidity but will tend to warp, buckle, or become wavy. Too low a humidity causes drying and embrittlement of paper. Frequent fluctuations of humidity create internal stresses as the paper expands and contracts in response to the changes.

The best answer to humidity problems is constant air conditioning. However, where such equipment is not available the following precautions will help alleviate some of the problems. If possible avoid hanging framed maps on the exterior walls of a house especially if they tend to be damp or very cold in winter. Good circulation of air reduces the chances of mould. Circulation of air behind the frame can be improved by attaching small pieces of cork or wood to the lower corner of the frame to keep it in a position slightly away from the wall. Never frame maps in direct contact with the glass as this invites damage by mould or staining from the condensation of moisture.

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
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How Art...



overcame Adversity

Braun and Hogenberg's Civitates Orbis Terrarum was a monumental work comprising over 500 plates portraying urban life in the latter part of the 16th century. Its preparation required considerable cooperation at a time of international, political and religious strife. Even though the Civitates was a remarkable geographical work which appeared despite all odds, Simon Pointer suggests that much greater emphasis should be given to the artistic achievements of its contributors, in particular Joris Hoefnagel.

THE PUBLICATION OF the *Civitates Orbis Terrarum* in Cologne in 1572 took place against a background of massive turmoil in Europe: France and the Netherlands in particular were racked by internal strife, while few of the other leading powers were free from the repercussions of the ideas of the reformers. In no sense was the stage set for the appearance of such an original work which drew on information supplied by men of many nations.

Under the auspices of a group, led by Georg Braun assisted by Frans Hogenberg and Joris Hoefnagel, no less than five volumes containing views of the major cities of much of the There were various elevations from which towns in the *Civitates* were viewed. There were prospects or profiles in which the subject is drawn from a distance but from ground level so that rooftops from the skyline as in Cornelius Caymox's Nuremberg (right).





Bird's eye views were taken from a more elevated position for example in the plate of *Weissenberg* (far right). There were also those taken theoretically from a vertical position and having almost the characteristics of a map or plan. Braun himself preferred that 'towns should be drawn in such a manner that the viewer can look into all the roads and streets and see also all the buildings and open spaces'. world had appeared by 1600. After a gap of twenty years a sixth volume was produced in 1617. There is no doubt that the *Civitates* is one of the great books of the world and has led the way in showing different methods of viewing towns and artistic styles in drawing them.

Never before had a collection of accurate views of cities been attempted on such a scale, while the publication of any such collection from copper plates was certainly unknown. Interest in the portrayal of urban life had first appeared in the Ulm edition of Ptolemy in 1482 and in Schedel's work of 1493. But accuracy was considered to be of secondary importance in both these works and they were more an attempt to show that cities existed rather than to illustrate the form they took. The importance of precision was not even fully realised by Münster whose *Cosmographia* contains imaginary views of some less important towns.

Although the project smacked of such originality, it would be wrong to view it in isolation either historically or geographically. In 1570 the *Theatrum Orbis Terrarum* of Abraham Ortelius had appeared with maps engraved by Frans Hogenberg and the very similarity of the title of this atlas to that of Braun's first volume points to their relationship. In terms of pure numbers, it was impossible to produce a work as concise and finite as the *Theatrum* on the cities of the world, while Braun's devotion to accuracy was evidently frustrated by the uneven supply of available material from different parts of the world. This meant that the choice of towns and regions appeared haphazard as the editors relied — in the early stages at least — on the small selection of accurate information available to them at Cologne.

There can be little doubt that political difficulties caused constant problems in preparing the *Civitates*. Frans Hogenberg, whose family had provided a line of skilful artists based first in Munich and later at Mechlin, was on a list of proscribed

Protestants drawn up by the Duke of Alva between 1567 and 1570; his ability to travel and collect information was therefore seriously impaired.

Similarly, it would seem that Jacob van Deventer, who contributed many of the plans of Holland and Flanders, had his work embargoed in Volume I because they had been taken from an original manuscript collection of 320 town plans drawn up for administrative and military purposes on behalf of Philip II. Publication of such items without royal permission could only lead to the withdrawal of the rights of publication within the Hapsburg dominions.

By obtaining imperial privilege and by making a series of royal and ducal dedications, the authors pursued a 'Vicar of Bray' approach to the publication of their work. Through the French wars of religion and the Dutch revolt in the Netherlands they produced a work in which the selection of material was far more widespread than the most optimistic author could have expected in such a period of turmoil.




The artistic role of Joris Hoefnagel of Antwerp has until recently been underestimated. He was a source for the illustrators and a life long collaborator in the work and he has also been credited with the supervision of many of the other artists. He supplied sixty three drawings and the regions covered by each book of the *Civitates* varied with Hoefnagel's journeys, so that many of his sketches made in France, Germany and England (including Oxford and Windsor) in the 1560s were included in the earlier volumes while his sojourns in Munich, Prague and Vienna in the 1590s result in views for later volumes. He forwarded his acquisitions to Cologne with the epithet 'Communicavit Houfnaglius'.

Like Leonardo da Vinci, Hoefnagel's talent was based on an

enthusiasm for knowledge. More important in one sense was his observation of detail through which he conveyed the central theme of the *Civitates*—the structure of the cities and the way of life of their inhabitants. It is also clear from his beautiful illuminations for the writing book of Georg Bocskay, prepared for Emperor Rudolph II, and from his painting 'A Fete at Bermondsey' that he was the master of pure landscape or pure observation of local custom as the situation demanded.

The forewords to the works were written by the cleric Georg Braun. He appealed in the preface to Volume II for more material from his readers, and following this the standard of drawings received at Cologne varied dramatically. The variety of sources and of differing artistic styles became increasingly

apparent. Jacob van Deventer's role as Geographer Royal had induced him to prepare plans of mathematical precision, crucial if his work was to be used for military purposes. This meant that many of the Dutch views supplied by him were engraved by Hogenberg as birds-eye views, ideal for indicating the growth beyond the city walls of the post-medieval Dutch cities but hardly comparable to Hoefnagel's landscape views in terms of artistic merit.

As the series continued, the influences underwent a fundamental alteration, a fact that is masked by the uniform engraving of Frans Hogenberg. The editors had laid down from the beginning that costumed figures - drawn largely from the works of Abraham de Bruyn of Antwerp and Hans Wegel and Jost Amman's 'Trachtenbuch' - should appear in the foreground of the illustrations. There were two reasons for this. Firstly to illustrate the typical inhabitants of the towns depicted and secondly to discourage the Turks - a constant threat responsible for frustrated attempts to obtain illustrations of the cities in south eastern Europe – from gazing at works which might give them an advantage in the struggle for

In the engraving of the plates, Hogenberg introduced an element of uniformity both in his use of heraldry and his balance of design, the more extreme diversities were therefore successfully overcome by the co-operation of Hoefnagel and his collaborators.

The fact remains that despite these elements and the assistance of imaginative colourists the Civitates continued to develop as 'essentially a collection of pictures'. Many of the early views had first appeared as edited broadsheets of Flugblatter produced singly with latin text and entitled 'Hogenberg's Historical Prints'. The editors also frequently allowed copies of the earlier works to appear without acknowledgement - most notably the Zurich view (from Jos Murer's woodcut of 1576). Despite constant correspondence with the nobility, artists and cartographers, Braun found it impossible to collect a series of unpublished up-to-date views and compromise was constantly necessary.

Although Volumes I and II proved to be the most popular and were frequently republished in latin, the accumulation of new contributions became a constant reason for the publication of later volumes. The names of the collectors who forwarded the drawings to Cologne are more in evidence than the names of the artists themselves, and among these the Count von Rantzau, Governor of Schleswig and Holstein, stands out as the greatest enthusiast. With the aid of such talented artists as his agent Hieronymus Schol, who produced the magnificent panoramas of Bergen and Stockholm, he provided enough



illustrations of Scandinavia for Volume IV to warrant the dedication of the work to King Christian IV of Denmark. The Count's views are supplemented by the only map in the collection prepared in 1585 by Mark Jorden.

Identification of some of the artists is very difficult in some cases as Braun constantly had in mind the value of his contributors rather than their agents. We do know for example

that the views of Liege and Namur were provided by ecclesiastical dignitaries but we do not know the name of the artist. Sometimes it is possible to trace the source through the patron as in the case of the Hanse Merchant Constantin von Lyskirchen. He 'communicated all these towns of India, Asia, Africa and Persia never portrayed before, with their descriptions written by hand'. The Portuguese manuscript illustrator who provided the views remains anonymous and only through von Lyskirchen can his contribution to the *Civitates* be identified.

The close co-operation between many of the engravers and cartographers led to a constant interchange in material. For example, the travels of Ortelius and Hoefnagel in the 1570s, provided a series of spectacular views showing the two men at



various stages of their task engrossed in the curiosities of Tivoli, Mola, Baiae or Forum Vulcani. This interchange does however lead to certain problems regarding identification of sources. While there is no doubt that Mexico and Cusco are drawn from the du Pinet woodcuts of 1564, the views attributed to him in Volume I appeared in the Münster edition of 1572 and it is difficult to imagine that there was no co-operation when editors were producing works of mutual interest.

The reverse texts highlight the way in which Braun extended the appeal of the *Civitates*. As demand grew, they were printed in the vernacular as well as the 'international' language latin. The names of the views were in the language

of the region depicted.

Contributors also sent detailed descriptions of the cities to Braun and this information was frequently printed without acknowledgement. The repeated naming of contemporary authors such as Polydore Vergil served to emphasize the research which had been put into the work but once again masked the original contributions made by the editors and



their sources.

In the last analysis the Civitates must remain an enigma. There is considerable uncertainty about the precise roles of the initiators, and only Hogenberg and Simon van Neuvel are specifically given any credit in Volume I. Variety remains its key point; such a work, unprecedented in concept, should not be contemplated in the light of today's standards. Working against the enormous political problems of the time, the editors produced – with the gifted assistance of Joris Hoefnagel - a work of unparallelled scope and authenticity. They bound together illustrations so dissimilar in artistic style as Deventer's Dutch plans and Hoefnagel's elaborate Italian views while at the same time having to encompass the differing styles of landscape, birds-eye views and oblique view within the same work. That they did this successfully against a background of such turmoil and with the challenge of an unknown style of engraving, must surely mean that they rank among the most optimistic and successful engravers and innovators of all time.

A beautiful and informative map depicting the eastern two thirds of the Mediterranean Sea, the entire Red Sea, to the northern coast of the Black Sea, and to the Caspian Sea and Persian Gulf. The Blacus exhibited a great deal of coastal data, topographical features, and locations of cities and towns. Together with two decorative cartouches, this map of the Turkish Empire was contributed toward a corpus which has been called "the highest expression of Dutch cartographical art." 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Women in the Map

T IS NOT perhaps generally recognised the part women have played in the map world. I doubt if there are many even among those who are familiar with maps who could name even as many as half a dozen.

I have, over a period of time, made a note of such names and think it not without interest to give the following first tentative list as far as I know.

This may open the way for a general monograph on the subject, or a more detailed study of a particular person.

AINSLIE (Mrs). Publisher. Widow continued her husband John's business publishing maps of Forfar 1794, and Renfrew 1800.

BAKEWELL, Elizabeth. Continued her husband's publishing business. End of 18th century.

BEECK, Anna. Flourishing from 1700-17. Map publisher and colourist in The Hague. Published many plans of battlefields and sieges, sometimes with additional coloured headpieces.

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Alexander Dalrymple, F.R.S., (1737-1808), First Hydrographer to The Admiralty,

THE HYDROGRAPHICAL OFFICE (publishers of the first official admiralty surveys) was founded in 1795 and its first and probably one of its ablest directors was Alexander Dalrymple.

Before the establishment of the Hydrographic Office, charts were published privately by their compilers or purchased from commercial marine publishers. Dalrymple, like Captain Cook, published many of his own charts.

The following notes are from the early period of Dalrymple's career and were originally collected by Mr Herbert Edwards, (a director of Francis Edwards Ltd., Rare Book and Map Dealers in Marylebone High Street, London, who died last year) over a long period and were given to me on his retirement in 1970. They are now published as a tribute to his memory.

Many of the items are of great rarity. Lieutenant Commander David RN, has compiled a catalogue of the charts published by Dalrymple after his appointment to the Admiralty and is engaged on a more extensive survey of Dalrymple's charts.

The items listed have been checked against the holdings in the British Library and personal notes of my own. For a full account of Dalrymple's life see *Alexander Dalrymple and the Expansion of British Trade* by Howard T. Fry. Published for the Royal Commonwealth Society by Frank Cass, London, 1970.

Although this is described as Part 1 on the title, no further parts were issued. It contains (1) A Geographical Description of Places. (2) An Examination of the conduct of the Discoverers in the Tracks they Pursued. (3) Investigations of what may be further Expected. 'Printed in 1767 but not published until 1769, Dalrymple gave Banks a copy before the latter embarked in the *Endeavour*. The chart showed Torres' track between Australia and New Guinea, and it was partly Cook's anxiety to clear up the question whether the strait really existed that decided him to try to return from New Zealand by way of the east coast of Australia'. Sir Maurice Holmes.

Dalrymple in his *Historical Collection* published in 1770 states that only a few copies of this were printed. There was another issue with

the plates on thick paper.

The chart is entitled Chart of the South Pacific Ocean, pointing out the Discoveries made therein previous to 1764. Published according to Act of Parliament October 1767.

In the matter of wreck I should state the *Grosvenor* struck to the north of Umzuwullu river and to the south of the river which runs into the sand patch which is on the north of where we struck'.

Dalrymple was not a man to turn the other cheek to any blow to his amour propre, but Cook on his return to England in 1771 was too much of a national hero for Dalrymple to venture on a frontal attack. He accordingly attacked Cook obliquely through the latter's editor, Dr. Hawkesworth; but his animus against Cook was at the time too much for his control, etc' Sir Maurice Holmes.

This pamphlet is of extreme rarity. Hawkesworth replies to it in bantering fashion in an eight page preface to the second edition of his

account of Cook's first voyage.

"... I concluded that the same influence which prevented me from going in the *Endeavour*, and which, I doubt not, has since prevented Mr. Banks from going in the *Resolution*, would impose silence concerning the merit of every attempt of mine to throw light on former discoveries in the South Seas ... since I find myself attacked by implication, as

having misrepresented the Spanish and Dutch Voyages to support my own ill-grounded conjectures...'

This extremely rare pamphlet is apparently unrecorded, as is the chart referred to. It was Dalrymple's intention to publish a much fuller memoir, for on page four he states, 'The Tract I mean to print will contain all the circumstances I have met with relative to the Islands, &c. in this Ocean' ... He ends by stating 'It is estimated that the plans and views of the Islands, which are intended to be engraved for the tract above-mentioned, will cost 301. If this proposal does not meet the public countenance, I shall confine myself to the publication of the tract without plates'...

'The intention of this publication is not merely to communicate to the World a chart of the ocean, between South America and Africa, laid down with more exactness than any hitherto published, and to shew, by the tracks of Halley, and Bouvet, where there is not land; but as a specimen of hydrographical engraving, in which every thing useful is inserted, and nothing but what is useful'.

The last three paragraphs of the 'Advertisement' were evidently an afterthought and are printed on a separate slip pasted on the blank part of page iv.

Although a separate publication this is to all intents and purposes a continuation of his pamphlet published earlier in the year entitled *Plan for Promoting the Fur-Trade, and Securing it to This Country, etc.*, (item 118). He again presses for a union between the two companies and deals with the necessity of finding a route that would allow the furs of Canada and north west America to be shipped direct from the Pacific coast to the China market.

In the writing of this pamphlet Dalrymple quotes from the works of numerous voyages and explorers and summarises a mass of unpublished material to which he had access.

The folding map entitled *Map of the Lands around The North Pole* by Dalrymple, 1789, the engraved surface of which measures 34.3 by 30.5 cm was published on May 4th 1789, so it actually appeared before the pamphlet, the text of which is dated 29th May 1789 and the 'Advertisement' 16th June 1789.

In the construction of the map, which is occupied chiefly with the west coast of America south to California, Dalrymple says 'I have chiefly followed the Map of that Coast, made by Miguel Costanzo at Mexico, in 1770 ... But I have regulated the Longitudes by the Observations of the last Transit of Venus by Abbé Chappe at St. Joseph, near the extremity of California. Monterey and San Francisco are corrently positioned, the latter being described as 'the Port, which Sir Francis Drake visited in 1579'.

Although dated 1769 this work actually was not issued until 1771. It was one of Dalrymple's most important works, setting out at great length his proposals for the extension of the Company's trade in China and the East India Islands. He gives a valuable account of Borneo and its products, and stresses the importance of Balambangan as an emporium.

'The places described in the following work are, I will be bold to say, an important accession to the British Empire; and I can with pride affirm, they were obtained without fraud or violence'. (Preface, iv). There are references to New Guinea and Australia, Dalrymple saying 'The Bugguese describe New Holland to yield gold, and the natives, who are Mahometans, to be well inclined to commerce: this must be referred to the northern part, which seems to be what Marco-Polo calls Lochae, ... he says it is very rich and great producing plenty of Brazil-wood, and

... he says it is very rich and great producing plenty of Brazil-wood, and much gold. Geographers ascribe to the Portuguese in early times the discovery of a country in this quarter called Lucat, yielding gold; this is

probably the same country Marco-Polo calls Lochae'.

The original issue of Dalrymple's Scheme, as it was sent to persons

Dalrymple estimated the expenses of the Voyage at £15,000 and said that 'no pecuniary return is to be expected, but if any sum should remain after this Voyage is finished, or any profits arise from it, that such Sums shall remain for the future prosecution of the same plan'.

This peculiar scheme was the outcome of the discovery by Captain Cook on his first voyage that New Zealand consisted of two islands. 'Perhaps Dalrymple's jealousy of Cook was the motive, as the former offered and expected to command the expedition. At any rate, it is the first systematic proposal to connect the two countries'. - Hocken.

Of the greatest rarity. It was printed in The Annual Register of 1779, also in Franklin's Political, Miscellaneous and Philosophical Pieces, portrait, 8vo, 1779, and reprinted in the New Zealand Journal, 1843, in an edition limited to fifty copies issued by E.A. Petherick in 1882, but without the two last pages referring to Trustees and Subscriptions. It was again reprinted, complete, by James Dally, Hobart 1971 in an edition of 150 copies, printed at the Nag's Head Press, Christchurch, New Zealand.

Dalrymple was opposed to the idea of using Australia as a penal settlement and he says 'We often see men grow giddy and lose their senses, by being carried to a great elevation ... To what other cause can we ascribe the Plan of the present Ministry? to send the Convicts to Botany Bay, on the East-Side of New-Holland, whilst This Country is still smarting for a War with Her old Colonies'. He goes on to say 'that a Colony established there, however formed, must become independent, whenever they find it their interest to do so'. He goes on to recommend the Island of Tristan d'Acunha as a more suitable place since the situation of the island would make all governors and guards unnecessary and he quotes extensively from the various publications in support of his suggestion.

Dalrymple also includes a long letter he wrote to the directors of the East India Company in 1785 setting out reasons why they should not settle Norfolk Island which was then 'unequivocally situated within the limits of The Company's Charter'.

Point 14:

The Establishment of a Colony in that quarter, wherever it may be first fixed, must have a View to New-Holland; and if an European Colony be established, on that extensive Country. It is obvious it must become very soon independent; and I will add, very dangerous to England'. (pp 14-15).

'Whoever will cast an eye on the Map, and see the extent of New Holland, ... must perceive, that this Country has a greater extent of Coast than that of America, we have lost, in all the variety of climate .. and is in a state fit for immediate habitation, without clearing away and cutting down woods, at such a remote distance from this Country, that a Colony established there, however formed, must become independent, whenever they find it their Interest to be so'. (p 24).

'If we had nothing to lose in the East, it might be a curious subject of Political Speculation, to see what kind of Government, a set of lawless Ragamuffins would constitute ... (p 26).

CHARTS AND MAPS

There is nothing the same as Dalrymple's charts in existence. In many

cases the engraving is the only one ever published from manuscripts of the highest authenticity. Dalrymple, both from his official position first as Hydrographer to the East India Company and then to the Admiralty, had a great acquaintance among ships' commanders and literati and was unremitting in his efforts to discover all possible sources of information. The editor was the earliest writer to compare critically the old voyages and published maps and this habit of mind is reflected in his charts.

Dalrymple issued separately, and in books and memoirs, probably over 1000 maps and charts of South and East Africa, Madagascar, India, Ceylon, Burma, Siam, Penang, Sumatra, Borneo, New Guinea, New Britain, China, Formosa, Japan, Guam, the Phillipine Islands, Australia, the north west coast of America, etc. Our list is confined to those of Australia, the Pacific and the north west coast of America.



The objects of *general maps* are "to describe the several countries of the world, in their *true situations, comparative magnitude, and nautical figure*". The impossibility of describing the surface of a *sphere* on a *plain,* has induced the *ingenious* to many projections of the sphere *in plano,* scientifically, though not *apparently* true: approximations to truth have been devised, which describe small portions of the surface of the *sphere,* very accurately on a *plane,* but every attempt hitherto to describe the *whole globe* has greatly failed in one or more of the objects essentially requisite in geography. Speculative geography requires also a comparative view of the *land* in the *north* and *south* hemispheres. In the investigation of the relative quantity of land and water on the surface of the globe in different latitudes, it was found the quantity of land within the tropics in the *north* and *south* latitude was nearly equal; hence it occurred to me, that not only the *geographical,* but even the *philosophical* description might be had *nearly* true, by a new projection of the globe, in which at once the comparative quantity of land in the two hemispheres should appear, at the same time that all the known countries should maintain their reciprocal situations, size and figure. This was by describing the globe in *three* parts instead of *two,* as had been *hitherto* attempted...' (By courtesy of The Bodleian Library. Ref: CC 232 Art. Seld.)

This splendid map seems to have been specially prepared by the publisher for presentation to Dalrymple, since it has engraved upon it the words Additions to 1799; those additions having, in all probability, been derived from him. It appears originally to have been drawn to represent the state of geographical knowledge at the date of Cook's first leaving England; with the additions to it acquired during the several voyages, to which again were added the later discoveries made by Dalrymple, or communicated to him in his official capacity as Hydrographer to the Admiralty, so far, at least, as they affected the information communicated by Cook and his officers. Old Korean Hand Atlases

by Shannon McCune

Shannon McCune, who is Professor of Geography and Director of Asian Studies at the University of Florida, first discovered Korean hand atlases in 1938 while on a geographic field trip to Korea. He studied them again nearly 40 years later when he returned to Korea as a visiting Fulbright Professor. Here, he traces their fascinating history and their relevance to map collectors today and expresses his fears that rising prices might encourage forgeries.

KOREAN STUDENTS AND SCHOLARS during the Yi Dynasty (1392-1910) copied or had printed by wood block, small hand atlases which now fetch about 50,000 Hwan (\$100) in Korea when, as occasionally happens, they come on to the market for today's map collectors.

These unique and colourful atlases are so attractive that they often appear more valuable than they really are and they can be found in many major map collections in the United States and Europe¹ — also in private collections in Korea and Japan.


They are usually titled by three characters, pronounced in Korean Yojido, meaning geographical maps, and were used as reference materials for the reading of Chinese classics, for elementary geographical knowledge of the neighbouring lands of China, Japan and the Liu Chiu Kingdom and for more detailed knowledge of the eight Korean provinces and the counties or magistracies into which the provinces were divided. The prototypes of the maps came from historical materials prepared in the latter half of the 15th century. It is presumed that the earliest atlases were made soon after.

The size of the maps was regulated by the size of the paper sheets available rather than by any considerations of scale. Colour was often added by hand and references to populations, provinces, magistracies and distances were added to the margins or to the backing sheets. The maps were usually folded making them both convenient to use and carry.


Korean hand atlases came in various formats² and copies can be found in many libraries and private collections in Korea and Japan.³ Whilst there are a number in large collections amongst affluent Koreans they are rarely offered to collectors in Western countries. But when they are they may be grossly over-priced because of lack of understanding of their value and character.

Also, the Republic of Korea has placed restrictions on the export of antiquarian material.

From the time of the visits of the famous cartophile, Leo Bagrow, ⁴ in 1912 and 1919 up to the present day they have been a staple commodity for sale in antique shops and old book stores in Seoul. In the days of Japanese control of Korea (1910-1945) the atlases sold for 500 to 1000 Yen (US \$3).⁵



This manuscript *Ch'onhado*, or world map, is a very common feature of Korean hand atlases. It opens out from six folds and was perhaps copied from a Chinese source. The place names are derived from mythical places noted in Chinese classics and from known lands around China, which occupies the centre of the map. The date of the map is unknown.



This Ch'onhado was printed by woodblock sometime after 1800. The lines supposedly indicate latitude and longitude.

Recently the first asking price has been up to 50,000 Hwan (US \$100) though the buying price could have been one-third or one-quarter of that amount or even less for an atlas that was missing one or more of the standard maps.⁶

These high prices which have continued to inflate since 1976 may well result in the manufacture of such atlases; after all, most of the old atlases are copies of copies. There would be no difficulty in making fresh copies on stocks of old paper or on paper hand-made in the old style. It would be difficult to detect any difference between an atlas made in 1878 and one made in 1978.

As the late Japanese cartophile, Hiroshi Nakamura, pointed out in an article written in 1934 and published in *Imago Mundi* in 1948⁷ the wood-block versions of the hand atlases are more valuable than the manuscript versions partly because the wood-block atlases may be classified. He made a classification of thirteen varieties depending on the size of the atlas, the maps within it and the technique used in printing them. Because the wood-block atlases are usually not so colourful the prices for them are apt to be lower than for the hand-copied versions, particularly the prices paid by less sophisticated buyers.

Because of their anonymous production over the centuries the Korean atlases are very difficult to date, though an individual atlas may be dated by marginal notes or by introductory statements made by copyists or owners. The seals of previous owners stamped on the atlas may also be used to date and give provenance to an individual atlas. Perhaps the simplest dating procedure is to judge the age of the paper on which the maps are printed or drawn, but this is not too precise. Through detailed study of individual maps of provinces some approximate dating is possible by the noting of royal grave sites or of certain county seats, but this can only provide a date after which an atlas was drawn, rather than a precise date of its preparation.

Because of their interest old Korean hand atlases have been reproduced in whole or in part for scholars and collectors outside Korea. One of the most elaborate reproductions was made in 1896 in Paris with a description by Henri Cordier. This was based on a manuscript atlas held by the British Museum. This seems to have been a costly enterprise for the reproduction of an undistinguished copy of an atlas similar to those easily obtainable in Korea at the time. As is apt to happen, copies of this French reproduction are now very scarce and expensive.

The world map, the *Ch'onhado*, which is a feature of the Korean hand atlases, has been reproduced many times in articles and books on Korean cartography. It has even been used as a Christmas greeting card. A number of *Ch'onhado*, or world maps, of different styles as well as other maps from

the Korean hand atlases are reproduced in an excellent book by Chan Lee on *Old Maps of Korea*, Seoul, 1977.¹⁰

The origin of Korean hand atlases is difficult to ascertain, though it is likely that they first came in to use in the early part of the Yi Dynasty. There are varying opinions on the origin of the Ch'onhado but it seems to have been developed between 1100 and 1400. Hiroshi Nakamura considered it of Chinese origin, though it was not perpetuated in China.11 Chan Lee, Professor of Geography at Seoul National University, considers the Ch'onhado to be Korean in origin, 12 yet it is full of names of mythical places derived from Chinese classics. The map of Korea and of the provinces of Korea which make up most of the contents of the hand atlases are usually identical with those in the Tongguk Yoji Sungnam (Geographical Encyclopedia of Korea) which was first compiled in 1481 and revised again in 1486, 1499 and 1530.13 The maps of Japan and of the Liu Chiu Kingdom are distorted and are derived from maps in the Haedong Chegukki, a book describing the geography of Japan and other areas in East Asia written by a Korean scholar, Sin Suk-chu, in 1471. 14 It would appear, therefore, that the prototypes of the Korean hand atlases were made in the late 1400's.


The atlases preserved their early form throughout the Yi Dynasty, long after more accurate maps of the world, the Far East and Korea, were available. In some of the atlases made in

the latter half of the period the *Ch'onhado*, the world map, has lines purporting to show parallels and meridians superimposed on the map. The famous Korean cartographer, Chong Sang-gi (1678-1752), broke away from the restrictions of the size of the paper sheets and started using scales on his provincial maps, the *Tongguk Chido* of circa 1730. However, the tradition of the provincial maps of Korea derived from the *Tongguk Yoji Sungnam* was so strong that the provincial maps continued to be used in the hand atlases even to the time of a well-known atlas, the *Tae Chosonguk Chondo*, printed from copper plates in 1896. Chinese characters were used in the Korean hand atlases since classical Chinese was the language of the Korean scholar, a factor which has led sometimes to the mistaken conclusion that the atlases were Chinese. They are uniquely Korean: though it is difficult to understand exactly why this atlas form was so prevalent in Korea. Some atlases were mounted in scroll form, but atlases made of folded sheets were much more common. This form may have been good for storage or for use when a scholar travelled to the capital or to a distant magistracy to which he had been posted. They were a handy size for ready reference.

The paper on which the maps were printed or drawn was made by hand from mulberry bark, a distinctive Korean product. This paper accepts ink well and is tough and long

lasting. It is quite soft and does not become brittle. Some of the old paper has an almost silk-like quality and is a pleasure to touch and feel. The covers were often made of yellowed oiled paper with a stiff backing made by pasting old sheets of paper together. On the cover the title, *Yojido*, is written: occasionally a poetic name for Korea: *Tongguk* or Eastern Nation, is put before *Yojido*.

The wood block printed atlases were rarely coloured but the manuscript atlases were usually coloured by hand, sometimes quite elaborately. Borders, place names, rivers and mountains were drawn by brush pen in black ink. The calligraphy varied a great deal depending on the skill of the copyist. Circles or rectangles were drawn around major places such as provincial or county seats. Blue was the colour used for rivers and surrounding seas, red or yellow to accentuate place names, green for forested mountains. The use of colour, however, was not completely standardized. In some manuscript atlases blue was used to shade both rivers and mountains. Sometimes the colours were added rather crudely, as though done by some student rather than by a mature scholar or copyist.

The maps in the atlases normally followed a set pattern. The *Ch'onhado*, the world or 'under heaven' map, comes first, the sequence starting from what Westerners would think of as the back of the book. This is followed by a map of China and then a simplified map of Korea. The map of China is in

relatively accurate shape and has the Great Wall drawn as a distinctive feature, with the Yellow River (sometimes coloured yellow) cutting through it. In most atlases these maps are followed by maps of Japan and of the Liu Chiu Kingdom; in some cases these two maps are placed at the end of the series of maps. The map of Japan is a rather wierd shape and accentuates the location of the capital at Kyoto near Lake Biwa. The map of the Liu Chiu Kingdom accentuates the large island of Okinawa, though drawn in a poor shape. The map of Korea, copied slavishly from the map in the Tongguk Yoji Sungnam, was adapted to the paper size, widening the southern part of the peninsula too much and drastically compressing the northern part of the peninsula.18 The eight maps of the provinces which usually are at the end of the atlas were all adjusted to the size of the paper and give the counties or magistracies as they were organized early in the Yi Dynasty. In some atlases a map of southern Manchuria, showing the route taken from Seoul to Peking was included, but this was not common. Occasionally an atlas would include a map of Seoul, the capital of Korea.

Korean hand atlases are unique and colourful and would make interesting additions to atlas collections but should a large foreign market develop for them there is a real danger that copies could be newly made to meet the demand.

A brief description and reproduction of two of the maps of a Korean atlas held at the Tall Tree Library was in *Imago Mundi*, Vol. XIII, 1956, pp. 163-164. The map collections at the American Geographical Scoiety in New York and the Library of Congress in Washington have a number of copies of the old Korean hand atlases.

Though there are many publications on Korean cartography, there is little literature devoted solely to the Korean atlases. For English-language references to Korean cartography see my article on 'Some Korean Maps', *Transactions, Korea Branch Royal Asiatic Society*, Vol. L, 1975, Seoul, pp. 70-102.

As noted in Reference 10, Dr. Chan Lee has listed the important holdings in nine of the leading collections in Korea. There are many other Korean libraries and museums that have copies of the hand atlases. I have seen some excellent examples of Korean atlases in Japanese collections, such as those at Tokyo University, Toyo Bunka Library and Tenri University. Other atlases which have come from private collections of Japanese who were in Korea in the pre-World War II period are often offered for sale in antiquarian stores in Tokyo.

Leo Bagrow collected a number of Korean atlases when he was in Korea in 1912. He comments briefly on the bookstores he found in the foreword of his History of Cartography. (Edited by R.A. Skelton, Harvard University Press, 1964.) According to Hiroshi Nakamura, 'His (Bagrow) collection itself of the Korean cartographical materials he had with him was lost in Russia in the confusion of the revolution that broke out during his stay there, but the photographs (photostats) of these Korean maps and his notebook were barely rescued'. ('Old Chinese World Maps Preserved by the Koreans,' Chosen Gakuho, Journal of the Academic Association of Koreanology in Japan, No. 39/40, April 1966, pp. 458-530, quotation from Avant-propos, p.521).

When I was doing geographic field work in Korea in 1938-1939, I bought a number of atlases. Some of these I presented to libraries such as that of the American Geographical Society in New York.

I spent many interesting hours looking at old atlases and maps in Korean libraries, collections and bookstores in 1975 and 1976 while I was a visiting Fulbright professor at Soong Jun University in Seoul.

Dr. Nakamura's article was originally written in French in 1934. It was written at the request of Leo Bagrow, the editor of *Imago Mundi*, forwarded to him by Professor Walter Fuchs, S.J., who at that time was in Mukden. The article was translated into German but because of publication problems in Germany was delayed in publication. According to Dr. Nakamura, the manuscript of the article 'together with the library and map collection of Prof. Bagrow were robbed by the Soviet troops in Berlin'. Fortunately a proof of the article was discovered in London and was translated and published in *Imago Mundi*, Vol. 4, Stockholm, March 1948, pp. 3-22. Some years later in 1966, as noted in Reference 2, Dr. Nakamura published the original French version together with comments in Japanese and English on the difficulties involved in its publication and with many more illustrations and footnotes.

Dr. Chan Lee, Professor of Geography at Seoul National University, has written a number of articles and monographs on aspects of early Korean cartography. Recently published was his lavishly-illustrated, quarto-size volume: Old Maps of Korea, The Korean Library Science Research Institute, Seoul, Korea, 1977, 249 pages. The coloured and black-and-white reproductions in this book are excellent. Three English language essays are included. Of special interest to collectors are the catalogues of nine major map collections in Korea. These are particularly useful, for some libraries are reticent about even listing their holdings.



The title, *Yojido*, is written in three chinese characters in a box in the upper left and again, in larger form, in the centre. The scribble on the cover is likely to be the writing of a student.

This undated map of Japan, common in old Korean atlases, is derived from an original drawn by a Korean scholar in 1471. North is at the base of the map. This particular manuscript copy is crudely drawn and coloured and is likely to be the work of a student rather than that of a skilled copyist.

This map is of the Liu Chiu kingdom which was a tributary state to China during much of the Yi dynasty so that it was included in old Korean atlases. The map was derived from one drawn by a Korean scholar in 1471. The three kingdoms of Okynawa were unified by 1407 but, as shown on the map, there was still recognition of the regional differences and strongholds even after that date. The symbol which looks like a palm frond represents a line of fortification connecting two strongholds.

The printing of this atlas the *Tae Chosonguk Chondo*, coincided with the printing by wood blocks of some world geography books; these helped Korean scholars and students to become informed of the outside world.

The correction of the shape of Korea on European maps was the result of the efforts of Jesuit missionary, cartographers notably Father Jean-Baptiste Regis. Setting up in Business

AFTER TWENTY-TWO YEARS with Her Majesty's Overseas Civil Service (what used to be the old 'colonial' service), Mr Tony Forster has returned to his home county of Leicestershire to set up his own antique map business.

He is calling it the Leycester Map Galleries and he intends to specalise in midland county maps from Saxtons through to Moules. At the moment his maps are on display at the Antique and Collectors Centre in Northampton Street, Leicester, but he hopes soon to open a shop. His postal business is done from home in Arnesby, near Leicester, and he is supported by his wife, Hilary, herself a talented colourist.

They returned recently from the New Hebrides, which, as Tony points out, is 'an interesting part of the world from the cartographic point of view' as the group contains the island of Espiritu Santo which was considered to be the coast of the Australian continent and this is reflected in many 17th and 18th century maps. In fact, it was named by its' discoverer, the Spanish explorer 'de Quiros' as Terra Australis del Espiritu Santo.

'I also served in the Solomon Islands another group which was erratically placed on early maps and charts', he explained. 'Another Spanish explorer Mandana, discovered the island of Guadacanal in 1584 and as gold was also found there, it became known as the Solomon Islands - after King Solomon's

Mines, and many early maps place these islands much further out into the Pacific than in reality', he added.

In setting up his map business, Tony is following up a life long interest in antique maps.

New map society

A NEW SOCIETY, which will unite western Canadian antique map enthusiasts, has been formed with the same purpose as the Chicago Map Society - 'to support and encourage the study and preservation of maps and related materials'

The President, Miss Frances Woodward, told us that as vet they have no formal constitution but they hope 'to become more formalised in the Fall as we now have membership dues and a commitment to cary on'.

Most of the people like maps, perhaps have a few, and want to know more about them', she added. 'Possible future projects range from exhibitions, the production of map notepaper or cards, and a cartobibliography'. Miss Woodward is certain that the group will grow in strength and significance.

From old to new

SPANISH MAPS OF the American northwest coast, maps relating to Vancouver's voyages, and a Captain Cook display were among the historical map attractions at the Association of Canadian Map Libraries' twelfth annual conference.

The conference was held over four days in

June at Heritage Court and the University of Victoria, British Columbia. There were many successful sessions, ranging from antique maps to modern day subjects, such as satellite mapping.

The association has also published a directory of Canadian map collections, compiled by Lorraine Dubreuil and including ninety-five entries, and a number of inexpensive facsimiles.

The first of these facsimiles included several unusual maps, such as M. Pitt's map of the North Pole and the adjoining parts (1680), and Alexander MacKenzie's map of America, exhibiting MacKenzie's Track (1801).

Eight more became available this summer, including the first edition of Cook's Chart of the Northwest Coast of America and Northeast Coast of Asia, and Mueller's Nouvelle carte des decouvertes faite par des vaisseaux Russiens aux côtes inconnues de l'Amerique Septentrionale.

Hawaii in maps

FIFTY MAPS WERE selected from the largest and most comprehensive cartographic collection in the world — the United States' Library of Congress holdings of more than 3,500,000 maps, charts and atlases — for an exhibition entitled 'Hawaii in Maps'.

The exhibition was held by the Library of Congress, at its Geography and Map Division, Alexandria, Virginia. It marked the bicentennial of Captain James Cook's discovery of the Hawaiian islands.

Among the many fascinating items on

display were one of the earliest editions of Cook's chart of Hawaii, rare maps produced in the Hawaiian language by missionaries, 19th century government surveys, and a variety of wall maps, commercial maps, military charts, tax maps and others.

Another interesting exhibition at the Geography and Map Division, celebrating the German geographer, traveller, librarian and historian Johann Georg Kohl, closed at the end of July.

Kohl, who died in 1878, took his valuable collection of early American maps to the United States and prepared copies for American scholars to study. His manuscript copies, Gulf Stream surveys and items demonstrating his mapping techniques were on display.

Birds-eye view of Jerusalem

A 1475 BIRD'S-EYE view of the Holy Land, centred on Jerusalem, was the earliest map on display at an exhibition at Pulchri Studio, The Hague, Holland, in July.

This remarkable exhibition was entitled 30 Jaar Israel 1948-1978; 500 Jaar Prenten En Bijbels 1478-1978. (30 Years of Israel 1948 to 1978; 500 Years of Printing and Bibles 1478 to 1978). It showed the development of cartography over five centuries, from woodcuts to the golden age of the engravers' art, and included 50 publishers and engravers such as Blaeu, Ortelius and Visscher.

Among the many beautiful exhibits were a 1585 world map in the form of a clover leaf, showing Jerusalem at the hub, and a copper engraved map of Jerusalem, measuring one metre square. There were also a number of other town plans and a selection of bibles from the Wilco C. Poortman collection.

PROFILE

For love of the Library

HELEN WALLIS IS an exceptionally busy woman. For in addition to being Map Librarian of the British Library, she is a prolific author and researcher, plays a leading part in organising many exhibitions, and has travelled all over the world to conferences and on lecture tours.

Only last month she was in Maryland, USA, for the International Cartographic Association's conference, and earlier this year attended the conference Captain Cook and his times' in Vancouver, Canada. From there she went on to the Hawaiian Islands to lecture on Cook's explorations.

Her work over many years has involved her in some of the most important present day issues in the study of antiquarian maps, such as the Vinland Map controversy, which stunned and still perplexes the most eminent authorities.

Dr Wallis gained an honours degree in geography at Oxford

in 1951 and produced her doctoral thesis on 'The Exploration of the South Seas, 1519-1644', and it was her research on this project that first took her to the Museum's map library.

Her research supervisor was the late eminent Dr R.A. Skelton, who encouraged her to study in the Map Room and through her studies she became interested in the work and collections there and then applied for the post of Assistant Keeper. On Dr Skelton's retirement in 1967 she took over as Deputy Keeper in charge of the Map Room, becoming Map Librarian when the library departments separated from the museum in 1973.

She is the second woman to become a Deputy Keeper in the Bloomsbury library departments, but, as she points out, 'things have changed a lot since the Second World War. I have quite a number of lady colleagues now — out of five academic staff of the map library, four are women. In fact, some people make a joke about it, asking if there are any men left!'

The collection contains roughly one and a half million maps and views, sixty early globes and more than 20,000 atlases. About 5,000 researchers, public officials and other visitors, many from overseas, make use of it each year. Although these collections are not as large as those in the Library of Congress, Washington DC, they contain probably the finest collection of maps and atlases in the world. The Klencke atlas, for example, which was presented to Charles II in 1660, is the largest in the world and includes many fine Dutch maps. The Library has the superb topographical and maritime collections of King George III — the best geographical library of its day with some 50,000 maps and charts — and other important collections such as the libraries of Sir Joseph Banks and Thomas Grenville,

Around and About

Bermuda will be issuing a set of stamps in September which will feature reproductions of antique Bermuda maps. We hope to show photographs of these in our December issue.

A Hertfordshire (England) antique map and book dealer has been elected a member of the Antiquarian Booksellers Association, which is based in Buckingham Palace Road, London, and has an international membership. Clive A. Burden of High Street, Rickmansworth, was proposed by Mr Roger Baynton-Williams and Maggs Bros. Ltd.

A limited number of brass etched maps of Australia are being offered for sale by a silversmith in Carlisle Place, London. They are being issued to commemorate the 150th anniversary of Western Australia and they show the south west portion including the Swan River settlement circa 1831. The original map is in the Battye Library, Perth. The price of each map (48 cm x 39 cm) is \$100 and they are obtainable from Glyn Lambert Marketing, 4 Evelyn Mansions, Carlisle Place, London SW1.

An unusual use for a map has been reported to us by Mr Ian K. Crain of Ottawa. He tells us that the Canadian Government Department of Energy, Mines and Resources is using surplus out-of-date topographical maps for many purposes including internal messenger service envelopes, telephone message pads and photocopy paper. A real less on in economy! Apparently, a popular game within the department is for employees to bet on identifying the location of the map from the fragment visible.

Nevilles Medieval Maps of Tring, Hertfordshire, England, have opened a new viewing gallery at their offices in Church Square.

Miss Barbara Hewitt will be helping customers with their enquiries.

International antique print and map specialists, the Baynton-Williams Gallery of Lowndes Street, Belgravia, London, staged a fascinating exhibition entitled 'Romantic Prints of Travel in Discomfort'. Among the 200 prints on show (up to the year 1860) were shipping prints including an unusual pair of lithographs 'War' and 'Peace', prints of many other modes of transport and other aids to travel like bridges. The exhibition was part of the Countrywide Antiques Festival organised by the British Antique Dealers' Association.

Map collectors and dealers will be pleased to hear about a new magnifying glass which has been added to the range of miniature optical equipment available from Northgate Instruments Ltd. of 19 London Road, Gloucester.

Rare engravings and lithographs illustrating the city of Milwaukee, USA, in various stages of its early development, were on show at an exhibition in Milwaukee Art Centre. The exhibition then moved to the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, Madison. Wisconsin was a principal centre for American view production during the last third of the 19th century and works by many nationally important artists, printers and publishers were on display.



Israeli maps catalogued

MR ERAN LAOR, who a short while ago donated his complete collection of antique maps to the Hebrew University, Jerusalem, is preparing a catalogue of old maps of Israel and their makers.

Mr Laor is director of the university's Cartography Department, and the collection housed in the National Library of the University is one of the country's most extensive. Israel's other large collection is in the Maritime Museum, Haifa, under Mr Arie Ben Eli.

Although map collecting is a well established hobby in Israel, there is no map collectors' organisation and only four dealers — two in Jerusalem and two in Tel Aviv. People mainly collect maps of the Holy Land, plans and views of Jerusalem and of the Middle East generally.

Being a small country, Israel, not surprisingly, has only a relatively small circle of collectors — but including the Mayor of Jerusalem, Mr Teddy Kollek, who is a keen map enthusiast.

and the original drawings of the Ordnance Survey from 1790. The Map Library justly describes itself as the national

repository of British map production, past and present.

'It's a constantly growing collection', said Dr Wallis. 'We buy a good deal of modern, and even more, antique material to fill gaps, and this role of conserving the collections and adding to them for use today and for posterity, is a very important part of our work'.

The most important purchase of maps made by the British Museum of that time was the Royal United Services Institutions Collection of 18th and 19th century military maps in 1968.

Other departments of the British Library have charge of the large collections of manuscript maps and oriental maps but the Map Library is generally considered to be the centre for geographical studies. It is open daily from 9.30 am to 4.30 pm except Sundays. Staff service the maps at every stage from acquisition to use by students and maintain an information service.

Dr Wallis's day to day work is partly concerned with ensuring that maps are available to the public. The Library has had its own permanent display gallery for exhibitions since 1955. She arranged special exhibitions too, and is on the committee organising yet another exhibition on Captain Cook. This one will emphasise the relationship between Europeans and the native peoples of the Pacific. It is a joint venture with the Museum of Mankind, in Burlington Gardens, and will be on display from February, 1979 until December of that year.

Another aspect of Dr Wallis's life is the time she gives to other organisations. She is a past president of the British Cartographic Society, Chairman of the Commission of the History of Cartography of the International Cartographic Association, Chairman of the Society for Nautical Research, Secretary of the Geography and Map Library Associations. This all forms part of the Library's close liaison with other research and scientific institutions.

Her work also includes the planning and expansion of Library facilities. The Map Library will move, together with the other map departments, to a new building in Euston Road in the 1990s.

Dr Wallis is an author of some significance. Among her publications are Captain Carteret's Voyage Round the World, a contribution to the symposium entitled The Strange Case of the Vinland Map and My Head is a Map edited with Sarah Tyacke. Her current work includes preparation of a volume about Captain Cook's last voyage for the Hakluyt Society and a catalogue of early globes.

Perhaps the most satisfying part of her work is when she is able to play a real part in scientific discovery, for she has always been deeply interested in the history of cartography and exploration. She once received a telephone call from the USA, for instance, while the Cook exhibition was in progress, from a scientific expedition asking whether Cook's cannons had been cast in iron or bronze. After consultations with colleagues she was able to reply 'iron' which enabled the expedition to locate by magnetometer and retrieve the cannon which had been jettisoned by Cook on the Great Barrier Reef in 1770.

Despite all her involvements with maps, Dr Wallis still finds time for other interests including music and when not dashing for a plane or scrutinising possible acquisitions she can be heard singing with the British Museum Choral Society.

BOOK REVIEWS

MILWAUKEE ILLUSTRATED: Panoramic and Bird's-Eye Views of a Midwestern Metropolis, 1844-1908. Exhibition and Catalogue by Thomas Beckman Milwaukee Art Centre, 1978 (No price stated), pp [68] (unnumbered),

including index, paper covers.

As with many books and catalogues of this type, there is a wider context applicable than the title might suggest. Although the Milwaukee Illustrated exhibition held during the summer of 1978 is devoted exclusively to views of the city, the catalogue itself provides new information on people who made views and panoramas of numerous other towns and cities throughout the United States of America during the nineteenth and early twentieth century.

Although town and city views began to be produced in Europe soon after the introduction of movable type, more were produced in the United States than in any other country. This was not only due to the rapid growth of towns and to civic pride but also to the effects of commercial advertising and the development of colour lithography as a printing medium.

It has been estimated by none other than that great authority on North American city views, John Reps, that no fewer than 5000 such productions were put out by American publishers mostly during the nineteenth century.

A useful brief history of the processes involved in the production of views is given in the introductory essay, drawing a distinction between the panoramic view, which illustrates a broad extent of territory from the most advantageous viewpoint, (the top of a building, a ship's mast, a hill top or simply a large open space providing a wide vista), and on the other hand, the bird's-eye view. For this the artist has walked the streets of the city, sketching all the buildings and points of interest and redrawing the result in a raised perspective to give the impression of a viewpoint from an altitude of several thousand feet.

Since Wisconsin, and Milwaukee in particular was, and is, an area of much German immigration, it is no surprise that the techniques of the old country were brought over and the catalogue contains the names of Louis Kurz of the



American Oleograph Company, Henry Wellge, Adam Beck and Clemens J. Pauli and their names stand alongside the names of the makers of 'what made Milwaukee famous!'

Entries are clearly set out giving the title, the publisher, the print and paper size, followed by copious notes providing a history of Milwaukee in a nutshell. Mr Beckman is to be congratulated on his catalogue. JJS Goss



FORUM. You write to us.

Having solicited comments from your readership in your recent article Cartographers versus the Demon Drink by Ralph Hyde, I feel justified in writing to you and expressing my pleasure in reading this work. I had no idea that 'drink maps' were in vogue in nineteenth century England. I had believed, erroneously, that they were the creation of the powerful temperance zealots in the United States. So much for chauvinism!

Nevertheless, you may be interested to know that several years ago, while rummaging through a disused bin of ephemera at a Manhattan bookstore, I came across a small pamphlet entitled New York City and Its Masters, published on February 1, 1887, by the Church Temperance Society in New York. It is actually an atlas of drinking establishments on Manhattan Island, with one page devoted to each of the city's twenty-three assembly districts.

The author of the work, Robert Graham, General Secretary of the Church Temperance Society, also included a number of tables dealing with the numbers and types of establishments selling alcohol as well as the number and location of various religious organisations. One particularly interesting ratio is the number of saloons to the population of an assembly district. The first district, comprising much of lower Manhattan led the list with one saloon for every forty-one men, women and children in the area. In total there were 10,168 saloons in Manhattan in 1886, almost all of which are shown on Mr. Graham's maps.

Moreover, the maps are not in any way decorative, but are merely black and white line drawings marked with street names, and following the contours of the island. Each saloon is marked by a shaded black bar.

Although it is not mentioned in the text, Mr Graham probably came to New York from Great Britain. He does note at one point that he first saw the city from Lower New York Bay in 1880. Quite likely he was a member of a British temperance city and was familiar with one of the maps referred to in the article.

I should be interested to learn of any other drink maps concerning the city of New York.

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Collectors' Barometer

Compiled by John Goss

THIS REGULAR AUCTION SECTION has two purposes. Firstly, it gives collectors a continuing indication of the range of available maps, and the atlases from which most maps are derived; thus providing a barometer of prices and a guide to relative values. Secondly, it will develop over the years into a major catalogue of the significant maps and atlases sold in auction since June 1, 1977.

Lot descriptions for all articles realizing over £500 (or its equivalent) are reproduced in full. The prices are 'hammer prices' to which must be added the buyer's premium where applicable. Each lot reported is numbered for quotation purposes. These reference numbers are also used below

in the cumulative index to the auction reports in the first four issues.

Although auction results are helpful in forming judgements on general price trends over a period, it can be very misleading to base any conclusion on the price realized for an individual lot. Prices for similar items can vary from auction to auction depending on the circumstances of the particular auction and the condition of the item offered for sale. Condition is very important and, however well described, can only be judged properly by personal examination.

The report includes not only conventional atlases but also books whose importance is governed almost entirely by the maps they contain rather than

The totals noted at the foot of each auction report are for all maps and atlases sold at that auction including lots which realized less than £500. Every effort is made to report all major auctions of maps and atlases throughout the world as soon as possible, but occasional delays may occur in obtaining information and some reports may have to be carried over to subsequent issues. The total realized for maps and atlases sold in auction reported in this issue amounted to £459,554.




Collations compiled by R.V. Tooley

Collations, namely the listing of atlas contents map by map, are the basic tools of the map collector and the student of historical cartography. They assist in the identification of particular editions, in the dating of loose maps which have become detached from atlases and they help to confirm or otherwise the completeness of a particular work. It is only by studying atlas contents that collectors and scholars can determine which maps, covering particular areas of interest, have been published in atlas form.

A number of atlases are collated in each issue to form with the rest of The Map Collector, an unending part-work encyclopaedia on the history of cartography.

Herman Moll's map of the United Provinces from *Atlas Minor*. (By courtesy of The British Library Ref: Maps C.39.b.4.)


ATLAS MINOR by HERMAN MOLL [1740]

Moll was a Dutch geographer and bookseller from about 1688 to 1732. He came to London about 1688 and in his early career he sold maps in 'Vanley's Court, Blackfryer's', and finally established himself in Devereux Court, Strand, where he acquired a reputation for the excellence of his maps. 

USA. CAPT JOHN SMITH'S MAP OF VIRGINIA

Capt. John Smith accompanied the party that sailed from England to establish the first permanent English settlement in North America. After sailing into Chesapeake Bay and up the James River they landed at Jamestown, Virginia in the spring of 1607. A set of instructions were issued to members of his party which read as follows: 'You must observe, if you can, whether the river on which you plant doth spring out of mountains or out of lakes. If it be out of any lake, the passage to the other sea will be more easy and is like enough that out of the same lake you will find some sprint which runs the contrary way towards the Indian Sea!

These directions indicate the then prevalent belief that the Western Ocean was near at hand with only the open passage to it remaining to be discovered. The first explorations of the bay area tended to support the belief in a Westward passage and Smith wrote to Henry Hudson that there was a sea leading into the Western Ocean to the North of the Virginia Colony which led Hudson to the discovery of the river which bears his name.

The original manuscript sent by Robert Tindall was lost and the next manuscript dated 1608 is held in the British Library. The first printed map appeared in 1612, many derivatives are known and here we offer just one:
